Lalmonirhat victims Barisal victims living in fear of returning home another attack

Visiting Ain o Salish Kendra

team tells journalists

Hindus who were recently attacked in two Lalmonirhat upazilas are living in fear as the perpetrators are walking free and threatening to kill them if they do not withdraw the cases, said an Ain o Salish Kendra team yesterday.

Lalmonirhat Deputy Commissioner Habibur Rahman and Superintendent of Police Habibur Rahman have assured of providing security, Abu Ahmed Fajlul Kabir, leading the five-member team, told journalists at one of the spots.

The team visited the crime scenes, around 92 kilometres apart from each other, on Thursday and yesterday and talked to the victims.

The victims blamed BNP-Jamaat-Shibir men of vandalising and looting 16 shops, torching some in the process, of only Hindus in Shafinagar village of Patgram upazila on

OUR CORRESPONDENT, Barisal After hiding for about a week following an arson attack, the residents of Nomopara, a Hindu locality in Barisal, have

started returning home and reconstructing their houses.

The victims are being helped by a team of Boy Scouts from Barisal city, about six kilometres west of the locality in Char Kawa village. Locals of neighbouring Char Aicha village burnt at least

15 houses and two temples of Nomopara on November 15, a day after a Muslim youth of Char Aicha was killed in a clash with some young men of the Hindu locality over a badminton game. After the incident, residents of both the areas fled homes fearing violence and arrest.

Yesterday, officials, locals, socio-political, cultural and rights activists held an amity meeting between residents of the two areas, calling upon all to return to their houses.

At the rally, 16 Hindu families who lost everything in the arson received Tk 10,000 each and some utensils, while the family of the murdered youth was given Tk 25,000 and the injured got Tk 5,000 to Tk 10,000. The donations came from

Homework

f you believe mischievous children over the ages, vast proportions of humanity's homework have been consumed by the dog. However, joking aside, homework plays a critical role in our intellectual development. The boy in the photograph reminded me of all the homework of my life and how they evolved over time.

I remember no homework before Class VII; they were neither memorably difficult nor painful. Class VII marked a change because the English teacher, Brother John Stephens, was appalled by our poor vocabulary. So he required the class to learn ten new words every day for the entire year and tested our learning through daily quizzes. I resented the extra work back then; now I realize what a blessing it had been.

Two years later, Mr. Shawkat Hussain ignited my lifelong passion for all things mathematical. His charm lay in his clear and effortless explanation of mathematical principles. His creative approach to problem-solving turned the difficult subject into a challenging game. My favourite memory of Mr. Hussain was the morning he walked into class and announced, "I had trouble falling asleep last night, so I came up with three new proofs of Pythagoras' Theorem."

Homework became progressively time-consuming as my education advanced and independent thinking gradually replaced rote-learning. But it remained somewhat optional even during my A level days in London. That's because what mattered was the grade one received in the final A level examination where one's homework grade made no difference.

Things changed drastically when I began my Electrical Engineering undergraduate studies in the USA. Homework - along with frequent, gruelling examinations called "prelims" - were the lifeblood of this program. Not only did grades depend heavily on homework, but performance in "prelims" was directly related to how hard one worked on the homework.

Professor Toby Berger's class - on engineering mathematics - was particularly stimulating. The first problem on his first homework assignment was staggeringly difficult. But he added this life-saver -"Hint: Use a Lagrange Multiplier. If you don't know what one is, find out.

Childhood had indeed ended. We were no longer responsible for knowing only what was in the syllabus, but were also expected to research and learn new

concepts - outside the syllabus - on our own.

Incredible as it may seem, in graduate school, homework became even more important. My graduate advisor was completely hooked on abstract mathematical concepts. His long homework sets required countless hours and numerous pages. After exhausting several writing pads every week for a few weeks, I developed the habit of using the (empty) backside of recycled computer printouts for my homework to save money on writing pads.

The boy in the photograph appears captivated by his homework. Did he have any idea about all the homework of life that lay ahead? How did he face them? What a story that would make!

They were paying tribute to Rafiqul Islam, who passed away on Wednesday at Vancouver General Hospital in Canada, at the central Shaheed Minar. Sammilito Sangskritik Jote organised the ceremony.

Different ministries, social and cultural organisations and educa-

tional institutions also placed wreaths at the portrait of Rafigul Islam.

Mofidul Haque, one of the trustees of the Liberation War Museum, said the initiative taken by Rafigul and Abdus Salam, members of Vancouver-based NGO "Mother Language Lovers of the World", in 1998 inspired the then government to work towards achieving UN recognition of the Language Movement.

Responding to Bangladesh's proposal, the Unesco in 1999 declared February 21 as

HC ORDER TO REMOVE STRUCTURES FROM 4 RIVERS

SC may hear review petition tomorrow

The Supreme Court is likely to hear tomorrow a review petition filed against its May 3, 2010 order upholding a High Court directive to remove all structures, excluding government ones set up in public interest, from four rivers around the capital.

The rivers are Shitalakkhya, Balu, Turag and Buriganga. The petition was enlisted as case No 54 in the SC's hearing

It was filed by City Sugar Industries Ltd, which has three illegal jetties in the Shitalakkhya, in 2010 following the June 2009 HC directive on the government, Manzill Murshid, president of Human Rights and Peace for Bangladesh (HRPB), told The Daily Star.

He said the directive came following a public interest litigation filed by HRPB.

The HC in 2012 issued a contempt of court rule against the high government officials concerned for not executing the SC order. The rule is still now pending before the HC, he added.

AL men grab land by forcing owner to sign deed

Two activists of Awami League and two of pro-AL organisations allegedly grabbed 20-decimal land from a brick kiln owner by forcing him to sign the deed to the land at a police station on Thursday night in Sarishabari of Jamalpur.

Zahid Hossain Sabuj, the brick kiln owner, claimed that two upazila AL activists -- Abul Kalam and Mukul -- the president of Sarishabari unit of Jubo League, Mantulal Tewary, and the secretary of upazila unit of Swechhasebak League, Kalachan Pal, forcibly took him to Sarishabari Police Station and made him sign the deed to the land in Simlagupinath area worth Tk 50 lakh.

They at first demanded Tk 7 lakh from him which they claimed was owed to them by Sabuj's father, who passed away a couple of months back, said Sabuj.

Six people were killed and 30 others injured in road accidents in the country yesterday.

Our Chittagong correspondent reports, a person was killed and 27 others, including two children, were injured when a bus plunged into a roadside ditch at Anwara in Chittagong.

Seventeen of the injured are undergoing treatment at complications at a clinic in Chittagong Medical College Hospital while the others at Anwara Upazila Health Complex. Our Jhenidah correspondent adds, Ajgor Ali, 65, of

Moheshpur upazila, died when a microbus ran him over at Kaliganj Bus Stand on Jhenidah-Jessore road. A Comilla correspondent reports, two children were killed and three other persons injured when a bus of Janata Express collided head-on with a CNG-run auto-rickshaw

carrying them at Alekharchar in Sadar upazila. The dead were Md Ruhul Amin Roney, 10, son Abu Taher, and his cousin Aklima Akhter, 7, daughter of Arsad Miah. The injured were admitted to Comilla Sadar Hospital.
