The complete torching of one coach and partial burning of two others of Sirajganj Express at Ishwardi Junction Yard on Tuesday at 1:00am, five hours before the blockade began, alone caused Tk 41 lakh worth of damage, he said.

Police had to escort fire fighters to the scene as miscreants, in an attempt to delay them, were hurling cocktails and burning fires on the road. By the time they reached the scene, the damage had already been done, he added.

He said at least 33 attacks occurred, including minor arson attacks, uprooting of tracks, throwing of stones and bricks at trains and blocking of tracks with logs, and separate general diaries have been filed with Government Railway Police.


Bangladeshis living in the UK demonstrated outside the British parliament in London Wednesday demanding that convicted war criminal Chowdhury Mueenuddin be deported to Bangladesh to face justice. Mueen, 65, currently residing in the

UK, has been found guilty early this month of committing war crimes during Bangladesh's Liberation War by the International Crimes Tribunal on all 11 charges relating to abduction and killing of 18 intellectuals that included nine teachers of Dhaka University, six journalists, and three physicians.

The special court passed a death sentence on Mueen, who in 1971 was an active member of the student wing of the Jamaat-e-Islami which actively opposed Bangladesh's independence and aided the Pakistani military in committing genocide.
