Living in anarchy

SCENE ONE

A man's eye falls out of its socket as the bandage is removed. The sight pushes his distraught wife into unconsciousness. His son, petrified, cries his heart out at the eerie scene before him.

Screaming men and women cause a near stampede as they try getting out of a bus set afire by motor cycle-riding bomb throwers. Many of them get terribly burnt in the process, raw flesh gaping out of their sizzling wounds. Many others suffer burns on diverse parts of the body -- arms, face, neck, shoulders. As they are wheeled into hospital, beds are conspicuous by their scarcity and doctors and nurses are at a loss on how to cope with the casualties.

The body of a public transport vehicle driver, wrapped in a sheet, lies on the grimy floor of Dhaka Medical College Hospital. The tragedy causes uncontrollable tears to well up in his helpers, boys in their early teenage. They might as well have lost a father and, with him, their hopes of survival.

Across the country, the cries of new widows do not move the heavens. A poverty-stricken mother comes all the way from a distant village to be beside a thoroughly bandaged, almost unrecognisable son. She bursts into tears. A SEE PAGE 4 COL 3

Dream left in ashes

Arson-hit compliant RMG maker suffers Tk 1,200cr loss; owner devastated

Only two days ago, he was an employer of 19,000 workers at his apparel factory complex in Gazipur. But a single mindless act of sabotage has taken Mosharraf Hussain, owner and managing director of Standard Group, to the brink of bankruptcy overnight.

Early Friday, some outsiders burnt valuables worth Tk 1,200 crore of his factory complex -- a nine-storey and a six-storey units -- in Konabari to ashes.

"I am a beggar now," said the 69-year-old as he lost control over his emotions during a press briefing at the BGMEA headquarters in the capital yesterday, nearly 40 hours after the incident.

Mosharraf gave vivid details of the incident, which came as a massive blow to the country's already-under-pressure \$20 billion garment industry.

He said that on Thursday, the factory had closed around 8:00pm. Only the washing unit was functional with 200 to 250 workers inside.

Around 10:30pm, some 70 to 80 outsiders began banging on the main gate trying to break into the factory premises. Inside, there were 25 to 30 industrial police who tried to resist the attackers. At one point, the police had to charge truncheon

and fire rubber bullets to drive the troublemakers away. The effort left one of the attackers bullet injured.

The wounded was rushed to Dhaka Medical

College Hospital by an ambulance owned by the factory.


the capital's Suhrawardy Udyan yesterday. Reassuring the BNP-led opposition alliance of a free, fair

Ominous sign

The sights are raw and unthinkable. Over a million square feet of factory space lay charred. Truck after truck of brand apparels just to be exported turned to ashes.

The sights also send out a chilling anxiety over the future of not only the country's booming garment sector but also the total industrial activities.

Just consider these points -- Standard Group is the largest single garment factory of the country. It operated in the most ethical way with full compliance, it treated its workers ethically and it paid its workers dot on time. It can be termed the jewel of the crown for Bangladesh. That jewel is now a smouldering heap.

This criminal act took place at a critical time for Bangladesh garment when it is seeing a fall in exports and orders. Take the last two months' figures of which are available. From \$2 billion exports in September, it came down to \$1.6 billion in October. Orders from March next year have slumped because buyers are already worried about the long-drawn political violence in Bangladesh. In fact, if buyers had a ready option, they would have shifted much earlier.

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Arson: foul play of outsiders

Local influential people played key role

Friday's fire at Standard Group's factory complex in Gazipur was a clear case of arson by workers from neighbouring factories and some influential locals.

It all started on November 13, when a meeting was held

 at Baluchar, a neighbourhood near the factory, on how to organise demonstrations for higher wages.
 The workers of Standard Group, one of the most compli-
