tomorrow Bangladesh team leaves for Hague today

The hearing on the case related to the Bay of Bengal maritime boundary dispute between Bangladesh and India will begin at the Permanent Court of Arbitration (PCA) in the Netherlands tomorrow.

UNB, Dhaka

A Bangladesh delegation is scheduled to leave Dhaka for the Hague today to join the eight-day hearing at the five-member tribunal.

Foreign Minister AH Mahmud Ali, former foreign minister and agent of the case Dr Dipu Moni and Foreign Secretary M Shahidul Haque are likely to join the team.

PCA is expected to deliver its judgment by the first half of the next year, foreign ministry sources said. The arbitral tribunal

On October 8, 2009, Bangladesh moved for arbitral proceedings concerning the delimitation of the maritime boundary between Bangladesh and India pursuant to Article 287 and Annex

VII, Article 1 of the United Nations Convention on the Law of the Sea (UNCLOS). The Permanent Court of Arbitration acts as registry in this arbitration.

Bangladesh won a landmark verdict against Myanmar on March 14, 2012 at the ITLOS and through the verdict, Bangladesh sustained its claim to the 200-nauticalmile exclusive economic and territorial rights in the Bay of

Defy orders for poll works

BNP's Salauddin Ahmed urges govt officials UNB, Dhaka

The main opposition BNP yesterday called upon government officials and employees to neutrally perform their duties and disregard orders requiring involvement in the upcoming election.

"You are the servants of the people of the country. Do not be used as a tool of any party or individual to fulfill illegal desires," said BNP Joint Secretary General Salauddin Ahmed.

In a video message recorded in an undisclosed location and sent to the news agency, the BNP spokesperson also urged the Election Commission to postpone "the lopsided and farcical polls".

Claiming that the Awami League wants to hold a farcical election as it fears a fair one, he requested the people of the country to unite to ensure the fall of the current regime.

Salauddin said the Commonwealth, the European Union, the United Nations and other organisations and states have not yet decided to send election observers to monitor the government's "one-sided polls" in Bangladesh.

"Even most of the election monitoring bodies and organisations registered with the Election Commission did not apply for observing the election. Besides, the majority of the teachers expressed unwillingness to discharge duties in the polling centres," he said.

South Ctg residents choked by smog in winter

Blame state-run fertiliser factory emission

As soon as winter evenings approach, residents of Hadi Para and Hossain Ahamed Para in Chittagong city's southern tip are driven indoors by a pungent intermittent haze.

Locals complain of burning eyes, lips and tongue and a tingling sensation on the face, nostrils and skin and, after an extended period of exposure, of feeling nauseous and breathless.

This year the smog, as the locals claim, blanketed the neighbourhoods on October 9 around 10:00pm, leading to low visibility and made staying even inside homes difficult. After around two hours, it lifted just as it

The locals unanimously pointed their fingers at the adjacent Triple

Superphosphate Complex Ltd, a state to stop the emission. But the smog owned fertiliser factory situated in the Patenga industrial area, blaming it for releasing toxic gases every winter since its inception in 1964.

Reinforcing the claims, a former chief chemist of the factory, requesting anonymity, recently told The Daily Star that during overhauling every winter, some gas containing sulphur-dioxide, silicon tetrafluoride, hydrogen fluoride and acid mist does escape.

The locals alleged that they had requested the factory authority to release the gas after midnight, if stopping it altogether is not possible, but to no avail.

Another bout of smog on November 4 prompted the locals to vandalise the factory compound. Police were called in but they too asked

rolled in again, as per the locals, four The factory's managing director,

Golam Shahid Azad, over the phone recently, initially claimed that no such emission took place. He later admitted that some gas "might have escaped due to power outages". On November 14, a petition, signed

by 150 locals, was submitted to the Chittagong office of the Department of Environment (DoE).

Its director, Zafor Alam, said they got the same complaint last year and the factory authority had admitted that it was an "accidental leak".

The DoE at that time had issued a

Violence, killing aimed at saving war criminals

In the beginning of the discussion, one minute of silence was observed in honour of South African anti-apartheid icon Nelson Mandela who passed away on Thursday.

Muktijoddha Oikya Parishad President Syed Rezaur Rahman chaired the discussion, while Secretary General Shahjahan Kabir (Bir Protik), senior Supreme Court lawyer Shamsul Alam and Mahila Muktijoddha Sangsad leaders Prof Dr Ferdousi Begum and Farida Khanam Saki spoke among others.
