Taranco's 'hope for solution' depends on 'ifs'; UN mission's parleys with govt, opposition focus on curbing PM's polls-time powers

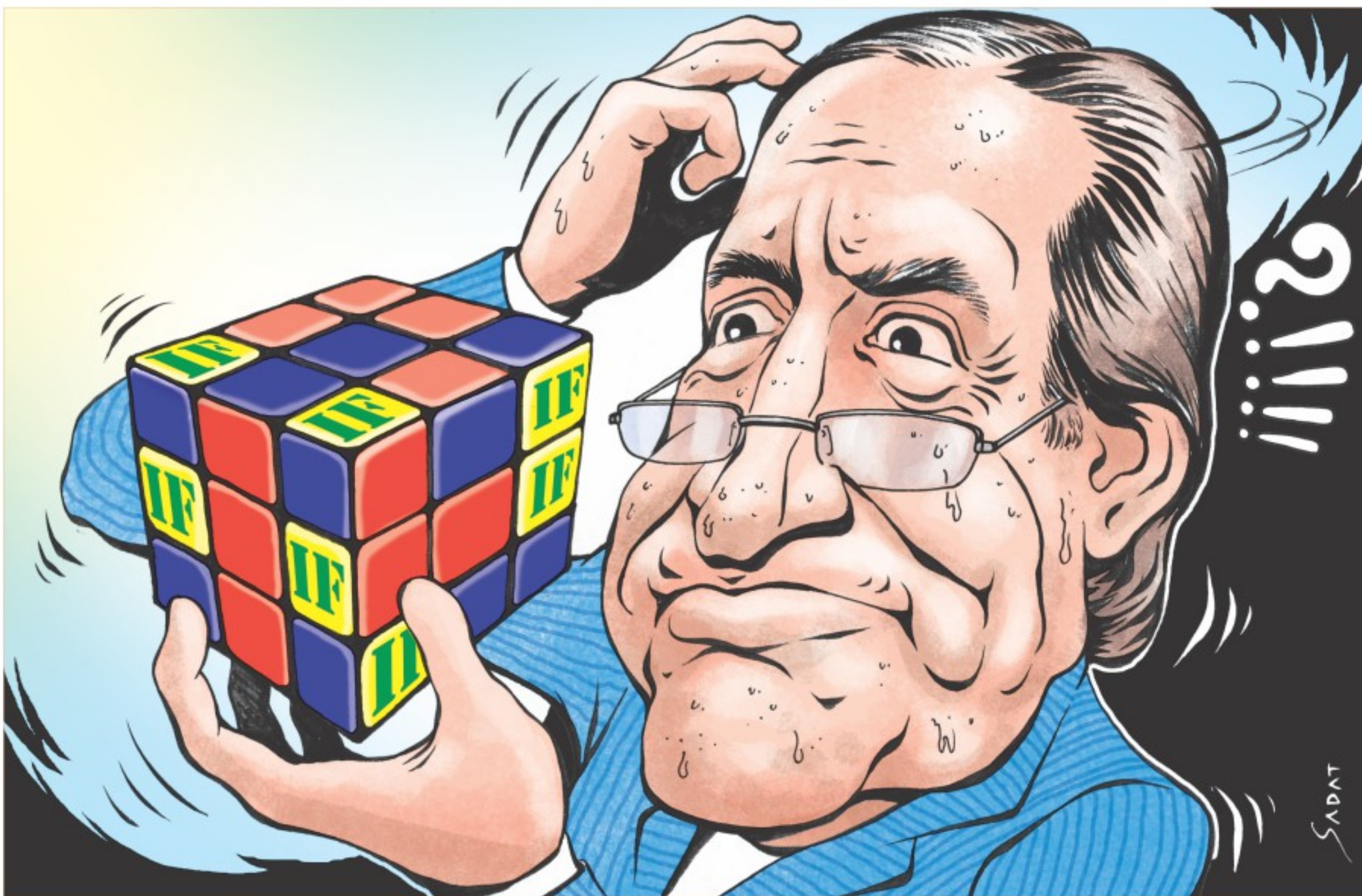
UN Assistant Secretary-General Oscar Fernandez-Taranco yesterday expressed hope for a solution to the crisis over polls-time government but with four vital "ifs". It was the first time he spoke to the press since flying in three days ago.

Meanwhile, with the opposition's blockade stretched till Friday, people wait keenly to see if any solution comes out of the UN mission's four-day troubleshooting that ends today.

Talking to reporters at the EC Secretariat after a 15-minute second-round meeting with the CEC in the afternoon, Taranco said, "I do believe that there is a possibility of a peaceful solution to this current deadlock -- if we've a political will, we've leadership, if we've an attitude of compromise, most importantly if we're engaged into a peaceful dialogue."

He added, "I know that you would like to hear more right now. I still have many other meetings to go through. I want to reassure that we will have the

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Boy killed in firing

Jamaat men clash with police in several dists; blockade extended until 6am Friday; Jamaat calls hartal also for today

A 12-year-old boy was killed by stray bullets and 10 others were injured yesterday, as Jamaat-Shibir men fought with law enforcers in Sirajganj during Jamaat's nationwide hartal that coincided with the opposition's blockade across the country.

Along with the activists of the BNP-led 18-party alliance, Jamaat-e-Islami men resorted to vandalism and arson in different

parts of the country, leaving more than 67 people injured.

Meanwhile, the alliance extended its 72-hour blockade, which started at 6:00am on Saturday, till 6:00am on Friday, causing further sufferings to people.

BNP Spokesperson Salahuddin Ahmed yesterday afternoon announced the extension of blockade via a video message from

Burnt in blockade arson

This time speech-impaired truck helper falls victim

A speech-impaired truck helper received burn injuries to the face, hands and thighs when pickets set his truck on fire at Debidwar in Comilla early yesterday, during the country-wide hartal enforced by Jamaat-e-Islami.

Victim Mujibur Rahman, 42, was going towards Companiganj of Comilla with the goods from the capital.

The attackers had hurled brick chips

at the truck when it reached Baniapara-Phultola area. As soon as the driver pulled off, they set fire to the vehicle using flammable liquid around 4:30am.

Driver Abdur Rahman, 47, also sustained minor burn injuries. They both had been rushed to a local clinic.

However, after primary treatment, Mujibur was rushed to the burn unit of Dhaka Medical College Hospital around 12:30pm.

Talking to The Daily Star, resident

surgeon of the burn unit Partha Shankar Paul said, "Though he sustained 20 percent burn, he is not out of danger, as fire damaged his respiratory organs."

Since the beginning of the opposition's latest spell of agitation on October 26, a total of 13 arson victims died. So far, some 124 victims have been treated at the DMCH burn unit. Of them, 72 had to be admitted to the hospital.
