V-Day belongs to Shaheed Jewel XI

Rokibul Hasan continued on his good run with the bat as he hammered 111 in the Victory Day Exhibition match and led his side Shaheed Jewel XI to a thrashing 149-run win over Shaheed Mushtaque XI at the Dhanmondi Cricket Stadium yesterday.

Batting first, Shaheed

Jewel XI were restricted to 285 for 9. Rokibul was the highest scorer and was ably supported by Junaed Siddique's 33 off 23 balls. Rokibul hit 12 fours and three sixes during his 87ball stint. For Shaheed Mushtaque, Enamul Haque Jr was the pick of the bowlers with figures of 4 for 38. Shahadat Hossain was also among the wickets and ended on 3 for 33.

In reply, Shaheed Mushtaque XI were bundled out for just 136 in 27 overs, with Marshall Ayub top-scoring with 20. Elias Sunny (three for 7) and Naeem Islam (two for 13) were the chief wicket-takers for Shaheed Jewel.

Odds against India

The odds seem stacked against India as they prepare to take on world cham pions South Africa in their first Test series since the retirement of batting icon Sachin Tendulkar.

The first of two Test matches starts at the Wanderers Stadium, Johannesburg on Wednesday, a ground which should suit South Africa's formidable fast bowling attack.

India have had minimal opportunity to adjust to South Africa's fast, bouncy pitches.

On a tour controversially shortened to the minimum three one-day internationals and two Tests, they were bowled out for 217 and 146 in the first two one-day games and did not bat in the final match because of rain.

A planned two-day match against a South African Invitation XI was abandoned without a ball bowled.

Under the original itinerary announced by South Africa, but rejected by India, the tourists would have played in two Twenty20 internationals, seven one-day internationals and two two-day games before playing the first Test.

India have won their most recent six Test matches but all were played at home.

They have not played a Test outside India since January 2012 when they were beaten 4-0 in Australia to extend to eight their losing streak away from home. Before that they lost by the same mar-

gin in England. South Africa have gone unbeaten in 13 series in their ascent to the top of the International Cricket Council rankings but their most recent two series against secondranked India, away in 2009-10 and at home the following season, have

ended tied at 1-1. South Africa boast a stable batting order and a

formidable pace attack. AB de Villiers and Hashim Amla are first and second in the Test batting rankings, with Graeme Smith and veteran Jacques

Kallis also in the top 12. India's highest-ranked batsman is Cheteshwar Pujara, at six, while Virat Kohli and captain Mahendra Singh Dhoni are 20th and 21st.

Bangladesh may never

for the first time today. The World Cup trophy is scheduled to

arrive here in the afternoon today from United Arab Emirates on a charted plane accompanied by FIFA delegates. BFF president Kazi Salahuddin along with representative of Coca-Cola, corporate partners of FIFA, will receive the trophy at the Hazrat Shahjalal International Airport.

Afterwards, the trophy will be taken to the Bangabhaban to be shown to the President of the People's Republic of Bangladesh Advocate Abdul Hamid and then to the office of Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina. A 20-member delegation, comprising BFF officials, Coca-Cola and FIFA delegates, will be with the trophy during the visit to the Bangabhaban and the PM's Office.

The trophy will be kept open for approximately 15,000 ticket-holders for two days on December 18 and 19 at the Bangabandhu National Stadium so that the visitors can take photos with the trophy.

The FIFA World Cup tour started from Rio de Janeiro on September 12 for a 267day global trek during which it will travel to 88 countries. After the three-day tour of Bangladesh, the trophy will leave for Bhutan on December 20.

England still alive

Rookie Ben Stokes kept England's faint hopes alive with his maiden Test half-century as the visitors fought to save the

Ashes series against a rampant Australia Monday.

Set an improbable 504 to win, England were 251 for five at stumps on Day Four, still 252 runs behind with just five wickets in hand on a heavily cracked Perth pitch.

Stokes, playing just his second Test, was providing resistance on 72, with wicketkeeper Matt Prior on seven and all of England's top order back in the pavilion. Australia will be heavily favoured to

mop up England's tail on the final day and regain the famous Ashes urn for the first time since 2007 after their big wins in Brisbane and Adelaide. Most of the lingering optimism for

England dried up after tea, when Kevin Pietersen again fell to a rash shot and then Ian Bell was given out on a successful decision review by the home side. After a catastrophic day for the

tourists on Sunday, when they con-

ceded a big lead to the Australians, things only got worse for them on the fourth day. Centurion Shane Watson and George Bailey humiliated the England attack before Australia declared on 369 for six, making them the first team to

be set a target of more than 500 in three

successive Tests. England's chase then got off to a disastrous start when captain Alastair Cook fell for a golden duck, the first of his 100-Test career, from the first ball of their second innings.

Cook, clean-bowled by a beauty from Ryan Harris, also became the first player to suffer the ignominy of a firstball duck in their centenary match.

Fellow opener Michael Carberry again looked solid, but was trapped lbw by Shane Watson for 31, while Joe Root defended grimly for 125 minutes before being caught behind off Mitchell Johnson for 19.

Bowling ban on Shillingford

West Indies spinner Shane Shillingford has been banned from bowling at international level after tests found his action illegal, the International Cricket Council (ICC) said Monday.

An independent biomechanical analysis showed Shillingford's elbow extended beyond the permitted 15 degrees on his standard off-break delivery and his doosra, the ICC said in a statement.

"He is suspended from bowling in international cricket until such time that he has submitted to a fresh analysis, which concludes that he has remedied his bowling action," it said.

Shillingford's teammate, Marlon Samuels, was subjected to similar tests, which showed his standard off-break was legal but his quicker delivery was not, meaning he can only

bowl his slower ball in international matches. The actions of the West Indies pair were reported during their team's second Test against India in Mumbai last

month. The ICC ordered them to undergo independent testing which was conducted in Australia while the players partici-

pated in the West Indies' first two Tests in New Zealand. Both players have previously been banned from bowling because of illegal actions.

Samuels did not bowl for three years after first being reported in 2008, while Shillingford was banned in 2010 and returned a year later after undergoing remedial work on his action. The ICC said if Samuels was reported again for a suspect

action in the next two years and analysis backed up the concerns, he would face an automatic one-year ban. There was no immediate reaction from the West Indies.

The ICC said both players had the right to appeal. gling in the mortal remains The West Indies' third and final Test against New Zealand begins in Hamilton on Thursday. They trail the
