# N. Korea purge sparked by mineral disputes

The shock purge and execution of the North Korean leader's uncle stemmed from his attempts to take control of the country's lucrative coal export business, South Korea's spy chief told lawmakers yesterday.

Jang Song-Thaek, the once-powerful uncle and political regent to young leader Kim Jong-Un, was executed on December 12 on charges which included plotting a coup and corruption.

The execution -- the biggest political upheaval since Kim took power two years ago -sparked speculation that Jang had lost out in a power struggle with hardline army generals.

But Nam Jae-Joon, the head of South Korea's National Intelligence Service, said Jang's attempts to secure control of state-run natural resources businesses played a big part in his downfall.

Nam, briefing members of parliament's intelligence committee on the situation in the North, also said the young ruler currently "appears to have no problem" in his grip on power -- but may stage armed provocations against the South sometime between January and March to rally domestic unity.

### Losses pile up for fish farmers

Before the beginning of a new shrimp season, farmers have to keep their enclosures dried for 25 to 30 days so that they can mix lime, insecticide and fertilisers in the soil of the enclosure

Besides the drop in prices, the ongoing political turmoil has struck a further blow to the cultivators as the prices of input materials such as fish feed and fries have shot up as well.

As a result, farmers now would have to invest more than usual, said Monirul Islam.

He also said the economy and livelihoods of the people of Satkhira largely depend on shrimp and fish culture. Repeated blockades over the past one month had already taken a heavy toll on this sector. And if this situation continues for another month, overall shrimp production will significantly decrease and so will the export earnings from this sector.

Large size tilapia is now being sold at around Tk 50/kg which is sold at Tk 75 in normal times and the medium ones at Tk 30/kg against the usual rate of Tk 50. The current price of common carp weighing over a kilogramme is Tk 90/kg which is normally sold at Tk 145/kg. Large size seabass, catfish and mullets are also being sold at

Taka 70-80 less than their usual rates. Taking advantage of the situation, certain varieties of fish like catfish, mullet and seabass are being smuggled to India, alleged some local

The cultivators of Satkhira were mostly satisfied with white fish production this year and expected good returns.

The reality, however, poured cold water on their hopes.

"I released 30 maunds of fries of different varieties of white fish in my enclosure at the beginning of the monsoon and, in return, I got around 100 maunds of fish. Due to low price, can hardly get my investment returned," said Mir Jahangir Alam of Kashibati village in Kaliganj.

"Despite low prices, I'll have to catch all the white fish soon so that I can start preparing my enclosures for the new season," said another fish producer Abdul Jabbar of Gazirhat village in Debhata Upazila of Satkhira. The buyers too have hardly anything to do

regarding the prices as they themselves incur losses due to the political deadlock.

Robin Kumar Sarker, who purchases white fish from local markets in Satkhira and sells those in Sylhet, said he used to send a truckload of white fish to Sylhet earlier, but now he does not do that due to the blockades.

"Earlier I had to pay Tk 30,000 as truck fare to Sylhet but now truckers charge Tk 80,000 for the trip," he said.

## AAP set to take over

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Almost all of the candidates of the AAP were political novices, including a rickshaw driver, a lawyer and a TV actor. Their key pledge was to clean up politics and the endemic graft that has crippled the provision of public service for the many millions who cannot afford to pay for private healthcare, schooling or basics such as water.

The party's message and symbol – a broom – proved popular with urban voters also struggling with runaway inflation, chronic youth underemployment and slowing economic growth. Kerjiwal, who called the party's victory a

"historic win", said initially he would not form a minority government. But after lengthy negotiations in recent days, the Congress party decided to support the AAP in the Delhi local assembly. "It's a great day, a very exciting time," said Aathishi Marlena, a senior AAP activist and policy adviser.

Marlena said the challenges were daunting but that the party would meet them. "Tackling the rampant corruption, the lack of transparency and accountability, the problems faced by the common people is a matter of political will and that's what we bring to this," Marlena said.

The main opposition Bharatiya Janata (BJP) party won 32 seats but no other political group was willing to offer it support.

Sachin Pilot, a Congress minister, described the emergence of the AAP in Delhi as "absolutely astonishing". He said: "For my party of course it has been a setback but generally speaking the fact that individuals can come together in a very difficult space and find themselves relevant and meaningful has been a new phenomenon. In the past three or four decades it hasn't happened at all. That's something one

has to recognise reconcile and then deal with."

Senior Congress officials said the party's support for the AAP would not be unconditional and would depend on its performance.

Though India's population remains largely rural, the proportion of seats in the national assembly determined by urban voters has steadily risen in recent years. Some analysts see the new middle classes in cities and, particularly, tens of thousands of small towns as determining what is likely to be a tough battle between the Congress party and the BJP in national polls next spring. Also likely to crucial are between 120 million and 150 million firsttime voters.

The AAP has said it now wants to focus efforts on expanding into the huge northern state of Uttar Pradesh, which has a population of 180 million, and Bihar, another poor northern state. It hopes eventually to become a national party.

Kejriwal's announcement ended two weeks of speculation and fears of a hung assembly in Delhi, a city that has become richer in recent years but has huge problems of crime, sanitation, housing and pollution. Though the outgoing Congress government

in Delhi had been praised for successfully building a metro system and holding the Commonwealth Games in the Indian capital in 2010, it had also been hit by graft charges and suffered from the general unpopularity of the Congress-led coalition government at a national level.

The new government will be sworn in on Thursday. The BJP called the AAP's decision a betrayal. "The AAP accused the Congress of being the most corrupt. Today they have compromised on their principles. This is gross betrayal," said Harsh Vardhan, the BJP's chief ministerial candidate.

### 7 bomb makers

He, however, did not disclose the names o Shibir and Chhatra Dal leaders.

According to the Police Headquarters, around 1,617 crude bombs were blasted and 386 were recovered from different places across the country only in first 18 days of this month.

On December 20 and 21, Rapid Action Battalion recovered 132 crude bombs and huge bomb-making materials from the Geneva Camp in the capital's Mohammadpur.

### 3 BRTC buses

In Noakhali, blockaders attacked an air conditioned BRTC bus at Maijdee Bazar around 10:00am, putting barricades on the road. They also broke glasses of the bus by throwing brick chips, witnesses said. Starting from Sonapur depot in the town, the bus was heading towards Dhaka.

Police escorting the bus fired around 40 bullets from shotguns and shot several teargas shells to disperse the marauding pro-blockade activists.

Nurul Amin Khan, president of Jatiyatabadi Chhatra Dal (JCD) district unit, claimed that at least 10 activists of the BNP and JCD had suffered bullet injuries in the firing.

Police demanded brick chips thrown by the blockaders also hurt one of their fellow personnel. Anisur Rahman, superintendent of police in Noakhali, said JCD activists had attacked the bus, and hurled brick chips at them, prompting them to fire in retaliation.

Later, police conducted a raid in the area, and picked up five people, suspecting their involvement in the attack.

In Bogra, blockaders threw two petrol bombs at two BRTC buses parked in front of a bus depot near Shatmatha area in the town around 10:00am. The buses were bound for Banglabandha and Joypurhat respectively.

Police and witnesses said one of the bombs went off, and gutted a seat of a bus. The law enforcers doused the fire. The other bomb did not explode.

Police shot at least seven rubber bullets to disperse the attackers. The blockaders then blasted crude bombs to create panic in the area.

Assistant Superintendent of Police (Sadar) of Bogra, Gaziur Rahman, said two blockaders were arrested from the surrounding area with phensidyl and machetes in connection with the attack.

found in the DNA of modern birds, she believes scientists may be able to "design" genomes of the prehistoric creatures. The theory echoes the plot of Jurassic Park,

but comes after a recent attempt to bring back the animals using techniques more faithful to those used in the 1993 film failed. The Steven Spielberg production saw geneti-

cists recreate dinosaurs using DNA recovered from bloodsucking insects which had been caught in sticky tree sap before it turned to amber. However Dr Woollard, from Oxford University's

Department of Biochemistry, has suggested the feat could be achieved by "de-evolving" birds. "In theory we could use our knowledge of the genetic relationship of birds to dinosaurs to

'design' the genome of a dinosaur," she said. However, despite the theoretical possibility, there are practical obstacles and ethical questions that cannot be ignored.

Even if surviving dinosaur DNA was uncov ered, it would be found in very short fragments. To make a full genome, scientists would have to combine together millions of short fragments

of nucleic acids in exactly the right order. The Royal Institution's 'Life Fantastic' Christmas Lectures, presented by Dr Woollard, will appear on BBC Four on December 28, and 30 at 8:00 pm.
