Christmas Day as the boat, which had been intercepted by police, was "being towed into dock" at

Providenciales, the government of the British territory said in a statement.

## Cambodian garment workers join protests

AFP, Phnom Penh Thousands of Cambodian garment workers yesterday joined anti-government protests demanding that Prime Minister Hun Sen step down and call a new election.

The opposition had urged the textile industry's vast workforce to join its daily rallies in the capital against Hun Sen, and the workers' participation is a boost to efforts to challenge the long-ruling strongman.

### Over 90 migrants rescued off Greece

The Greek coastguard has rescued more than 90 migrants sailing off the south of the country after their boat ran into trouble in bad weather, a spokeswoman said yesterday.

The boat first encountered difficulties late on Monday and the rescue operation was completed on Wednesday. All the migrants are doing well according to the coastguard. Their nationalities have not been released.

### 40 civilians killed in DR Congo attack

At least 40 civilians have been killed in an attack on a village in the restive east of the Democratic Republic of Congo, a non-governmental organisation said yesterday.

The attack took place in the town of Kamango before dawn, with the civil society blaming it on the Islamist Ugandan rebel group ADF-Nalu.

## 2 tourists found dead in Nepal hotel

Two Italians tourists visiting Nepal were found dead in their hotel room, which was locked from inside, in the capital Kathmandu on Christmas Eve in unexplained circumstances, police said yesterday.

The couple arrived in Nepal on December 11 and had told the hotel owner they visited the Himalayan nation every year, the officer said.

## NEWSIN DRONE STRIKES brief Pakistan to raise issue at UNHRC

Pakistan yesterday said it would raise the issue of US drone strikes inside its territory at the United Nations Human Rights Council.

"We will go to the United Nations Human Rights Council (UNHRC) in Geneva if the drone strikes continue" Tasneem Aslam, the spokeswoman for the ministry of foreign affairs said in a weekly news conference. The UN General Assembly passed a resolution on

December 18 2013 calling on states using drone strikes as a counter-terrorism measure to comply with their obligations under international law and the UN Charter. But in the latest US missile strike after the UN resolution.

at least three people were killed late on Wednesday night in Miranshah in Pakistan's northwestern tribal district of North Waziristan, which borders Afghanistan. Pakistan's foreign ministry condemned the fresh attack,

terming it a violation of Pakistan's sovereignty and territorial integrity. Ties between the US and Pakistan have been seriously strained

## Pleas for peace amid fear of civil war

Heavy fighting was raging in South Sudan's key oil-producing north yesterday, officials said, although neighbours Kenya and Ethiopia said they had made "good progress" in efforts to broker an end to the civil war.

Fears that a new civil war could erupt in South Sudan drove leaders of two neighboring African countries into its capital yesterday.

Army spokesman Philip Aguer said troops loyal to President Salva Kiir were battling forces allied to former vice president Riek Machar inside the town of Malakal, capital of Upper Nile state. He also said troops were

preparing an offensive against Bentiu, the main town in oil-rich Unity State,

to follow on from their recapture of Bor, another state capital that had fallen into rebel hands during the nearly two weeks of clashes in the world' youngest nation.

The violence in South Sudan, a fledgling oil producer which won independence from Sudan just two years ago, has left thousands dead, according to the United Nations. Ten of thousands of civilians have also

sought protection at UN bases amid a wave of ethnic violence pitting members of Kiir's Dinka tribe against Machar's Nuer.

The UN Security Council voted Tuesday

to send nearly 6,000 extra soldiers and police to South Sudan, nearly doubling the UNMISS force to 12,500 troops and 1,323 civilian police. Amid reports of bodies piled in mass

graves and witness testimonies of massacres and summary executions and rapes, UN Secretary General Ban Ki-moon has promised those responsible would be "held accountable".

The UN said aid agencies need \$166 million (121 million euros) over the next three months to distribute food, manage camps for the displaced and provide health and sanitation.

Kenyan President Uhuru Kenyatta and Ethiopia's Prime Minister Hailemariam Desalegn flew into Juba on Thursday for talks with

brokers who have flown in since the fighting began on December 15. The fighting started after Kiir accused Machar of attempting a coup. Machar denied this, and said the president was

President Kiir, the latest in a line of peace

exploiting a clash between members of the army as a pretext to carry out a purge. Although Kiir and Machar -- a former

vice president who was sacked in July -have said they are open to peace talks, fighting has spread to half of the country's 10 states.

# girls in India!

A village council in Bihar has banned the use of mobile phones by unmarried girls, said a council member on Wednesday.

The decision was taken on Tuesday evening at a meeting of Somgarh panchayat (council) in West Champaran district.

The panchayat also threatened to impose heavy fine on the girls' families if they violated the diktat, said Zakir Ansari, husband of the village council head.

"Decision was taken with approval of hundreds of villagers," said Ansari who works as the de facto head.

He said all families have been told to ensure that the decision is not violated.

However, Bihar Panchayati Raj Minister Bhim Singh said that a panchayat has no right to impose ban on the use of mobile phones by girls or prevent them from keeping mobile phones.

## Arafat died of natural causes Says Russian experts; Swiss expert dismisses claim

Yasser Arafat died of natural causes, not radiation poisoning, Russian scientists who examined his remains said yesterday, but their findings were dismissed by Swiss experts as politically motivated. The conclusions into the Palestinian

leader's 2004 death dovetail with the findings of French investigators but differ from those of Swiss radiation

experts who maintain he could have been poisoned. "We have completed all

the studies," Vladimir Uiba, head of Russia's Federal Medical-Biological Agency, told reporters. "The person died a natural

death and not from radiation.'

The Palestinians have long suspected that Arafat was poisoned, with some pointing the finger directly at Israel.

Uiba said that his agency had not received any requests from the Palestinians to conduct a repeat examination.

"We've completed an expert evaluation, and everyone agreed with us. Moreover, even the Swiss withdrew their statements and agreed, and the French confirmed our conclusions," Uiba told reporters in comments confirmed by his spokesman.

The director of the Lausanne Radiophysics Institute who examined the samples of Arafat's remains, immediately

took issue with Uiba's statement, saying the position of the Swiss experts had remained the same. "Our point of view has not changed,

Alexander Vlasov, the spokesman for the Federal Medical-Biological Agency, told AFP the Russian experts had been tasked by the foreign ministry to carry out the investigation for the Palestinian authorities.

He said it was up to the Palestinians to publish the report.

## Israel to free Palestinians, build more settlements

Israel will announce plans for new settlement construction next week, coinciding with the release of a third batch of Palestinian prisoners as part of peace talks, an official said yesterday.

Palestinians have warned repeatedly that settlement building destroys the fragile US-brokered peace talks that resumed in July after a three-year hiatus. Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu had vowed to push

ahead with settlement construction despite calls for restraint by US Secretary of State John Kerry and the European Union. Kerry, who has been fighting for the survival of the peace

talks, urged Netanyahu earlier this month "to exercise

maximum restraint in announcing new construction" Haaretz daily has reported. Israel is due to release 26 Palestinian prisoners on Sunday, in line with commitments to the US-backed peace process which also called on both sides to negotiate for nine

months. Israel agreed to free 104 Palestinian prisoners and has already released 52 in two separate batches. A third group is to be freed on December 29 and the last inmates are to walk free in March 2014.

Maariv daily quoted an unnamed top official as saying Netanyahu had initially agreed to US and EU appeals to delay by two to three weeks the announcement of the new constructions, but changed his mind under pressure from his coalition partners so as not to send out a "signal of weakness".
