Voters in fear of violence

Many undecided on going to polling centre

With only one day left, voters in many constituencies are still undecided about exercising their franchise in tomorrow's tenth parliamentary polls in fear of possible violence.

A significant number of unhappy electorates, on the other side, have found it meaningless to go to polls centres as 153 candidates have been elected unopposed. Many others however said they would exercise their voting rights.

As electioneering ended at 8:00am yesterday, people in many constituencies missed the usual festivity and polls-time atmosphere as the battle of ballots is going to be limited within the ruling Awami League and some of its allies.

This scenario and voters' opinions were derived during visits to a number of constituencies in the capital and some other districts yesterday. Talking to The Daily Star, many grassroots level AL leaders have also given a similar picture about people's lack of interest in casting

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Illegal Workers in Saudi Arabia

Amnesty extended by 2 more months

Several hundred Bangladeshi expatriates in Saudi Arabia will be able to correct their legal status as the Saudi government has declared another two-month grace period for thousands of illegal foreign workers.

The extended amnesty will help the foreign workers, who could not correct their legal status during the seven-month amnesty period ended on November 3, complete the rectification procedures.

"Interior Minister Prince Muhammad bin Naif has ordered to complete correction procedures of expatriates whose papers were being processed by the labour ministry during the amnesty before March 1," said general of Saudi passport department.

The new system came into effect on January 2, reported Saudi-based English daily Arab News yesterday.

"Only 2,000 to 3,000 Bangladeshis might have been left out of the last amnesty for not possessing valid documents. We are now working with the Saudi labour ministry to complete their legalisation process,' Shahidul Islam, Bangladesh ambassador in Saudi Arabia, told The Daily Star on Wednesday.

More than 7 lakh Bangladeshis had already taken advantage of the last sevenmonth amnesty, said Shahidul.

Over 12 lakh Bangladeshi expatriates are currently working in Saudi Arabia.

Earlier, the Saudi government Maj Gen Suleiman Al-Yahya, director announced a three-month amnesty in April SEE PAGE 10 COL 3

"Obviously, that's what we're encouraging, and we'll keep monitoring the situation and engaging as necessary," Marie Harf, deputy spokesperson of US State Department, told a press briefing in Washington DC.

AL, lawmen wary of violence in 12 dists

: Awami League nominated candidates and law enforcement agencies fear Jamaat-e-Islami and Islami Chhatra Shibir might unleash violence in more than 12 districts to foil tomorrow's elections.

Bogra, Satkhira, Chapainawabganj, Joypurhat, Gaibandha, Lalmonirhat, Kurigram, Chittagong, Laxmipur, Feni, Dinajpur and Cox's Bazar have been on the receiving end of Jamaat-Shibir terror since February : last year.

The districts, considered BNP-Jamaat strongholds, have been witness to · attacks on police, minority communities, freedom fighters, journalists, AL : nominated candidates and party men and their homes and businesses.

Dozens of people have been killed in the attacks.

Many believe the opposition, which is boycotting the polls and threat-· ened to resist it, called the 48-hour hartal, while a countrywide blockade programme was still on, to instigate fresh violence centring the elections.

With this in mind, law enforcement agencies would deploy a four-tier · security system in those districts and constituencies during the election, : intelligence sources said.

Manmohan rules out another term

Backs Rahul as successor

Indian Prime Minister Manmohan Singh yesterday ruled out serving another term after general elections due by May and threw his support behind Rahul Gandhi to lead the country if their party wins the vote.

Addressing a rare press conference at the National Media Centre in New Delhi, he said, BJP's prime ministerial candidate Narendra Modi would prove to be "disastrous" for India if he were to become the premier.

"Without discussing the merits of Narendra Modi, I sincerely believe that it will be disastrous for the country to have Modi as the PM," Manmohan, who has been India's PM for the last ten years, said.

He said he was fully confident that the next prime minister, after the Lok Sabha election, will also be from the Congress-led UPA coalition.





"In a few months' time, after the general election, I will hand the baton over to a new prime minister," Manmohan told the press conference, his third during a ten-year tenure.

During his 70-minute media conference, the premier answered questions on a range of issues including corruption, inflation, economy and internal political situation.


Manmohan said he hoped his successor would be one chosen by the current coalition and added that Congress Vice President

4 workers killed in unrest

Cambodian military police yesterday opened fire with assault rifles to quell a protest by stone-throwing garment factory workers demanding higher pay in a crackdown a human rights group said killed four people.

Chaos during nationwide strikes erupted for a second day as security forces were deployed to halt a demonstration by thousands of workers, who refused to move and threw bottles, stones and petrol bombs at an industrial zone in Phnom Penh.
