## Justice Khairul defends scrapping of caretaker system

Former chief justice ABM Khairul Haque yesterday defended the cancellation of the caretaker government system which critics say has given birth to the current political crisis marked by violence, a one-sided election, and persecution of minorities.

Justice Khairul was in office when the Supreme Court declared the system illegal and scrapped the 13th amendment to the constitution in May 2011. The provision of the caretaker government, which is led by non-political people, was included into the constitution through that amendment in 1996.

"We [SC judges] were bound to cancel the 13th amendment, as the constitution and law don't allow absence of sovereignty of the country's people for a single moment," said Justice Khairul, adding that the rule of people was absent during the caretaker regime.

The appellate division headed by Justice Khairul declared the 13th amendment illegal and unconstitutional on May 10, 2011, but observed that the 10th and 11th parliamentary elections might be held under the "illegal" caretaker government.

Khairul, now chairman of the Law Commission, was talking to reporters at the capital's Judicial Administration Training Institute following a discussion on Law Commission's draft recommendations for enacting an anti-discriminatory law.

The former chief justice was asked for an explanation about the pro-opposition people's claim that the political situation has become violent due to cancellation of the interim government system, reinstatement of which is the main demand of the BNP.

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## Protests against minority repression sweep country

Waves of protest by different socio-political, cultural and professional bodies swept over the country yesterday with the demand for stern action against the people who attacked Hindus in different regions during and after the January 5 national election.

DHAKA

The Bangladesh Federal Union of Journalists (BFUJ) demanded due compensation to the victimised families from a protest rally in front of the capital's Jatiya Press Club.

BFUJ President Monjurul Ahsan Bulbul said the nation had failed to protect the minorities and the entire nation had to take its responsibility.

Speakers at the rally compared the barbaric attacks with that carried out by the Pakistani army and its local collaborators in 1971.

Terming the attacks as crimes against humanity, they demanded a ban on all communal organisations, including Jamaat-e-Islami and Islami Chhatra Shibir, immediately.

Sampradayikota Birodh Sangbadik Mancha and Karmajibi Nari denounced the attacks through separate human chains in front of Jatiya

Press Club.

A civil society body, "Sampradayik Sohingsotar Protirodhe Bikhuddho Janata", headed by rights activist Khusi Kabir asked why the government and Election Commission, despite being aware of vulnerability of Hindus, could not protect them from the post-election persecution.

At a press conference at Dhaka Reporters Unity, it asked for an explanation about why law enforcers were not present at the scenes during the attacks. The organisation demanded banning of communal and religion-based politics through an executive order.

Manusher Jonno Foundation and associate bodies issued a press statement calling upon the progressive forces to stand united against such violence. The organisation will send aid to the affected areas.

Writers, artists, teachers, students, labourers, professionals, cultural and political activists gathered in front of the National Museum, demanding a neutral and acceptable inquiry into the attacks. They also urged creation of a specialised law enforcement agency to resist communal

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Muhith to propose banning of hartal by parliament

Finance Minister AMA Muhith yesterday said he would propose in the next parliament to enact a law banning hartal to save people's lives and the economy.

"Hartal should be banned. Whoever calls hartal now becomes violent, and a violent protest is unacceptable in no way," he told reporters after a meeting with a team of the Real Estate and Housing Association of Bangladesh (REHAB) at his office.

About Jamaat-e-Islami, the minister said he would not take any proposal to ban Jamaat but said Jamaat should be declared a terrorist party. "Jamaat also attacked my house in Sylhet", said the veteran Awami League leader.

The minister said the first challenge of the next government was to restore law and order. No development is possible if law and order cannot be maintained, he said.

Asked whether he will continue as the finance minister, Muhith said the prime minister would decide it. "If she nominates someone, few people could turn her down."

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
