India's river linking to harm Bangladesh

Warn environmentalists again, ask govt to be vocal STAFF CORRESPONDENT

India's inter-river linking project will diminish the water flow in Bangladesh's two major rivers, the Padma and the Jamuna, harming the country's environment and economy, environmentalists said yesterday.

India initially plans to link the Ken-Betwa rivers in Madhya Pradesh, which will reduce the flow of the Ganges, they told a press conference organised by Bangladesh Poribesh Andolon (Bapa) and Bangladesh Environment Network (BEN) at Dhaka Reporters Unity.

In February 2012, the Indian Supreme Court gave the go-ahead to the project that

aims to link 30 major rivers through canals and withdraw water from the Ganges and Brahmaputra rivers and to flow it to India's arid states.

On January 2 this year, India's cabinet was set to approve the Ken-Betwa linking, according to The Times of India. But the Congressled government did not do that because of its decreasing popularity, Bapa General Secretary MA Matin told The Daily Star.

He said, "Fearing that the linking would disturb the ecological balance, there was a

"Barriers will come but one should not lose courage...Unless we change ourselves, society will not change...We have to continue our fight," said the schoolteacher.

Joya said the government recognition of the Hijra community would not solve all the problems they have been facing throughout their lives.

"We are humans too. We are also citizens of the state. Why are we looked down upon," Joya said adding, "However, time has come for us to speak out."
