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# Get businesses back on track

*Top entrepreneurs ask commerce minister for initiatives*

Top business leaders, hit hard by months of political unrest, have sought government support to make up for their huge losses.

A delegation of around 200 businesspeople from different sectors made the call at a view-exchange meeting with the new commerce minister, Tofail Ahmed, at Ruposhi Bangla Hotel in the capital yesterday.

They urged the government to provide them with financial incentives and policy support, as they go about rebuilding their businesses after a spate of political violence.

"2013 was an unlucky year for Bangladesh. We want to turn things around in 2014," said Atiqul Islam, president of Bangladesh Garment Manufacturers and Exporters Association.

Last year, the country lost 71 days to shutdowns and blockades, up from an average of 46 days a year since 1991.

Apex Group Chairman Syed Manzur Elahi said the country's image has been severely damaged due to political turmoil over the last six months.

There has been a "credibility gap" between foreign buyers and local exporters following negative reports on Bangladesh in the global media, especially in The New York Times.

The business leaders called for forming a special taskforce that would work to rebuild the nation's image with a slogan "Bangladesh is back in business".

"We have to sell our country first by improving the image and then our commodities," Elahi added.

More than Tk 1 lakh crore is lying idle in the banking sector, as political instability held entrepreneurs back from making new investments last year, said AK Azad, ex-president of the Federation of Bangladesh Chambers of Commerce and Industry.

He urged the government to immediately improve gas and power supply, complete the construction of two additional lanes on the Dhaka-Chittagong highway and

# Spearheaded by Jamaat

Two pairs of brothers, all involved in Jamaat-Shibir politics, spearheaded the January 5 attack on the Malopara Hindu community, with two locally influential Jamaat leaders allegedly pulling the strings.

Mahfuzur Rahman and Mahmudur Rahman, sons of Avaynagar Upazila Jamaat Ameer Maulana Abdul Aziz, pounced on Hindus from the Chengutia Bazar side of Malopara with a gang of 40 to 50 cadres riding three nosimons (human hauliers).

Two diehard Jamaat members -- Badrul and his

brother Quader -- led another team from another side. They were assisted by two BNP activists, Qashem and Kibria.

Another group came by a trawler through the river Bhairab flowing by Malopara, a village mostly inhabited by fishermen, under Avaynagar upazila, Jessore.

After the polling closed, the duo spread a rumour that Hindus had killed a Shibir activist named Abu Bakar.

# Emergency declared in Thai capital

Thailand yesterday declared a 60-day state of emergency in Bangkok and surrounding areas to tackle mass protests aimed at overthrowing the government, but ruled out using force to end the rallies.

The last time a state of emergency was imposed in Bangkok, to deal with opposition protests against the previous govern-

ments that have paralysed parts of the capital and sparked several bouts of deadly violence, including grenade attacks and shootings.

The move follows weeks of mass demon-


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## MANPOWER CHEATING
