Sri Lanka arrive to subdued reception

Sri Lanka's 15-member squad, which arrived in Dhaka yesterday, witnessed a slightly quieter reception as compared to previous international series in Bangladesh.

Day 1 of any tour in the past traditionally saw a feisty interaction between the media and the visiting team at the airport, which then paved the way for an exciting start to the contest.

The tradition was not followed yesterday afternoon as the Sri Lanka contingent boarded their bus just minutes after landing.

There were several other changes made by the logistics department. Unlike touring teams of the past, Sri

Lanka will be staying at the Radisson Blu Water Garden Hotel. While it may have led to a rise in the room charges, it was a cautious plan by the board to keep the team as close to Mirpur's Sher-e-Bangla National Stadium as possible due to the security fears that dominated the build-up to the tour.

The inaugural press meet was instead replaced with a video file sent from the Bangladesh Cricket Board which quoted Sri Lanka's fielding coach, Ruwan Kalpage.

In the minute-long press briefer, Kalpage expressed his confidence.

"We definitely want to win the series. We played good cricket in the last tour against Pakistan (in the U.A.E) and we are looking forward to do our best in Bangladesh," said Kalpage.

Sri Lanka drew the last Test series

against Pakistan in the UAE, which saw the latter emphatically gun-down 302 runs in the last day of the third and final Test.

The scenario in Bangladesh however, will be different. The visitors do not have much time to adjust to the conditions here as the first Test begins on Sunday at Mirpur and it is something that Kalpage is aware of.

"Bangladesh have got the home advantage. The wickets and conditions will obviously suit the home team. But we are looking forward to the challenge and we will do well," said Kalpage.

Their first opportunity to get a feel for the conditions, will be today morning when they attend their first practice session at Mirpur. Their practice session will be followed by the Bangladesh team taking the field in the afternoon.

'BCB decision a death warrant'

Former Bangladesh Cricket Board (BCB) president Saber Hossain Chowdhury, in a letter to current BCB boss Nazmul Hassan Papon, entreated the governing body to reverse its decision of backing the draft proposal put forward by the Indian, English and Australian cricket boards. We have printed the letter in its entirety.

Dear Mr. President:

As a former president of Bangladesh Cricket Board and presently a member of Bangladesh Cricket Board's general council and last but not least as a fellow Parliamentarian, I am aghast and deeply disappointed at the apparent decision of BCB board of directors to endorse a plan/proposal of three Full Members of ICC.

This decision is tantamount to signing the death warrant for Bangladesh cricket.

We have worked hard and persevered for decades to achieve Test Status and Full Membership of the ICC and we historically did so on 26th June 2000. This was a crowning moment for not just Bangladesh cricket but for the entire nation and people of Bangladesh. Bangladesh Cricket Board was honoured and recognised with the country's highest national award --Independence Day Award -- for this outstanding achievement.

All of the functions and activities of the BCB are geared towards participating and competing at the highest level of world cricket and is essentially the raison d'etre for the Board's existence.

I read your comments about ego and reality but do not feel these can ever take precedence and priority over national interest and principles. There is more to life and responsibility than meekly surrendering and being subservient to powers that be.

We had the courage and self belief to seek and achieve Test Status but now sadly lack the conviction and leadership to defend it. Mere shortterm financial benefit cannot surely

be at the expense of the very survival of cricket but this evidently is precisely what the board of directors have voted for.

We now stand to lose all that we have so proudly achieved and this is simply not acceptable. I am sorry and sad to say that that the decision of the BCB board of directors is not in the interest of Bangladesh cricket and is also in conflict with our national interest. As the custodian of Bangladesh cricket, BCB cannot



preside over its demise and be its de facto executioner.

Whilst I applaud the courage and the wisdom of a few directors to vote against the proposal, I question too the rationale to put the matter to vote. Surely by so doing and having the endorsement of the Board to support the plan, you have in effect tied your hands and now have no moral or institutional standing to oppose it during the upcoming ICC Board Meeting.

I question too the jurisdiction of the board of directors to decide on an issue of such momentous implications.

If in your shoes, I would have referred the matter to an emergency meeting of the BCB general council, which as per the constitution imposed by the NSC, is the apex organisational tier of the BCB and I would also have discussed the matter with NSC and sought the government's views on the matter. Such a consultative process and approach would only have strengthened your hand and given you more options for the upcoming meeting.

Plan of the three full members to re-structure world cricket, concentrate power in the few and create second-class cricket citizens with regard to Bangladesh and Zimbabwe is repugnant to the letter and spirit of ICC's constitution and the vision of growing the game globally. We must have the courage to oppose it and stand up and be counted. If you need my support or that of former presidents, I am sure we will only be too pleased to help as best we can and stand firmly by your side and try to rally the other six full members of the ICC as well.

I would urge you to review and reverse the decision of the board of directors and to oppose in the strongest possible terms the plan of the three full members. You will be failing in your responsibility as President if you fail to correct this. BCB will also have failed in its duties as the custodian and representative of our cricket.

Like many openers in Bangladesh, Imrul Kayes too lost his way in international cricket after making a place in the arena. A few years ago Imrul had scored the maxi-

mum runs in ODI cricket in a calendar year for Bangladesh. And with Tamim Iqbal at the other end, the management had thought that they had finally solved the opening conundrum.

Years later, the problem still persists and here's Imrul yet again with an opportunity to redeem himself. The left-hander, who last played a Test back in October 2011, believes that he is 'mentally stronger' on his return.

"I worked really hard in the last two years, so yes I was really happy to get the national call. But this time, I really need to maintain my position," said Imrul after a training session in the morning yesterday.

"I made a few adjustments with my batting technique and I feel a lot more

comfortable. But honestly it's the mental gain that I think has helped me make the

"Everyone goes through a hard phase in life and for me that phase took place when I was outside the team. But I worked hard and tried to make the most of whatever opportunity I got. That's what helped me become stronger mentally," said Imrul.

He felt that missing out on Bangladesh's emphatic series win against New Zealand last year compelled him to try harder. Imrul's hard work did pay off as it was his

performance in this year's Dhaka Premier League (655 runs at 43.66) that played an important role in his selection.

"I think the DPL helped me out quite a bit. I played that with a target to come back into the side," said Imrul. And while his first-class record in the last two years is not as impressive -- he averages 37 in the last 12 matches -- he hopes his new-found mental strength can help him make an impact.

As he himself put it, "I always told myself that if I do manage to come back, I will make

In the shadows of doubt

The dominant feeling among cricket lovers was one of sadness that the dream of one day becoming a force in Test cricket was slipping away. The Big Three's controversial draft

proposal has been at the centre of discussion in the country's cricket circle for the last few days but a shockwave ran through the cricket community after the disclosure that the Bangladesh Cricket Board (BCB) directors voted 20-3 in favour of supporting the draft proposal. The question that was on everyone's lips was: Why has the BCB taken this suicidal stance?

Frustration, anger and sadness dominated discussions in every nook and cranny. Why had even three former captains-turnedboard directors voted in favour of this controversial proposal? Many directors however unofficially tried to explain their position but their explanations only echoed the sentiment that emerged from their board president Nazmul Hassan Papon's official press conference on Thursday.

It was doubtless most frustrating for the to media players; the main stakeholders. But they were not in a position to comment on the issue. With the challenge in hand against Sri Lanka, the Tigers will be well advised to keep away from thinking about their Test future but that is easier said than done when there is a fear that if the proposal gets the nod in the next ICC meeting on 28-29 January it will bring about a massive upheaval in Bangladesh cricket.

Coach Shane Jurgensen however gave an impression of how this burning issue was playing a part ahead of the challenge of the coming series.

"I know we are not supposed to comment on this. Some of the guys have been talking about it. From a coaching perspective, we had a group chat in the morning today and decided to keep our focus on cricket. We have been working hard for the last 12 months to win a Test. We have drawn a few and now our aim is to win and we will go for that. All we can do right now is stop worrying about that and play

The Bangladesh Cricket Board (BCB) has noticed reports circulating in the national and international media regarding the Board's position on the draft proposal put forward by a working group of the Finance & Commercial Affairs committee of the International Cricket Council (ICC).

It has been widely suggested in sections of the media that the BCB Board of Directors in a meeting held on 23 January 2014, had adopted a resolution in favour of the proposal which seeks considerable structural changes to the ICC and which if approved, may impact the playing opportunities, finances and positions of full member countries including Bangladesh. The BCB wishes to state that such sentiment is purely speculative and is not consistent with the actual facts.

The directors of the Board have been apprised of the contents of the proposal. After a careful review of the draft the Board has found positive elements in certain sections of it which could be beneficial to the future of Bangladesh cricket. On the other hand, the Board has also expressed strict reservations about some portions of the proposal, especially those with legal and constitutional implications and those which may be interpreted as contrary to the rights of a full member. In respect to the sensitiv-

ity and confidentiality of the matter, the BCB has not made any public disclosure of the outcomes from the discussion related to the draft proposal.

Baridhara, Ctg Abahani win

Even though the maiden victories for Uttar Baridhara and Chittagong Abahani increased their points tally, they stayed in their previous positions of eighth and ninth with five and four points from five outings respectively.

Brothers Union, with three defeats, stay just above Uttar Baridhara with six points while Feni Soccer remain at the bottom with one point from five matches.

Uttar Baridhara produced a much improved performance against Brothers Union, after their getting drubbed 7- at the hands of Team BJMC in their previous match while Brothers had come into the match on the back of two successive wins over Sheikh Russel KC and Chittagong Abahani. Baridhara launched their first attack in the very sixth minute when a drive from Sujan Biswas was gripped by Brothers goalkeeper Sabuj Das Raghu.

Raghu however could not stop a header from Monu's header from a difficult angle on the half-hour mark after Brothers Union saw a curling freekick from Faisal Mahmud come off the word work.
