Its 2003 decision to change the name of its PC brand from Legend to Lenovo in a bid to boost its sales abroad marked the beginning of its ascent to global preeminence.

That move was followed by a successful 2004 bid to serve as the exclusive computing technology provider for the 2006 Turin Winter Olympics and the 2008 Beijing Games, making it the first Chinese firm to become a major Olympic sponsor.

But it was Lenovo's 2005 acquisition of IBM's PC division for \$1.75 billion that cemented its rise, setting it on track to unseat Hewlett-Packard as the world's top PC vendor last year.

Lenovo now has PC products in more than 160 countries and has worked to build its global brand by recruiting celebrities such as basketball star Kobe Bryant and Hollywood actor Ashton Kutcher, who the company named a "product engineer" for its new Yoga Tablet device.

South-South Cooperation is a term historically used by policymakers and academics to describe the exchange of resources, technology, and knowledge between developing countries, also known as countries of the global south.

South-South trades have immense potential due to the shifting of economic, political and social aspects to Asia, said UNDP Country Director Pauline Tamesis.

"Emerging economies are growing, while the growth of developed countries is slowing," said Tamesis, adding that South-South Cooperation is not a substitute of North-South trade, rather it compliments global trade. "The recent economic crisis has shifted the centre of gravity to Asia. Therefore, it is time to strengthen South-South Cooperation," said Finance Minister AMA Muhith.

The minister however stressed the ments, he said. need for strong coordination among the countries to address bottlenecks in cooperation among the nations.

"The real problem in South-South Cooperation is of course, coordination. I believe the development partners can contribute richly in this regard."

State Minister for Finance MA Mannan said Bangladesh is planning to become a mid-income country by 2021 and its cooperation with neighbouring countries of the South and development

partners in the North is vital.

"We believe in South-South Cooperation for better synergies, and we need to increase the effectiveness of both aid and trade in delivering the goals of development in the South."

Referring to Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina's vision to become a developed country by 2041, the state minister said attaining the target is possible if there is political stability and realistic foreign policies. Such cooperation touches many areas,

"Local companies are grabbing the market for light automotive tyres, which depended on imports a decade ago," said Humayun Kabir, a leader of Bangladesh Tyre Merchant's Association.

Local makers have a price advantage over the imported tyres, sellers said. "A locally-made tyre for a pickup or microbus costs 20-30 percent less than an imported tyre," said Mohammad Hannan, owner of a tyre shop in Farmgate in Dhaka.

SM Mojibur Rahman, sales executive at Tyre and Battery Bazar, said locally-made tyres for big buses and trucks have the potential to grab market share if manufacturers can ensure quality. Tyre and Battery Bazar is a dealer of GT Radial and MRF along with local Husain Tyre.

Husain Tyre that started production in 1996 with three-wheeler scooter tyres, now makes more than 10 types, including light ones for small trucks and microbuses.

Importers and sellers said a scarcity of raw materials as an obstacle to producing tyres in Bangladesh. However, the main ingredient, rubber, is now being produced by local cultivators.

The country can export a lot of products to Nigeria, Saudi Arabia and Chile by strengthening the South-South Cooperation, he added.

In another session titled "Upscaling skills and overseas employment", Muhammad Alkama Siddiqui, joint secretary of Economic Relations Division, said the government is working on enhancing skills to boost export of skilled manpower.
