As they did not find Nazrul at home, they hacked his father Safiz Uddin with a machete and beat his mother Nazma and brother Delwar Hossain with rods, said the victims who took first-aid from a local clinic. The agencies face allegations of not renting houses in Saudi Arabia for pilgrims, not purchasing air tickets despite charging them for that, and not providing better food as per contacts.

"After the hearing, we will punish the agencies, charges against which would be proved," Bazlul Haque told The Daily Star last night.

If found guilty, each agency will be fined between Tk 50,000 and Tk 20 lakh, he added. The ministry can also suspend or cancel the licence of the agencies, he said.

In a reply, the official said roughly 176 people had not returned home after performing hajj last year.

Bloggers protest BCL, cops attack on RU students

Around 200 students and teachers under the banner "Jatiya Sharthe Blogger-Online Activist Forum" organised demonstrations in the capital yesterday protesting the police-backed attack of armed Bangladesh Chhatra League men on Rajshahi University (RU) students on Sunday.

During the demonstrations, a rally was organised in Shahbagh and a procession was brought out on the Dhaka University (DU) campus carrying flaming torches expressing solidarity with RU's general students who came under attack while protesting fee hikes and evening master's programmes.

Around 100 RU students and eight journalists were wounded in the attack.

Education is a right of the people not an opportunity available for the middle class only, Bangladesh Students' Union Organising Secretary Lucky Akter said at the demonstrations.

Bangladesh Students' Federation Vice-President Tariqul Sujan said, "The ongoing protests at Rajshahi University were a symbolic challenge against the wholesale privatisation of education.

"It will systematically exclude students who come from lower income families."

BNP top brass gear up to revitalise grassroots

Stress put on Feb 19 upazila polls, upcoming party council

With emphasis on revitalising the grassroots for the next phase of movement to oust the government and to choose single candidates in the February 19 upazila elections, the BNP high-ups will start visiting its 75 organisational districts across the country within three or four days.

The party has formed 44 teams comprising senior and mid-level leaders, including the acting secretary general, for the tours, said officials of the BNP headquarters at the capital's Nayapaltan. The number of teams will increase, if required, they said. The top leaders will talk to the grassroots leaders for backing single candidates in the upazila polls so that the contestants can secure victory smoothly.

Some team leaders said recently that

though their aim was to mobilise the grassroots for the anti-government protest, they deemed upazila polls an "acid test" for both ruling and opposition parties.

The party command has realised that the grassroots are now demoralised because of the January 5 national election boycott, failing to generate any significant results, they told The Daily Star.

If the party-backed aspirants in this major local government election fail to achieve success, it will have negative impact on their mental strength, the senior leaders added.

Similar comments and concerns came from a number of other team leaders but none of them wished to be named, as the party cannot directly nominate anyone for the non-partisan elections.

It will be the party high-ups' second such

CTG ARMS HAUL CASE

BNP rebuts Mohiuddin's claims about Khaleda, Tarique

Different quarters are trying to destroy BNP and the Zia family and turn Bangladesh into a failed state by creating a connection between the party leaders, including Khaleda Zia and Tarique Rahman, and the 10-truck arms haul cases' verdict.

"BNP started the trial during its tenure that led to the verdict. But now, the Awami League (AL) leaders are trying to link the BNP leaders to it (the smuggling)," he said, adding that BNP would foil these attempts with people's help.

He was addressing a press conference BNP Chittagong city unit organised at its Kazir Dewri office protesting AL Chittagong city unit President ABM Mohiuddin Chowdhury's statement at a press conference on Sunday.

Mohiuddin stated that, as the verdict had mentioned, Khaleda, the then prime minister, had remained "silent" even after being informed of the haul by the then director general of the Directorate General of Forces Intelligence.

This silence proved that Khaleda knew about the whole plan and gave clearance, he added.

STRANDED IN IRAQ

14 Bangladeshis continue hunger strike for third day

Demand repatriation

Aggrieved by the government's sheer negligence in dealing with their case, 14 Bangladeshi workers stranded in Iraq for around a year continued their hunger strike for the third day yesterday demanding immediate repatriation.

"We had informed an embassy official, Rubel, that we would go for a hunger strike. But till now the embassy has not even inquired how we were doing," said one of the workers, Shafiqul Islam.

Talking to The Daily Star over phone from an accommodation facility in Najaf, situated 160 kilometers south of Baghdad, he said, "Some of us are already sick and others are becoming weak but we have no alternative."

He said one Haider of their employing company, M Kodia Co General Trading, showed them something that looked like tickets, saying they would all be sent home on February 9, but did not hand those over.

"Our embassy in Baghdad did not say anything about the tickets. So, we decided to

continue the hunger strike," he added.

Twenty seven construction workers went to Iraq between January and February 2013 through four Bangladeshi recruiting agencies -- Morning Sun Enterprise, Meghna Trade International, East Bengal Overseas and Idea International -- spending about Tk 4 lakh each for jobs with a monthly salary of Tk 350.

Their Iraqi employer, however, failed to start its construction project and kept them in the accommodation facility, restricting their movements and making life there seem almost like that inside jails.

Following repeated demonstrations of the workers' relatives in Dhaka, the employer repatriated 11 migrants in November 2013.

Afterwards, two of them fled the facility and their whereabouts are unknown while the trauma has been causing the remaining 14 physical and mental hardships.

Following another demonstration by the returnees and the relatives on January 22, Expatriates' Welfare and Overseas

Man held for using forged govt cheques

Anti-Corruption Commission (ACC) yesterday arrested an alleged ringleader of a gang which, between February and April 2009, misappropriated over Tk 45.67 lakh by opening bank accounts using fake names and address and by forging government-issued land acquisition cheques.

ACC Deputy Assistant Director Nazmus Sadat said an ACC team arrested Khaza Mustafa Kamal near the ACC headquarters in the capital's Segunbagicha around 1:00pm.

Kamal, his nephew Al-Amin Ratan and brother Khalid Zibran Ranju first opened the two accounts, one with One Bank Ltd in the capital's Dilkusha and another with Al-Arafah Islami Bank Ltd in Motijheel, said Nazmus.

They then prepared the two cheques and withdrew the money from the banks claiming to be persons whose land the government had acquired, he added.

Apart from the three, the two cases ACC filed in this connection with Motijheel Police Station in August 2012 accuses four bank officials as they did not properly verify documents the gang produced.

The four are One Bank First Assistant Vice President ATM Shahidullah and Principal Officer AKM Zahirul Islam and Al-Arafah Bank Assistant Officer Moniruzzaman and ex-principal officer Ishaq Mia.
