MANPOWER EXPORT TO 3 ME COUNTRIES

Doors still shut for local touts

Three major labour-importing countries in the Middle East are still reluctant to recruit workers from Bangladesh as they are not happy with "problematic" recruitment process of private recruiting agencies.

These recruiting agencies export manpower with the help of unrecognised middlemen, who are known as "local brokers" or "adam baparis". Both the agencies and the brokers allegedly exploit the jobseekers by charging excessive fees and sometimes providing so-called free visas.

Moreover, these agencies sometimes send workers two times the number required by the employers.

The United Arab Emirates, Saudi Arabia and Kuwait have identified these factors as problematic, according to ambassadors and labour counsellors of Bangladesh missions in those countries.

These labour importing countries have also expressed dissatisfaction over alleged involvement of some Bangladeshi workers in crimes, they told The Daily Star over the phone. Some Bangladeshis are allegedly involved in smuggling, visa forgery, swin-

dling and other crimes, said the ambassadors and counsellors. They recommended that the expatriates' welfare and overseas employment

ministry regulate the recruiting agencies strictly to check any kind of anomaly in recruitment process. Expatriates' Welfare Minister Khandker Mosharraf Hossain also puts the

blame on the recruiting agencies for some irregularities. "Some of our people may get involved in criminal activities when they fail

to cover their migration costs paid to the recruiting agencies. So, we have laid stress on reduction of migration costs at first," he told The Daily Star.

Besides, the recruiting agencies have been asked to set up branch offices at district level to avoid intervention by unrecognised middlemen, the minister said.

"We have been trying to streamline the manpower sector for the sake of our people. We are in continuous discussion with the labour receiving countries for resolving the existing barriers."

3 injured as criminals clash in Ctg

All-party polls must be held immediately

Observes a platform of leading citizens

A participatory parliamentary election must be held immediately since the present government lacks legitimacy for assuming power through an election that was largely uncontested and the voter turnout was low, said eminent citizens at a discussion in the city yesterday.

Salehuddin Ahmed, president of The Dhaka Forum and also former governor of Bangladesh Bank, said the country was at a political and economic crossroads with a government not accountable to the people.

The Dhaka Forum, a newly formed group of retired professionals and senior citizens, organised the "Bangladesh at a crossroads" discussion at The Daily Star Centre.

Presenting the keynote paper, M Serajul Islam, former ambassador and a founding member of the forum, said the 10th parliament could not claim to have any legitimacy since it was formed through an election devoid of voters. SEE PAGE 10 COL 1

Wounded tigress needs surgery

The Bengal tigress wounded in a hunter's trap in the Sundarbans has been brought to Bangabandhu Safari Park in Gazipur and she will undergo surgery today.

A board of veterinary doctors, formed yesterday with Prof Mizanur Rahman as its head, will conduct the operation on her left forelimb where the trap's twine had dug in creating a septic wound.

The Sundarbans native arrived at the safari park around 4:00pm yesterday. Previously mistaken for a male, the tigress also acquired a new name, Pashuri.

Pashuri was first noticed by a tourist on January 27 in Lawdope village of Chandpai range in the Sundarbans. The tourist snapped a picture of the tigress limping away beside the Dangmari creek, and the photo was published in The Daily Star on anuary 31. Since then the forest department had

been trying to catch her. They fashioned a wooden cage 12 feet long and three and a

Death of a language


