Bellamy gets 3-game ban

Craig Bellamy was banned for three games with immediate effect on Tuesday after accepting a Football Association charge of violent conduct.

The charge arose out of the Cardiff forward's clash with Swansea midfielder Jonathan de Guzman in last weekend's south Wales

As the former Wales striker, who had until 1800GMT Tuesday to respond, has accepted the charge, he will receive a three-game ban.

Bellamy appeared to catch de Guzman with his arm during the second half of Swansea's 3-0 victory at their Liberty Stadium ground on Saturday.

The incident was not seen by referee Andre Marriner and his linesmen but, under a new disciplinary procedure, a three-man panel of former referees reviewed the incident and, following their unanimous agreement, the FA charged Bellamy on Monday.

A brief FA statement issued Tuesday said: "Cardiff City's Craig Bellamy will serve a three-match suspension with immediate effect after he accepted an FA charge of violent conduct.'

Anichebe holds Chelsea

Substitute Victor Anichebe struck a dramatic late equaliser on Tuesday to earn West Bromwich Albion

Jose Mourinho's team were far from being in the fluent and formidable form which has characterised their recent ascent to the summit, however once they led via Branislav Ivanovic's goal in first-half added time at The Hawthorns they had looked on course for victory.

Yet Anichebe, on the pitch 14 minutes as a replacement for Morgan Amalfitano, had other ideas, with the

Nigeria striker heading home in the 87th minute to secure a precious point which lifted the Baggies out of the bottom three.

West Brom, meanwhile, will take confidence from their third successive draw at home under new head coach Pepe Mel ahead of a meeting with fellow relegation battlers Fulham on Saturday week.

They have, though, still won just once in 16 league matches.

New arrival Thievy Bifouma, on loan from Espanyol, was handed a first Baggies start, yet the major piece of team news surrounded the inclusion by Chelsea manager Mourinho's decision to field Ramires, who replaced Frank Lampard.

The Brazil international was roundly booed by the home crowd in

what was the sides' first meeting since he controversially won a penalty which earned the Blues an injury-time equaliser in November.

Despite their vastly contrasting recent form, it was a surprisingly even start to proceedings with Mel's renowned pressing game frustrating the visitors.

It took Mourinho's team until the 22nd minute to threaten when Samuel Eto'o's cutback from the byline almost found the onrushing Ivanovic, with a combination of Gareth McAuley and Claudio Yacob doing just enough to avert the danger.

Mel had previously claimed victory over Mourinho when his Real Betis team pulled off a shock 1-0 victory over Real Madrid in November 2012.

Pitch the talking point

Second NZ-Ind Test from Friday

Tim Southee was asked whether he could tell the pitch from the outfield at the Basin Reserve. He smiled, saying it was "tough" to do so at the

moment. You had to squint to make out the pitch from the boundary. It was the slightly thinner grass rectangle amid all the green. Much before the start of the India tour, New Zealand coach Mike Hesson had demanded green, seaming pitches for the visitors.

The pitch in Auckland for the first Test had some grass cover, but it eased out considerably after only one session. There is still some time to go for the Friday start of the second and final Test, and there is no saying

whether all the grass on it will stay, but this one is likely to do a lot more than the dropin surface at Eden Park.

There has been some rain in Wellington past few days, and pitch preparation has not been ideal. It also means there will be at least some moisture underneath that grass going into the Test, even though days are warm and long at this time of the year. The last Test at the Basin a couple of months ago lasted three days, as West Indies were shot out for 193 and 175 to lose by an innings.

Brett Sipthorpe, the curator, said he was targeting a similar pitch for India. "It's had good pace and bounce in it this summer and basically we're aiming for exactly what we had for the West Indies one," Sipthorpe told local media.

Marsh leads fightback

Shaun Marsh marked his return to Test cricket with a fighting century as Australia overcame a poor start on the first day of the first Test against South Africa at SuperSport Park on Wednesday.

Australia were 297 for four at the close.

They were reeling at 98 for four after being sent in to bat but Marsh (122 not out) and Steve Smith (91 not out) added an unbeaten 199 for the fifth wicket with positive stroke play.

It was Marsh's first Test in two years. He made 141 and 81 in his first two Test innings in Sri Lanka in 2011 but was dropped after his next nine innings yielded only 79 runs.

Marsh started his innings when Australia were 24 for two in the ninth over. David Warner hit two boundaries off Dale Steyn in the first over of the match but made only 12 before he was bowled by Steyn, edging an attempted cut into his stumps.

Cosmos to honour Pele

Brazilian football legend Pele will return to the New York Cosmos in April for a championship celebration and to accept an honorary degree for humanitarian work, the team said Tuesday. The 73-year-old icon

inspired Brazil to World Cup glory in 1958, 1962 and 1970, then played for the original Cosmos from 1975 through 1977, winning the title in his final season and sparking an American surge in football interest. The Cosmos were

revived last year and won a title in the second-tier North American Soccer League, a level below Major League Soccer.

Pele will join the Cosmos in celebrating that title at a pre-game ceremony on April 13.
