# Bane for farmers, boon for traders

Many of the country's seven lakh potato farmers are on the verge of bankruptcy due to fast falling prices of their produce.

Yet, the government is not doing much to ensure fair prices, ease export barriers and find new markets.

Analysts and industry operators say the recent moves to boost exports will not give the farmers an immediate respite.

The government should buy potato from growers to mop up the additional supply, and distribute those through social safety net schemes to help the prices rebound, they say.

Agriculture Minister Matia Chowdhury, however, said the government has no such plans; instead it is trying to find markets for exporting potato through the private sector.

"We are aggressively looking for new markets," she told The Daily Star over the phone.

She said around 30,000 tonnes of potato were already shipped to several countries, including Russia, in the current fiscal year.

"Exports will rise further," she said, adding that the prices will rebound in a month.

Earlier, Bangladesh Cold Storage Association had urged the government to buy potato from the market and distribute those under the safety net schemes such as VGD (vulnerable group development) and VGF (vulnerable group feeding).

But officials at the agriculture ministry

said the proposal is not viable as the government has no specialised warehouse to preserve potato.

The prices of potato at the farmers' end now stand at Tk 1.76-Tk 5 a kilogram, which is far below the production cost of around Tk 6, according to estimates by Bangladesh Agricultural Research Institute.

In a novel protest against falling prices, farmers in the northern districts are dumping potatoes on highways, while policymakers are looking to boost exports as a way out.

"It is not possible to increase exports overnight," said Shaikh Abdul Quader, president of Bangladesh Potato Exporters Association.

Though the government has been providing 20 percent cash incentives for potato exports for the last several years, exports didn't pick up for lack of production of exportable varieties, said Quader.

The annual consumption of potato is 60-65 lakh tonnes against the production of 82 lakh tonnes a year. Of the total produce, 10 lakh tonnes are used as seed, according to Bangladesh Cold Storage Association.

### REASONS BEHIND SUPPLY GLUT

In November and December last year, many farmers in the north put harvests on hold due to shutdowns and blockades.

Cold storage operators couldn't clear stocks in the wake of political unrest in the run-up to the January 5 national election.

As the political situation returned to normal after the polls, farmers began har-

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## Back to barbarism?

Gang subjects 4 women, 2 minor boys to horrific torture for recovery of 'stolen' gold ornaments

The brutality would perhaps beat the barbarism of the medieval ages.

Four women, including an expecting mother and a teenager, were abused by a gang to get gold ornaments weighing some six tolas from one of their male family members.

The criminals undressed the four, aged between 13 and 22, in front of their male family members and put cricket stumps inside their private parts.

The culprits did not stop there. They filmed the scene and threatened to circulate it if the gold ornaments were not given to them.

They also beat up seven other members of the family, including two women and two minor boys.

The incident occurred at Bhasantek slum in the capital on Tuesday and came to light on Friday when one of the victims filed a case with Bhasantek Police Station. The complainant sued 13 people, including Mamun, known as a gang leader at the slum.

Three accused were arrested on Saturday, but Mamun and other main accused are on the run. The trio were taken on remand yesterday.

Police said Shobel, one of the 11 victims, is an accomplice of Mamun and the two had been stealing and mugging in the area for the past several months. Aged around 20, Shobel also lives in the slum.

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## Two killed in 'crossfire'

Two suspected ring leaders of robbers were killed in separate incidents of "crossfire" between their cohorts and law enforcers in Jessore and Moulvibazar early yesterday.

With these two deaths, as many as 35 people have so far been killed in "crossfire" in alleged shootouts with police, Rab and joint forces since January this year, according to reports from different media and rights bodies.

The deceased were identified as Rajab Ali alias Kala Rajab, 45, of Keshabpur in Jessore, and Babul, 30, of Moulvibazar, report our district correspondents.

Rajab was accused in 23 cases, including murder and robbery, said Abdul Jalil, officer-in-charge (OC) of Keshabpur Police Station.

Police arrested Rajab from a place in Jhikargacha upazila around 11:15pm on Saturday, the OC said, adding that during preliminary interrogation, Rajab divulged details about his arms den.

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## ELECTED UNCONTESTED HC challenges RPO clause

The High Court yesterday asked why Section 19 of the Representation of People Order (RPO), which allows the Election Commission to declare uncontested candidates in parliamentary elections winners, should not be declared illegal.

In exercise of Section 19, the EC declared 153 candidates elected uncontested in the January 5 parliamentary elections, without a single vote being cast.

This denied more than half of the country's 9.19 crore voters the right to elect their representatives by exercising their franchise.

With the unprecedented number of lawmakers getting elected uncontested, the 10th parliamentary elections triggered widespread controversy over the acceptability of the polls, held amid a boycott by the then BNP-led 18-party opposition alliance.

The HC bench of Justice Mirza Hussain Haider and Justice Muhammad Khurshid Alam Sarkar came up with the rule after hearing a writ filed by Jatiya Party leader Khandker
