PASSPORTS MISSING

Probe team goes to KL

The government finally sent a three-member high-powered team to Malaysia to probe the missing of 550 passport booklets from Bangladesh High Commission in Kuala Lumpur.

Led by Paban Chowdhury, additional secretary at the Prime Minister's Office, the team left Dhaka for Kuala Lumpur last night. The other members of the team are Allama Siddiki, director general (administration) at the foreign ministry, and a joint secretary of the home ministry.

Bangladesh mission in Kuala Lumpur last month discovered that the passport booklets were missing, said foreign ministry officials.

They suspected that a section of high commission officials and a few others might have been involved in the incident. The officials presumed the booklets might already have been sold.

The passport booklets were in the possession of Suchona Rani Halder, second secretary (political) at the high commission. She left Kuala Lumpur for Dhaka on January 5 on a 10-day leave. Former leader of Eden College unit Chhatra League, Suchona had joined the mission on October 23 last year. She came to Dhaka with her family and is still staying here, citing medical reasons.

According to foreign ministry sources, Suchona was supposed to return to her work by January 15.

Contacted, Suchona told The Daily Star that she got admitted to Dhaka Medical College Hospital yesterday due to her deteriorating health.

Sadr's political exit may be 'gift' to Iraqi rivals

Powerful Iraqi Shiite cleric Moqtada al-Sadr's announced exit from politics two months before elections may be a "gift" to rivals but could also be another temporary withdrawal, experts say.

Sadr's political career began with his fierce opposition to the presence of foreign troops in Iraq after the 2003 US-led invasion, and has spanned more than a decade.

His rise, aided by the reputations of two famed relatives -- including his father, Grand Ayatollah Mohammed Mohammed Sadiq al-Sadr -- who were killed during Saddam Hussein's rule,

eventually translated into political clout.

At the time of his weekend announcement, Sadr's movement held 35 cabinet posts, the deputy speaker-ship of parliament and 40 seats in the legislature.

"I announce my non-intervention in all political affairs and that there is no bloc that represents us from now on, nor any position inside or outside the government nor parliament," Sadr said in a statement.

His exit so close to parliamentary elections in April may "benefit other (Shiite) parties," said Aziz Jabr, a political science professor at Baghdad's Mustansiriya University.

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national polls, he expressed concern about the election which is an internal affair of Bangladesh.

One of the leaders informed the meeting that the US envoy would leave Bangladesh soon.

Hasina directed top party leaders to take every measure to reorganise the party at the grassroots level. She asked them to strongly monitor the candidate selection and take care of the dissidents.

The meeting decided to distribute party nomination forms among the aspirants from the party president's Dhanmondi office today and tomorrow.

The next ALPB meeting would be held tomorrow at the prime minister's official residence Gono Bhaban where the party would interview the nomination seekers.

The Tangail-8 constituency was vacated following the death of Awami League lawmaker Shawkat Momen Shajahan on January 20. He was elected unopposed in the January 5 polls.

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glorious uncertainties but the Tigers' 13-run defeat in the first one-dayer of the three-match series in Mirpur will haunt millions of cricket fans for long. MIR QUASEM WAR TRIAL

Witness speaks of torture, killings

Al-Badr men led by Jamaat-e-Islami leader Mir Quasem Ali picked up Tuntu Sen and Ranjit Das and took them to the Dalim Hotel torture camp in Chittagong during the Liberation War, 1971, a prosecution witness told International Crimes Tribunal-2 yesterday.

"I heard from the detainees in Dalim Hotel that Tuntu and Ranjit along with some others were killed on the directives of Mir Quasem Ali," said fourth prosecution witness Sunil Kanti Bardhan who too was detained at the camp.

Sunil, who was rescued along with others on the December 16 Victory Day in 1971, yesterday gave a vivid description of how the Al-Badr men shot detainees dead and dumped their bodies.

In his hour-long testimony, Sunil told the Tribunal-2, led by Justice Obaidul Hassan, they were on the run to escape the Pakistani army and its auxiliary forces during the war.

But one day, towards the end of November when Sunil was leaving

Chaktai village for Perpara of Patia on a boat with his wife, six-month-old daughter and the domestic help, Al-Badr men captured him.

He was taken to an Al-Badr camp at Dost Panjabi's building at Chamrar Gudam area and tortured by Al-Badr men. Sunil's wife was later released and the domestic help took his daughter to Sunil's village home in Perpara.

Sunil's mother with the help of the principal of the Chittagong College had managed to convince Al-Badr commander Shah Alam to free Sunil.

Shah Alam had told Sunil that he was trying to have him freed. However, chances of Sunil getting out diminished when Shah Alam was killed during an operation at the port the following day.

The witness said there was a toilet on the Chaktai canal above the water and detainees were shot and killed there and the bodies were dropped in the water.

"I was taken there twice but they [Al-Badr] later decided not to kill me in the hope of getting more information out of me," the witness said.

On December 13, 1971, the witness noticed that the lights of the camp were being removed. He learnt from Kamrul, who worked for Al-Badr camp, that he would be transferred to Dalim Hotel camp where "Mir Quasem Ali will not let him live".

At dawn of December 14, 1971, Sunil along with other detainees was taken on a truck to Dalim Hotel where Mir Quasem asked them to divulge information about freedom fighters.

"As we were not giving anything, Quasem threatened to kill us," Sunil said, adding that they were put inside in a room on ground floor of Dalim Hotel.

After his rescue, Sunil also heard from the wives of Tuntu and Ranjit that their husbands were picked up and blindfolded by Al-Badr men led by Quasem.

Following the deposition, defence counsel Mizanul Islam began cross-examining the witness. The proceeding of the case was adjourned until today.

Quasem is facing 14 charges of crimes against humanity committed during the Liberation War.

Kidnappers, reason

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Later, Mridul talked to his wife Shelly Chowdhury and brother Shimul Chowdhury over Harun's cell phone.

Shimul then called the Kotwali police who informed the matter to Burichang Police Station, said the SI, also investigation officer of the case filed after Mridul's abduction.

On information from Burichang police, a team from the Devpur outpost near Kangshanagar Bazar rescued Mridul around 4:00am. He stayed at the outpost till starting for Chittagong around 11:30am with wife and brother and law enforcers.

Mridul was brought to Royal Hospital, a private clinic, in the port city around 5:00pm.

Dr Polash Biswas of the hospital told The Daily Star that Mridul had several marks of assault from knee to feet and on the waist and buttock. He said the victim was out of danger.

During his stay at the police outpost, Mridul said the abductors kept him blindfolded while his mouth and hands were also tied with cloths almost all the time. They tortured him on the day of kidnapping and kept him half-fed, he added.

Mridul also said the kidnappers shifted him to three places, but he could not identify the places as he was blindfolded, he added.

"I thought I wouldn't be kept alive. God saved me," said Mridul, chocking back emotion.

The kidnappers changed vehicles three times before releasing him around 1:00am, he said.

Mridul's brother Shimul Chowdhury said he saw marks of injuries due to beating on the victim's legs.

Shelly Chowdhury, the victim's wife, told The Daily Star yesterday that they gave up all hopes about her husband's return.

Talking about the events of February 11, she said, "As soon as he [Mridul] left home for his shop, I heard and saw Jhunu, a friend of my husband, shouting: 'They are taking him away'."

"I thought muggers might have snatched something from Jhunu. But our maid came and told me about the kidnaper."

Squadron Leader Nazmul Haque, a deputy director of Rab-7, however, denied their involvement in the incident saying that the elite force had not conducted any raid in the Hazari Lane area on the very day.

Meanwhile, Chittagong Metropolitan Police Commissioner Shafiqul Islam after visiting Royal Hospital told the reporters, "We are not sure who the abductors are."

He added, "We suspect he [Mridul] was taken to Dhaka."

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well as the US rejected the January 5 election," the BNP leader told a press conference at the party's Nayapaltan office.

Fakhru's comments came two days after the media reported that al-Qaeda chief Ayman al-Zawahiri in an audiovisual message urged the Muslims in Bangladesh to wage an intifada (popular uprising) to confront the "crusader onslaught against Islam".

Posted in Jihadology.net, the message alleged thousands of people were being killed in the streets of Bangladesh for protesting the "collusion of the anti-Islam secular government with a bunch of transgressing secularists".

The message titled "Bangladesh: A Massacre behind a Wall of Silence" was released on January 14, but it surfaced in the media on Saturday.

Raising allegations that BNP, Jamaat-e-Islami and Hefajat-e-Islam have links with al-Qaeda, ministers and ruling party lawmakers said al-Qaeda leader Ayman al-Zawahiri's message reflected the statements of BNP, Jamaat and Hefajat.

They said the al-Qaeda threat is part of a conspiracy against the country.

In response to the allegation,

Fakhru said, "While the state minister for foreign affairs is unclear about the authenticity of the message, some ministers and ruling party leaders are linking it to BNP. The claim is not only illogical and false but also ridiculous." If one accuses the BNP of having ties with al-Qaeda just for the similarity between its statement and the al-Qaeda's message, then international community and the country's civil society that spoke against the government's misrule too should face the same accusation, he added.

Jamaat, a key component of the BNP-led alliance, also binned the allegation that the Islamist party has any connections with al-Qaeda.

In a statement on Sunday, acting Jamaat secretary general Shafiqur Rahman said media reports that Jamaat has links with al-Qaeda are absolutely false.

The "so-called" al-Qaeda message could be part of a conspiracy against the Muslims of the country, said the Jamaat leader.

Hefajat also refuted the allegation of having any ties with al-Qaeda.

In a statement on Saturday, the Qawmi madrasa-based organisation alleged that it might be a plot against the Muslims.
