Language martyr Barkat's family complains about grabbing effort

The family of Shaheed Barkat, a Language Movement martyr, submitted a written complaint to the deputy commissioner of Gazipur yesterday alleging that a ward councillor of the city has been harassing them over their land given to them by the government.

Shaheed Barkat's nephew Ain Uddin Barkat said Md Safar Ali, councillor of ward-18, filed a case with the land office concerned saying they were not the real owners of the land. In 1981, the then government allocated 0.68 acres of land in Kacharibari under Naljani Mauja in Gazipur to Hazi Hasina Bibi, mother of Shaheed Barkat, said Ain Uddin.

On April 21, 1982, Hasina Bibi died and according to the government decision she was buried in the land, he said,

Quasem took Ranjit Das to torture camp in 1971

Victim's son tells war crimes tribunal

A prosecution witness yesterday told International Crimes Tribunal-2 that he learnt from his mother that Al-Badr men led by Jamaat-e-Islami leader Mir Quasem Ali took his father, Ranjit Das, to the Dalim Hotel torture camp during the Liberation War.

His father was tortured to death at the hotel in Chittagong city along with their neighbour Tuntu Sen, said Shibu Das, 46, quoting his mother. He testified as the fifth prosecution witness (PW) at the three-member tribunal headed by Justice Obaidul Hassan.

Ranjit ran a teashop and a business of old bottles.

Shibu, who works at a metal workshop, said he was about three years old when his father was killed and could not even remember the face of his father.

In his short deposition, he also said

Dalim Hotel was a den of Al-Badr in 1971 where many innocent people were tortured and killed.

Al-Badr, notorious auxiliary force to the Pakistani army, looted valuables of Hindus and torched their houses.

Following the testimony, defence counsel Mizanul Islam completed crossexamining the witness. The defence also completed cross-examining the fourth prosecution witness, Sunil Kanti Bardhan, who testified Monday against Quasem. The proceeding was adjourned until today.

Meanwhile, Quasem's son and counsel Barrister Mir Ahmad Binquasemson filed an application seeking a "suitable" vehicle for the transportation of his father, citing his health condition.

The tribunal is due to pass an order regarding this on February 20.

Indigenous children should be taught in mother tongues

Says study

Children of indigenous communities should be taught in their respective mother tongues at primary level to reduce their dropout rates, said a study of Research and Development Collective yesterday.

"Drop-out rates of indigenous and other minority communities are much higher than those of their Bangalee counterparts. Only multi-lingual education system can help reduce the rates," said Prof Mesbah Kalam of Dhaka University, leader of the team that carried out the study, at a publication ceremony of the study at Jatiya Press Club in the capital.

The study titled "Mapping of Multi-Lingual Education Programs in Bangladesh" recommended recruiting qualified teachers from minority communities to teach students of the respective communities and developing more textbooks. SEE PAGE 4 COL 6
