#### **Guitar virtuoso** Paco de Lucia dies


World-renowned Spanish guitarist Paco de Lucia has died aged 66 in Mexico, reportedly of a heart attack while playing with his children on a beach. The death of one of the most celebrated flamenco guitarists was announced by the mayor's office in Algeciras in southern Spain, where he was born.

Famous for a series of flamenco albums in the 1970s, he also crossed over into classical and jazz guitar. He also worked on films by Spanish director Carlos Saura, notably appearing in his 1983 version of "Carmen", which won a UK Bafta award for Best Foreign Language Film in 1985.

Algeciras is to hold two days of official mourning, a city spokesman was quoted as saying by Reuters news agency.

Abanindranath Tagore was the first major exponent of swadeshi values in Indian art, thereby founding the influential Bengal school of art, which led to the development of modern Indian painting. Popularly known as 'Aban Thakur', he was also a noted writer, particularly for children. He sought to modernise Mughal and Rajput styles in order to counter the influence of Western models of art, as taught in Art Schools under the British Raj and developed the Indian style of painting, later known as Bengal school of art. Such was the success of Tagore's work that it was

Ananya has published over 1,500 books, including 37 by late writer Humayun Ahmed. Its publications boast a majority of famed authors of the country, including Muhammad Zafar Iqbal and Imdadul Haq Milon.

At this year's Ekushey Book Fair, Ananya has published "Samajik Byabsa" by Nobel Laureate Dr. Muhammad

Yunus, among 75 books. It published Humayun Ahmed's first Himu novel "Moyurokkhi" and the novel "Nurjahan" of Imdadul Haq

At the fair, many readers picked up Professor Muntasir Mamun's volume "Dhaka: Smriti Bisritir Nogori" published by Ananya.

Apart from this, the publication house has published over 100 books on the Liberation War and several others on

the Language Movement. Asked why only a handful of books had been published on the Language

Movement, publisher Monirul Haque said, "Very few writers have penned books on the issue, which explains the shortfall."

# The warriors gone unsung ...

### "War and Colonies" brings vivid pictures of World War I

Memory, particularly historical memory, is selective. And for a historic event -- the First World War in modern history -- that happened a century ago, it is more 'convenient' to do so. There is very little reference in contemporary history texts to the colonial troops from Asia and Africa who were deployed in various capacities during the War, and their sacrifices are commemorated only in a handful of events.

On the centenary of the First World War, Alliance Francaise de Dhaka (AFD) is holding a photo exhibition titled "War and Colonies, 1914-1918" at its La Galerie, as a tribute to the colonial troops engaged on both sides of the conflict. Michel Trinquier, the French Ambassador to Bangladesh, graced the inauguration of the exhibition on February 24 as chief guest, while Dr. Ferdinand Von Weyhe, Deputy Head of Mission of the German Embassy in Dhaka and KH Masud Siddiqui, Secretary of the Liberation War Ministry of Bangladesh, were present as special guest and guest of honour respectively.

35 photographs, is an enriched display, featuring brilliant textual references, statistics and historical facts interspersed throughout the gallery. Beginning with the Indian troops and the follower ranks of the Indian Army, the exhibition displays photos and information on Irish troops, Africans deployed in the European colonial armies -- the Askaris, French colonial troops -- Annamese and Senegalese and Moroccan soldiers and infantrymen. The photos -- although presumably

taken for documentation and not from a photographic aesthetics perspective -- are striking. The war's unmistakable marks of strife on their faces and uniforms are evident, be it in arranged group photos or candid ones of them sitting in a trench and reading newspapers. A rear view of Moroccan Spahis on horseback with a rocky hill on the background is almost cinematic; their huddling around a machine-gun, learning its operation strikes the contrast of the punch of reality. While some photographs show them in non-combat activities such as trenchdigging, repairing roads, even wounded soldiers working in the kitchens, some show more frontline activities like guntraining and cleaning, or even in combat.



a soldier grinding coffee with a bottle or a shell, and a delightful snap of Senegalese infantrymen doing a tribal dance, with one man jumping mid-air while spectators form a circle around.

The exhibition -- and an international conference on the same title that took place on February 25-26 at the Nabab Nawab Ali Chowdhury Senate Building of the Dhaka University -- is an earnest effort to fill the lapse in memory where these troops' contributions have been pushed into. In the photos taken a century ago, the human element is of monumental significance; there is no sensationalisation, just men thrown in a tumultuous scenario fighting it out, be it on the battlefield or beyond.

# Social causes beckon Rahul Bose

It would be a gross understatement to say that actor Rahul Bose is socially conscious. As he would like himself to be called, he is socially active. That was why one had seen Bose, who set up NGO The Foundation, rushing to Andaman and Nicobar islands in the Bay of Bengal to help the people there in the wake of the devastating Tsunami in December, 2004 and then following up the projects he had launched from time to time, taking time off from his tryst with cinema.

As a further reinforcement of his unflinching commitment to social causes, Bose, 45, organised an auction on February 22 in Mumbai, of 16 iconic memorabilia donated by celebrities to raise funds for charity work of his NGO.

Among the memorabilia were an autographed sarod used by maestro Ustad Amjad Ali Khan, which fetched Rs 16 lakh, a pair of tablas used by Ustad Zakir Hussain and his father Allah Rakha 5 Khan for a total of 28 years, the gold medal actress Shabana Azmi won as a student of Film Training Institute of India, the handwritten poems written by the father and grand father of Bollywood lyricist-script-dialogue writer Javed Akhter and the gun used by India's gold medal winner shooter Abhinav Bindra in the Beijing Olympics.

"This instrument (tablas) belonged to abba. After he passed away, I started performing with it. It has travelled the length and breadth of half the world



with me and also bears the signatures of some of the world's greatest musicians whom I've had the pleasure of playing with -- Carlos Santana, Herbie Hancock and Wayne Shorter. It's brought me indescribable pleasure to play with these tablas and it gives me even greater pleasure to donate them to this auction,"

said Zakir Hussain.

Bindra donated for the auction his second gun with which he shot in the Beijing Olympics for the auction. "The first one is in the Olympic museum in Lausanne," said Rahul.

Also included in the auctioned memorabilia were works of prominent cartoonist RK Laxman, sonnets by writer Vikram Seth an autographed edition of his novel "The Golden Gate", Nobel Laureate economist Amartya Sen and the jacket used by Bollywood superstar Aamir Khan in his film "Lagaan".

"We decided to have an auction from 16 great Indians, who with their talent and world-view uphold the value of 'The idea of India'. The idea behind the auction is that India should be a secular inclusive democratic state without discrimination of any kind," according to Rahul Bose. "These people are compassionate,

generous and they don't discriminate on the basis of gender, caste, colour, age and religion. Auctions also help us in raising money for my NGO." The actor said he came up with The Foundation as an effort to fight all kinds

of discrimination prevailing in the country. The other author in the contributors to the auction is Amitav Ghosh, who has given away handwritten passages from his book "The Hungry Tide", Laxman's hand-drawn originals of "Six decades of the common man" and musician Zubin

Mehta's autographed baton that he used

in his concerts.
