
Which were your remarkable stage plays? Shahnaz: I worked with Arannak



A total of 143 children from different educational institutions of class one to ten took part in the competition in four groups.


The subjects of the competition were-open choice, women Freedom Fighters, Mujibnagar Government and killing of intellectuals by anti-liberation forces.
