Patients suffer as strike on

Man dies 'due to negligence'

Patients' sufferings knew no end, with RMCH interns, who beat up over 10 journalists on Sunday night, staying away from work all day long yesterday.

Amid a shortage of doctors at the Rajshahi Medical College Hospital (RMCH), many patients remained unattended while others were compelled to leave the compound.

A patient even died at the hospital in the afternoon as, the victim's family says, there was none to provide him An LGED employee, Shahidul Islam, 45, of the city's


Chandipur area was taken to the hospital around 3:30pm with severe respiratory problems, said his son Nahidul Islam. "We repeatedly requested the on-duty doctor [at the

emergency] to give him oxygen and the doctor sent my father to the cardiology ward," he alleged. "I ran around the ward for a doctor but could find none.

Even the nurses were seeking the presence of a doctor for giving him oxygen. Half an hour later, my father passed away. He would have survived had he been provided with oxygen in time."

MITFORD HOSPITAL ETV sues 5 for assault of journos

The Ekushey Television (ETV) authorities yesterday filed a case against the director and four interns of Mitford Hospital on charges of assaulting their reporters and videographers.

On Saturday, interns at the hospital allegedly beat up three reporters and three videographers of ETV when they went there to cover news on the alleged negligence of doctors.

Meanwhile, interns at the hospital began an indefinite work abstention since 2:30pm yesterday.

Zahidul Islam, director of the private television channel, filed the case with the Chief Metropolitan Magistrate's Court of Dhaka.

49pc cabinet decisions unimplemented

Despite the prime minister's directive given three months ago, none of the ministries have yet prepared any action plan for the next five years.

Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina on January 20 asked the ministries to draw up their five-year action plans in keeping with the ruling Awami League's election manifesto and the past experience of the AL government.

But at the cabinet meeting yesterday, the PM was

informed that no ministries had sent any plan to the Cabinet Division. Hasina again asked the ministries to prepare the plan immediately and work accordingly.

Sleepless for water

Wasa blames depleting groundwater level, faulty pumps for supply shortage in city parts

Although Dhaka Wasa is producing water equivalent to the city's estimated daily demand of 230 crore litres, some areas have been facing serious water crisis for about two months.

The crisis is so acute that residents of West Bhatara near Baridhara, Central Road and Kathalbagan areas have to sacrifice sleep going about colleting water by night.

Wasa officials said the crisis hit some pockets of the city due to depleting groundwater level and technical glitches in a few pumps. Homemaker Selina Begum of West Bhatara could not

sleep well for the last two months, as she has to wait round the clock for supply of water. "We didn't get a drop of water in the last four days. From

morning till late at night, I wait for supply of water, but there would be nothing," she said.

Getting water after every three or four days has become a common feature of the neighbourhood, mentioned Selina. SEE PAGE 10 COL 4

20kg gold seized at airport


