Dwyer quits

Bangladesh's strength and conditioning coach David Dwyer has resigned from his position after spending a year with the national team. The Australian, who had gone back home after the ICC World Twenty20, sent an e-mail to the Bangladesh Cricket Board (BCB) last week stating his decision.

BCB Director Akram Khan confirmed Dwyer's departure. "Yes we received his e-mail last week. He is leaving because he got a better opportunity elsewhere. I don't think there is much to worry about, we will get a good trainer to replace him

soon," said Akram. Dwyer's resignation comes as a huge blow for the BCB, who had signed him up until the 2015 World Cup. The Australian made his decision public through his facebook status yesterday which read: "Right to Dhaka, let's do this. On my way for my last week in The Desh and then HOME!!!"

Dwyer himself was not available for comment as he was on his way to Bangladesh last night.

His resignation comes just days after his colleague, Richard McCinnes, who was heading the BCB's Academy, decided against continuing in his position.

Dwyer was on board with the national team for every series from the Sri Lanka tour last year and was an integral member of the team.

He was brought to Bangladesh at a time when a majority of the national players were going through a series of injuries. With that in mind, Dwyer designed a new training management system for the national players last year in a bid to monitor their fitness levels.

This was not the Australian's first stint in the sub-continent. He had worked with the Pakistan cricket team from 2007 to 2010. He also spent two months with the Afghanistan Cricket Board as a consultant.

He also has a background in rugby and spent 2012 with the 'Mt Pritchard Rugby League Club'. In 2011 he worked as an Assistant Coach for the Fiji Rugby Union for eight months.

Sharapova powers thru' to semis

Defending champion Maria Sharapova marched into the semi-finals of Stuttgart's WTA tournament with a 6-4, 6-3 win over top-seed Agnieszka Radwanska in Friday's quarter-finals. "That was a big win for

me," admitted Sharapova after picking up her 11th straight win in Stuttgart where she is bidding for a hat-trick of titles having won the 2012 and 2013 tournaments. Sharapova claimed her

ninth win in 11 matches against world number three Radwanska of Poland, but the statuesque Russian did not have things her own way, despite needing only one hour, 39 minutes to claim victory.

After a total of seven breaks at the start of the match, as the momentum swung back and forth, Sharapova finally won her first service game to take control of the first set.

She will now face either Spain's Carla Suarex Navarro or Italy's Sara Errani in Saturday's semi-final.

Having won all four Grand Slams, Sharapova is bidding to claim a personal landmark this week in Stuttgart by winning a tournament three times in succession.

Victory bought an extra bonus for the Russian as failure to beat Radwanska would have seen Sharapova fall out of the top ten for the first time in three years.

Bangladesh's cricketers spent their second day with psychologist Ali Khan as part of their psychological skill development course amidst great optimism. After attending a group session on the first day, the players had individual sessions with Khan yester-

The sessions mainly centred on how players could motivate themselves during tough situations.

Middle-order batsman Nasir Hossain appreciated Khan's techniques.

"We learnt a lot of things today, which I personally think we should have learnt before. Things like what we need to tell ourselves when we are going through a bad patch. I think if we as players keep these instructions in mind then it will help us improve our self-belief by a huge margin," said Nasir.

"Confidence is such an aspect that, when you have it, every part of your body works to precision and when you don't then nothing is in sync. So we talked on different methods of improving that," he added.

Slow left-armer Enamul Haque who also had a oneon-one session yesterday, echoed Nasir's sentiments.

"I think this course is more important for the players who are outside the national team. In the league, we perform well and there's no problem, but we don't get that belief that we can make it to the national level, or that we

Sri Lanka Cricket on Friday named former captain Marvan Atapattu as interim head coach, making him the island nation's seventh coach in the last four years.

Atapattu, 43, was appointed for the tour of England and Scotland starting next month and the subsequent home series against South Africa in July, the board said in a statement.

Former Test spinner Ruwan Kalpage will join Atapattu as assistant coach for the same period, the statement added.

Atapattu replaces Englishman Paul

Farbrace, who quit earlier this week after just four months on the job to take over as England's deputy coach under Peter Moores.

Atapattu, a right-hand batsman, played 90 Tests, 268 one-dayers and two Twenty20 internationals in a career that spanned 17 years before he retired in

He scored 5,502 Test runs at an average of 39.02 with 16 centuries. His 8,529 one-

day runs included 11 hundreds. Atapattu will be the latest addition in a succession of coaches for Sri Lanka since 2010, following Trevor Bayliss, Stuart Law,

Rumesh Ratnayake, Geoff Marsh, Graham Ford and Farbrace.

Wins for Chennai, Hyderabad

Powerful unbeaten half-centuries from Sunrisers Hyderabad's Aaron Finch and Chennai Super Kings' Brendon McCullum drove their teams to victory in their respective IPL matches against Delhi Daredevils and Mumbai Indians in Sharjah yesterday. Finch's

53-ball 88 gave Hyderabad a four-run win while later in the day McCullum spearheaded Chennai's chase of 141 to beat Mumbai by seven wickets and with one over to spare.

After winning the toss, Mumbai put up a below-par total of 141 for seven, restricted by a fine bowling performance from Mohit Sharma, who picked up four for 14 in his four overs. Mumbai's innings was built around the 84-run thirdwicket partnership between Rohit Sharma and Corey Anderson. In reply, McCullum took charge with a 53-ball 71 that featured eight fours and two sixes.

Nishikori, seeded fourth, was ruthless in the opening set as he broke the big Croat's serve three times.

The second set was more of a contest, but the world number 17 still had too much as he sealed victory in just over an hour to register his best ever run in Barcelona.

Next up for Nishikori will be a meeting with Latvian Ernests Gulbis after he secured a third semi-final appearance of the season with a 6-1, 6-4 win over Russia's Teimuraz Gabashvili. Top seed Rafael Nadal was set to face fellow spaniard Nicolas Almagro later on Friday.
