NEWSIN brief SKorea Ferry Tragedy: US reviving 'Iron Curtain' policies, says Russia

Russia yesterday accused the United States of seeking to revive Iron Curtain policies, saying Washington's latest sanctions over Ukraine would hurt bilateral cooperation in high-tech and space sectors.

While Russian officials acknowledged that the latest US sanctions would harm the country's economy and said Moscow would retaliate, they also sought to maintain a facade of bravado, saying the measures would consolidate Russia and improve production.

"The seriousness of these measures is absolutely obvious to us," Deputy Foreign Minister Sergei Ryabkov said in an interview with online newspaper Gazeta.ru.

"All of that is a blow to our high-tech enterprises and industries," he said.

"This is a revival of a system created in 1949 when Western countries essentially lowered an 'Iron Curtain' cutting off supplies of high-tech goods to the USSR and other countries. Today, in 2014, the United States is attempting to do the same."

He said the sanctions would affect cooperation in the high-tech sector, supplies of US goods that can be used for both military and civilian purposes, and United States in the Ukraine crisis, Russians.

He said Moscow did not want to see a rupture in ties with Washington and Brussels but stressed that Russia would retaliate.

"We already have something and something will be introduced shortly. The question is, what the symmetrical answer will be, what will be part of it," said Ryabkov, adding that Moscow would punish the United States at its own pace.

"Instead of forcing the Kiev clique to sit down at the negotiating table with the southeast of Ukraine over the future makeup of the country, our partners are doing Washington's bidding with new unfriendly gestures towards Russia," the Russian foreign ministry said in a statement.

"If that's how Brussels is hoping to stabilise the situation in Ukraine, then this is obvious evidence of complete incomprehension of the internal political situation in (Ukraine)," the statement said. "Are you not ashamed?" the ministry added.

Deputy Foreign Minister Grigory Karasin for his part called the sanctions an "absolutely counterproductive" measure which was driving the crisis towards "a dead end".

"Instead of this, it's necessary to make collective efforts and influence the Kiev authorities to start real dialogue with the Ukrainian regions and stop all sorts of military and special operations against their own people," Karasin said, the state RIA Novosti news agency.

Middle East peace deadline expires

Kerry sorry for 'apartheid' remark

Washington's deadline for reaching a peace deal expired yesterday with the sides bitterly divided and warnings that Israel risked becoming an "apartheid state" if it failed to make peace with the Palestinians.

As final date for the nine-month negotiation period arrived, peace

hopes appeared more remote than ever with Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu and Palestinian president Mahmud Abbas locked in a tactical game of fingerpointing, and US attempts to broker an extension in tatters. After more than a year of intensive shuttle diplomacy by

US Secretary of State John Kerry who had initially hoped for a deal by April 29, Washington's was reluctant to admit failure, acknowledging only a "pause" in the dialogue.

But Israel and the Palestinians were under no illusions about the fate of the latest US-led peace effort, with analysts saying it was a case of back to square one. Israeli analysts said the collapse of the talks was a direct

result of Israel's relentless settlement construction on land which was the subject of negotiations. Figures published yesterday by settlement watchdog Peace Now showed that in parallel with the negotiations, the Israeli

government approved plans for nearly 14,000 new settler homes, describing it as an "unprecedented number". Kerry has found himself at the centre of a political storm after reportedly saying that if Israel didn't seize the opportunity to make peace soon, it risked becoming an "apartheid

state" with second-class citizens. "Apartheid" refers to South Africa's 1948-1994 oppressive and racially segregated social system.

PENDING ELECTRICITY BILLS Pak PM, president thrown into darkness

The Pakistani government yesterday cut off the electricity supply to several major official buildings for non-payment of bills, including parliament, the prime minister's offices and the president's official residence.

Pakistan is blighted by rolling power cuts, caused in part by people not paying their bills, with government offices among the worst offenders.

Ordinary people struggle without electricity for 12 to 18 hours a day in the blistering heat of summer, but up to now little action has been taken against recalcitrant bureaucrats working in air-conditioned offices.

Minister for water and power Abid Sher Ali announced an "indiscriminate drive" to recover unpaid bills and warned that all offices and customers who had defaulted would be cut off.

The President's Secretariat, which is the head of state's office and residence, owes 28 million rupees, while lawmakers' residential block, Parliament Lodges, had to pay 20 million

rupees to the Islamabad Electricity Supply Company, he added. Power company officials said that electricity supply to more than 100 government offices had been disconnected over non-payment of bills.

Man ablaze hugs politician on TV

A television debate show in northern India ended in horror after a spectator set himself ablaze and embraced a local politician, leaving both men fighting for their lives, police said yesterday.

The election show on India's stateowned national TV channel Doordarshan was being pre-recorded in a park on Monday in Sultanpur, a town about 160 kilometres from the city of Lucknow.

A man, named by police as Durgesh Kumar Singh, emerged from a crowd of about 150 onlookers, doused himself in petrol and then grabbed the local leader of the Bahujan Samaj Party, Kamruzzama Fauji.

Singh sustained burns on 95 percent of his body which doctors say are likely to be fatal, while Fauji was in critical condition

"This man suddenly came on the stage, poured petrol on himself and set himself on fire before tightly hugging one of the political guests," local photographer Pankaj Kumar Gupta told AFP.

BJP's prime ministerial candidate Narendra Modi said that the Congress was a sinking ship and that the days of the mother-son duo (Sonia and Rahul Gandhi) were over.

Talking exclusively to Zee News, Modi said, "When the polls were announced the Congress thought that there would be a hung parliament. They have been saying that we will not let Modi become PM, we will back a Third Front government. From their comments it seems that they have already lost the polls and the days of mother-son duo are over."

"The Congress realises that their ship is sinking given the kind of voting that has taken place till now. They have no agenda, so they abuse me," he added.

Meanwhile, Congress may consider dropping its claim to lead the next 'secular' coalition at the Centre and lend support to a non-BJP front in order to deny Narendra Modi the prime ministership.

A formal indication of a 'come-what-may' strategy to prevent a BJP-led NDA government at the Centre came from key Sonia aide Ahmed Patel in an exclusive interview to TOI.

"Congress is not hankering for power. The party can consider all options necessary to deny power to communal forces (read BJP). The final decision will be taken by the Congress president after due consultation with all colleagues," said Patel, who is political secretary to the party president and a key strategist.

This is the clearest signal yet from a senior and influential Congress functionary that the party is preparing itself to support other 'secular' players seeking to cobble up numbers for a fresh non-BJP coalition - a posture that should open up an array of possibilities for satraps who are not aligned with NDA.

Obama ends Asia tour

Ignites Chinese anger as he warns against force

Barack Obama ended an Asian tour yesterday with a warning to China against using force in territorial disputes, as Chinese authorities accused the US president of ganging up with "troublemaking" allies.

The barbs ensured a tense finish to a fournation trip dominated by the worsening maritime rows between China and US allies in the region, which have triggered fears of military conflict.

"We believe that nations and peoples have the right to live in security and peace, to have their sovereignty and territorial integrity respected," Obama told a gathering of US and Filipino troops in Manila.

"We believe that international law must be upheld, that freedom of navigation must be preserved and commerce must not be impeded. We believe that disputes must be resolved peacefully and not by intimidation or force."

Close American ally the Philippines has



been embroiled in one of the highest-profile territorial disputes with China, over tiny islets, reefs

and rocks in the South China Sea. China claims nearly all of the South China Sea, which is believed to contain huge deposits of oil and gas, even waters and islands or reefs

close to its neighbours. The Philippines and the United States signed an agreement on Monday that will allow a greater US military presence on Filipino bases.

China Daily newspaper yesterday signalled that Chinese authorities viewed Obama's trips to Japan, South Korea, Malaysia and the Philippines as a tour of anti-Chinese hostility. "It is increasingly obvious that Washington
