It's bigger than Aids

WHO warns the drugs losing effectiveness in every country

A child's scratched knee from falling off their bike, common bladder infections among the elderly in care homes and routine surgery to replace broken hips could all become fatal as antibiotics are becoming increasingly useless, the World Health Organisation has said.

The crisis is bigger and more urgent than the Aids epidemic of the 1980s, it was

UK experts said the "era of safe medicine is

coming to an end" and government funds must be pumped into the production of new drugs.

Dr Keiji Fukuda, WHO's Assistant Director-General for Health Security, said: "Without urgent, coordinated action the world is headed for a post-antibiotic era, in which common infections and minor injuries which have been treatable for decades can once again kill.

Back home with broken hearts

Cheated by manpower touts, 22 jobseekers return after months of ordeal in Iran

Most of them had cherished the same dream
-- a decent job and handsome salary that
would ensure the happiness of their families. And they thought their dreams had

finally come true when they landed in Iran.

But none of them had ever imagined the nightmare waiting for them in their 'dreamland'. Deceived and thrown into a miserable life, 22 ill-fated Bangladeshi jobseekers

finally returned home yesterday after enduring untold sufferings.

"I did not see daylight for 40 days in a row. I lived on only bread and cabbage curry given to me twice a day. I was falling sick gradually and thought I would die," said Akhtaruzzaman, 40, one of the deceived migrants. He hails from Jessore.

Modi flouts rules

Indian EC orders filing complaint against him for seeking votes outside a polling booth

Bharatiya Janata Party's prime ministerial candidate Narendra Modi caused controversy yesterday after casting his vote in Gandhinagar city of Gujarat and soon he received accusation of violating electoral laws from Congress and the Election Commission.

Indian EC ordered filing an FIR

or a complaint against Modi as BJP's archrival Congress drew its attention to his violation of the Representation of People Act, 1951 by showing his party's "Lotus" symbol and making a speech when the seventh phase of the parliamentary elections was ongoing.

complaint/ FIR as the case may be, should be filed against Narendra Modi and all others who were involved in the convening and holding of the said meeting," the EC said in an order.

In Delhi, BJP spokesperson Meenakshi

Lekhi said Modi had not violated the election code since it was not an organised press conference.

She, however, added that, "The Election Commission is a constitutional institution and we respect it. We will abide by its decision."

Asked about the EC's directive on the Gujarat government to file an FIR against Modi, she said, "We will address the issue".

The electoral fate of Modi and other top guns of Indian politics like ruling Congress chief Sonia Gandhi was decided by 50 to 60 percent of nearly 14 crore voters, who exercised their franchise yesterday.


Ms. Fahmi was educated at Dhaka University and Karachi University where she received Masters degrees in Islamic History and Bengali respectively.
