The stock market scam resulted from lack of vigilance and failure of the government in booking the guilty persons. Neither the government nor some politicians-cumbusinessmen could understand why 30 lakh small investors, mostly in their 30s, flocked to the share market with everything they had, but in just a year they lost all their assets because of someone else's greed and machinations. These youths had no jobs and no access to business opportunities, but many dependants. All their hopes for survival were dashed to the ground because of flawed government policies, total callousness and indifference from all responsible quarters in the government.

Businessmen, who understand the nuances of corruption better than most people, are forced into a conspiracy of silence that makes it impossible for them to admit publicly

how much they pay to build a power plant, to get an environment clearance for setting up a factory, to build a bridge, or even to get a loan from a bank. Nothing moves in government offices and utility organisations without greasing of the right palms.

There are allegations that for a teaching job in a nongovernment primary school, one has to pay a hefty sum of money to the management board. As the world has become frenetically competitive, nations realise the value of quality education. Most people who had schooling in the earlier days are not happy about the level of education of the students these days. Most high profile schools and colleges are losing their image as producers of national talents in different services.

Reports about school authorities charging high fees in admitting students in both Bangla and English medium schools are very alarming. In response to a writ petition, the High Court directed the government to prevent the English medium schools from charging the students readmission fees for the next three months until a monitoring cell was formed to supervise all such fees. Unhappily, the authorities in the secondary and higher education directorate took no cognisance of the guardian's complaints, although it was their primary responsibility to investigate the matter and take proper education. It seems that opening schools and running coaching centres has become a viable commercial enterprise!

Some top-level bureaucrats in the administration are now declaring themselves as freedom fighters in a bid to have extension of their service length. These bureaucrats proved themselves most efficient and capable to the

> administration of the day and nurtured the hope that they would be shielded by the government under all circumstances! What is more ominous is that people indulging in such malpractices seem to be supported by influential quarters. This shows the breakdown of moral fabric even in the high echelons of the government and society at large. Wherever there is too much concentrated power and too little accountability, there is plunder and payoffs.

People of newly democratising countries are getting tired of being exploited by their public servants. And as more countries reform or undergo wrenching economic change, angry citizens are flushing out the mucky residue of old regimes that dragged them down. Corruption is not just a moral problem. Economists and international organisations are beginning to point out the serious damage that corruption can do to economic growth and prosperity. International investment is the lifeblood of many economies, and because information travels so quickly these days, reputations can be made or destroyed by a single headline.

Rarely has a person guilty of such misconduct in our country been meted out proper punishment. People also feel that the endeavour to curb corruption, abduction, terrorism and looting of state properties is fruitless because of interference by people in the administration who receive their strength from political bosses.

In a fledgling democracy like Bangladesh, instituting a genuinely honest government is tough unless the politicians change their mindset. The top tier of bureaucracy constructed by the colonial rulers and often referred to as "steel frame" has now turned into "rubber frame." Politicians often use the threat of transfers and punitive postings to bend the officers and make them comply with unethical and illegal orders.

In a country that is governed by rule of law and can give

severe punishment to those found guilty, corruption will automatically take the backseat. But in most places, what we see is that corruption is the rule, and honesty is naivety. The most corrupt are likely to walk away with their amassed wealth. The lesser ones run the risk of being caught, suspended, or arrested. Bigger corruption is a sure route to increased pelf and even a position in governance.


