BCL men attack police station

Reason trivial altercation

DU CORRESPONDENT Two lawmen including a sub-inspector of

the capital's New Market Police Station were injured yesterday in an attack by around 100 activists of Bangladesh Chhatra League's Sir AF Rahman Hall unit.

The attack was carried out around 2:45pm after an altercation broke out between a BCL activist and a police official at a restaurant in Nilkhet Book Market.

Sources said Mukit Hasan of Dhaka University's AF Rahman Hall and SI Saifullah were having lunch at the restaurant sitting next to each other. The walkie-talkie of Saifullah was turned on at that time.

Getting annoyed, Mukit, also a student of English department, asked the SI to turn off his walkie-talkie, but Saifullah refused, saying that the device was meant for internal communication.

Pak minister attacks Modi, Congress fires back

India's ruling party Congress may be a strong critic of Narendra Modi on a range of issues but it joined its main political rival Bharatiya Janata Party in slamming Pakistan Interior Minister Choudhary Nasir Ali Khan's remarks suggesting that if Modi is elected as prime minister he would "destabilise" regional peace.

Both the BJP and Congress said on Wednesday that Pakistan should stay within its limits and not interfere in India's internal matters.

BJP spokesperson Meenakshi Lekhi termed Khan's comments "an over-reaction in a matter that is not his subject" and suggested Pakistan mend its ways and the manner of dealing with India.

She said the Pakistani minister should understand that "individual leaders in sovereign nations are elected by the people and no one from any other nation has the right to interfere in our national affairs".

'GUNFIGHT' IN COX'S BAZAR

Four policemen among six hurt

Six people, including four policemen, were injured in a "gunfight" between law enforcers and alleged criminals in the district's Maheshkhali upazila early yesterday.

Abul Kalam, a sub-inspector of Maheshkhali Police Station, was among the injured policemen, said Alamgir Hossain, officer-in-charge (OC) of the police station.

The three other injured cops are Tapan Dey, Nayan Chakma and Kilu Aung Marma. They all took first aid.

As part of the ongoing anti-crime move, police conducted a drive at Nonachhari village and picked up one Helal Uddin from his home around 2:00am for his alleged involvement in criminal activities.

Locals said Helal is a member of Khalil Bahini that runs various criminal activities, including snatching, land grabbing and arms trading, in the area. Following Helal's confessional statement, police

detained his close aide Sana Ullah from Sana's house at SEE PAGE 11 COL 5

Appeal loses pace at SC

Uncertainty looms large over the quick disposal of Jamaat-e-Islami's registration case, as neither side seems to be eager for a hearing of the case.

The High Court on August 1 last year declared Jamaat's registration with the Election Commission illegal, making it unfit for contesting the national polls. The HC verdict came following a

writ petition collectively filed by 25 petitioners, including several Islamist parties, organisations and individuals challenging the EC's 2008 decision to allow Jamaat's registration.

On December 12, Jamaat filed an appeal with the Supreme Court challenging the HC verdict.

A reliable source in Jamaat told The Daily Star on April 8 that the party was not thinking about its registration and that other government pressures on the party were keeping it preoccupied.

The party was busy trying to protect its leaders and activists and their properties and contesting elections took a back seat, the source added.

Belayet Hossain, a lawyer of Jamaat, told The Daily Star on March 28 that senior counsel Abdur Razzaq was supposed to move the appeal at the Appellate Division. But Razzaq was abroad and it was uncertain when he would return, he added.

Petitioners' lawyer Tania Amir on the same day said Jamaat was sup-

posed to take initiative for early hearing of the appeal, as the party had filed the appeal with the SC.

"Jamaat-e-Islami's lawyers are apparently not sincere in getting the hearing. If they do not take any step for the hearing soon, we will make a move to that end," she added.

On March 23, Law Minister Anisul Hug told reporters at a "Meet the Press" programme at Dhaka Reporters Unity that the government would decide on banning Jamaat after the SC delivered a verdict on its registration with the EC.

Since the case was pending with the SC, the government would not do anything before it was disposed of, he

350; thousands missing Toll could reach 2,500, says local governor

Landslides buried a village in northern Afghanistan yesterday, killing at least 350 people and leaving thousands of others feared dead, as rescuers searched desperately for survivors trapped under the mud.

Villagers at the disaster site in Badakhshan province used shovels to dig through rocks and dirt, with local authorities, the United Nations and the Nato military force all racing to assess the damage and provide help.

"Two successive landslides within one hour hit Aab Bareek village today," Gul Mohammad Baidaar, deputy governor of Badakhshan, told AFP.

"A hill collapsed on the village. Most of those missing had gathered in two mosques to offer Friday prayers. The second landslide hit locals who came to help."

"Our initial findings based on local people's reports show around 2,500 people including women and children might be dead," he said. "It is difficult to get confirmed informa-

tion from the scene and we are seeking to determine the facts." Badakhshan is a remote, mountainous

province in northeast Afghanistan bordering Tajikistan, China and Pakistan.

It has been relatively peaceful since the US-led military intervention began in 2001, but has seen increasing Taliban activity in recent years, "The number of deceased has increased

to 350," the UN mission in Afghanistan said in a statement. "A response is being mobilised for those who survived but were displaced, with some

partners already on the ground. SEE PAGE 8 COL 8
