Troubles begin at home

Whenthe Bangladesh Cricket League began last year, it was described as

the next big step to change Bangladesh's woeful record in longer version cricket. But two seasons on, the league, the last two rounds of which were hurriedly scheduled by the BCB, at odds with its main aim, displays exactly why the national team struggles in Test cricket.

The first two days of the finals of the BCL, if anything at all, clearly displayed the batsmen's lack of application. A good batting track at Mirpur, with a hint of extra bounce being the only possible threat, saw both teams crumble twice in the space of two days.

The Nasir Hossain-led BCB North Zone were bundled out for 235 yesterday, following Prime Bank South Zone's 271 the previous day. If South Zone's players seemed overawed against the slow left-armers on Friday, then North Zone's players were most definitely stunned by

some short-of-a-length bowling from Al-Amin Hossain.

Al-Amin first got Junaid Siddique and then removed Naeem Islam and Myshukur Rahman in consecutive overs. His strategy to attack could have been an inverse reaction to North Zone's defensive approach; they were going 1.82 runs per over in the middle.

The manner in which some of the batsmen got out yesterday led many to compare the innings to Bangladesh's first Test against Sri Lanka earlier this year, where they were undone by extra bounce.

While Al-Amin no doubt bowled with aggression, one felt that the batsmen could have done a lot better than just nervously putting bat to ball or attempting voracious pull shots. The concern was best put by North Zone's batting coach Wahidul Gani. "If there was another pacer from the other side bowling these bouncers then we would

have been bowled out for 180 maybe. The overall batting standards have been poor," said Gani.

The only batsman, who seemed in his comfort zone yesterday was Nasir Hossain. He uncharacteristically took his time to get set and a majority of his ten boundaries came in front of the

However with wickets falling at the other end, Nasir came under pressure and attempted an audacious upper cut against Shohag Gazi, only to get caught at first slip.

"I thought it was the right thing to do because at the other end there was a left handed tailender and Gazi was bowling. I wanted to take couples instead of singles."

With South Zone 36 runs ahead, it is still anyone's game. In fact, the champions may be declared as soon as Sunday evening or Monday morning. The bigger and the seemingly 'boring' questions of whether a Bangladeshi batsman can ever successfully overcome the minimum of threats on a wicket or if the board can ever create a robust domestic calendar that they can stick to every year, will remain.

Sk Russel eye top finish

Bangladesh Premier League champions Sheikh Russel KC will take on Bhutanese club Ugyen Academy in the last Group A match of the AFC President's Cup at the Sugathadasa Stadium in Colombo, knowing that a draw against arguably the weakest outfit of the group will be enough for them to qualify for the final round of the third-tier club competition of Asia.

The treble winners of last season head the group table with four points from two outings - thanks to a 0-0 draw in their opening match against last edition's runners-up KRL FC of Pakistan followed by a 5-0 drubbing of Sri Lanka Air Force FC on Friday. KRL FC, who take on Sri Lanka Air Force FC in the last match of the group today, are also on four points but have an inferior goal difference (+3) against Sheikh Russel's (5+).

Top two teams from this group will go through to the final round, but Sheikh Russel are looking for a straight forward win to emerge group champions.

"Even though this match is against an already-eliminated side, we will be playing this match with the same intensity as the previous two. We want to become group champions and take that momentum when we get back to domestic circuit," Sheikh Russel's recently-appointed Montenegrin coach Dragan Djukanovic was quoted as saying, according to a message received here yesterday.

The Sheikh Russel players did not take part in any training session yesterday, rather spent their time playing table tennis, carom and chess among themselves.

Abdullah's surprise

Abdullah Hasan of Natore and Tamanna Akter of BKSP became the fastest youth athletes of the country when they snatched the gold medals in the 100m sprint in the 18-19 age group categories of the Walton 30th National

Junior Athletics Championship at the Bangabandhu National Stadium yesterday. Abdullah, who never won any gold medal

in a national event, beat the odds-onfavourite Uzzal Chandra Shutradhar of Kishorgonj to snatch the gold, clocking at a time of 11.10 seconds. Uzzal finished the race 0.10 seconds behind Abdullah clocking 11.20 seconds while and Saiful Ismail of BKSP finished third by clocking 11.22 seconds.

"This is my first national level gold. I had won the silver medal last year in this competition," said an ecstatic Abdullah, who claimed he got very little support from his

district sports association for this meet. "I have the ingrained qualities of a sprinter which made me excel and I hope to take the success to the senior level as well."

Tamanna, who won the gold in the women's youth category, has it in her genes as she happens to be the granddaughter of former athlete and coach Kitab Ali. Tamanna, who had earlier won the 200m and 400m gold, completed a treble by winning the 100m sprint in 12.94 second. The race was competed by only three participants. Bonna Khatun of Narail finished second clocking 14.20 seconds while Rimpa Khatun of the same district Narail finished third at a time of 14.40 seconds.

Meanwhile, BKSP finished top of the medals tally in the two-day meet with 16 gold, nine silver and two bronze medals while Khulna DSA finished second with five gold, six silver and four bronze medals. Narayangonj DSA finished third with three gold and one bronze medals.

BRAZIL 1950

Barbosa: One mistake, a lifelong stigma

Brazilians still call it el Maracanazo which roughly translates as 'the Maracana blow'. The Selecao's 2-1 defeat to Uruguay in the final match of the 1950 World Cup is written in the country's consciousness. It was a national trauma: 'our catastrophe, our Hiroshima,' wrote Brazilian author and playwright Nelson Rodrigues. But one man suffered more than most: Brazil goalkeeper Moacyr Barbosa.

The newly constructed Maracana was then the biggest football stadium ever built -- intended to symbolise Brazil's new ambition. Instead, in front of almost 200,000 people, the national team were humiliated, and missed out on winning the World Cup on home soil. Before the game, which Brazil needed only to draw thanks to the final group format, Rio newspaper O Mundo declared the team 'world champions'. Tournament founder Jules Rimet had prepared a congratulatory speech in Portuguese, and the team were presented with gold watches in the changing room.

But they hadn't counted on the garra charrua - a Uruguayan term for displays of bravery in the face of over-

whelming odds. Their captain Obdulio Varela was reportedly so incensed by the front page of O Mundo that he bought every copy he could find, hurled them all on the floor of the dressing room and encouraged his teammates to urinate on them.

After a goalless first half, Brazil took the lead early in the second through Friaca. Uruguay hit back --Alcides Ghiggia raced down the right wing and crossed from the edge of the box for Juan Alberto Schiaffino to notch after 66 minutes. Just 13

minutes later, Ghiggia found himself in the same position. In goal, Barbosa took a step to his right, anticipating another cross. It would ruin his life. Instead, Ghiggia shot -low towards the near post. It crept in, evading Barbosa's desperate dive.

"Only three people have, with just one motion, silenced the Maracana: Frank Sinatra, Pope John Paul II and me," said Ghiggia years later.

In the aftermath, it was Brazil's black players who sadly became the scapegoats: centre-half Bigode, leftback Juvenal and Barbosa - the man who was never allowed to forget 1950, despite being voted the best goalkeeper of the tournament by journalists. He would play only once more for his country. In 1993, he tried to visit Brazil's training camp, but he wasn't allowed in because it was thought he would bring the team bad luck. It broke poor Barbosa, who insisted till his dying day:

"I am not guilty. There were 11 of us." A few weeks before he died, almost penniless, in April 2000, Barbosa said: "Under Brazilian law, the maximum sentence is 30 years. But my imprisonment has been for 50."
