

UN blacklists Boko Haram

Imposes sanctions AFP, Abuja

The United Nations imposed sanctions on Boko Haram Thursday, blacklisting it as an al-Qaeda-linked terrorist organization as protesters stepped up demands on Nigeria to release 200 kidnapped schoolgirls.

The terror designation, immediately welcomed by the United States, subjects Boko Haram to an arms embargo and asset freeze, though it remains unclear what practical impact it will have.

The group, which demands the creation of an Islamic state in mainly Muslim northern Nigeria, has recently escalated its campaign of attacks that have left thousands dead since 2009.

US Ambassador Samantha Power hailed the sanctions as "an important step" to support Nigeria in defeating "Boko Haram and hold its murderous leadership accountable for atrocities."

In the Nigerian capital Abuja, about 200 protesters called on President Goodluck Jonathan to do more to recover more than 200 girls kidnapped from a school by Boko Haram on April 14.

The mass abduction has triggered worldwide outrage.

The United States announced Wednesday that 80 military personnel had been deployed to Chad to help find the 223 missing

The deployment marks a significant boost to an existing US military effort, which includes the use of unarmed surveillance drones, as well as manned aircraft over Nigeria.

The general behind the coup

The Thai general who took power in a coup is a staunch royalist with a penchant for wading ruthlessly into the country's political turmoil -- and justifying his actions as a defence of the nation and its revered monarchy.

Stern, pugnacious and known for bluntly stating his opinions, the 60-year-old army chief Prayut Chan-O-Cha was due to retire this September from an office he has held since 2010.

But as he imposed martial law across the kingdom on Tuesday, he hinted at his intention to occupy centre-stage for as long as the nation's political crisis persisted.

The warning took on substance just two days later after talks between the nation's bitter political rivals ended in Prayut declaring a dramatic coup -- with all of the parties whisked away to

an unknown location in military trucks. Prayut, who announced the coup in a televised statement, cited political violence which has seen 28 people killed and hundreds more wounded over nearly

seven months of protest. He had said he would not allow Thailand to become another "Ukraine or Egypt".

Thailand's army has staged 19 successful or attempted coups since 1932 and as army chief Prayut wields enormous political power within the country.

The general is seen as a staunch opponent of Thaksin Shinawatra and a scourge of the "Red Shirt" supporters of the self-exiled former telecoms magnate, who was ousted as prime minister by a military coup in 2006 that triggered years of political chaos.

Experts say Prayut will be lauded as a saviour by royalists and Thaksin's establishment enemies.

After taking power, Prayut insisted the coup was his "responsibility" alone despite speculation of the involvement of other behind-the-scenes players.

> Traditionally coups in Thailand are made with the approval of the royal palace, experts say, although it is unclear if that is the case in the current overthrow.

Born on March 21, 1954, in northeastern Thailand's Nakhon Ratchasima province -the "Red Shirt" heartland, ironically -- Prayut rose from military college to become commander of the Queen's Guards in 1980.

He is seen as close and intensely loyal to Queen Sirikit, who has gradually receded from the public eye in recent years following illness.

Prayut is often described as the architect of a May 2010 army crackdown on a months-long Red Shirt rally in Bangkok. The crackdown left scores dead.

"He would have no qualms about shooting down Red Shirts" again, said Paul Chambers, director of research at the Institute of Southeast Asian Affairs at Chiang Mai University.

Prayut also supported the coup to depose Thaksin in 2006, according to a US diplomatic note released by the Wikileaks website, an act which saw Thailand tumble into an eight-year political quagmire from which it is vet to emerge.



Putin vows to respect Ukraine vote results

Says US's 'unipolar world' has failed; fresh violence kills 7

Russian President Vladimir Putin yesterday pledged to respect the outcome of Ukraine's presidential election but warned that the country had descended into all-out civil war after a bloody upsurge in separatist violence.

At least seven people were killed in fighting between rebels and defence forces outside the eastern industrial hub

of Donetsk yesterday, a day after the deaths of 18 soldiers in the heaviest loss for the Ukraine military since the conflict began. Interim President Oleksandr Turchynov called

on voters to turn out in force tomorrow to prevent Ukraine "being turned into a part of a post-Soviet empire" by a weeks-long insurgency that Kiev and the West say is being orchestrated by Russia.

And Putin said he would "respect the choice of Ukrainian people".

"We are today working with those people who control the government and after the election we will of course work with the newly elected authorities," he said.

But he also accused the United States of choreographing a "coup" in February against a Kremlinbacked leader who upset the West by ditching a



Moscow's economic help instead. The West has threatened Russia with painful sanctions against entire sectors of its troubled economy should it be deemed to have disrupted an election that is almost certain to bring a new pro-Western leader to power.

Putin also said that sanctions imposed on Russian officials over the Ukraine crisis

would backfire on Western countries. "In the modern, interconnected world, economic sanctions as an instrument of political pressure can have a boomerang effect, and in the end they have an impact on the businesses and economies of the countries that initiated them,'

Putin told an economic forum in Saint Petersburg. He also lashed out at the global influence of the

United States. "The model of a unipolar world has failed. Everyone can easily see it today, even those who try to act in the usual manner, to keep their monopoly, to dictate their rules of the game in politics, commerce and finance, to impose their cultural and behavioural norms," he said.

"The world is multipolar, people want to decide their own destinies, preserve their cultural and historical identities and civilisations," Putin said.

'Grateful to Modi for: accepting me as wife'

As Narendra Modi gets ready to take oath as prime minister, his wife Jashodaben said she is extremely happy over his ascent to the top post and that he accepted her for the first time as his spouse.

"It is a matter of extreme happiness for me. I am so proud being his wife. I will pray to the God that he keeps surging ahead," Jashodaben said in an interview to Gujarati Channel 'TV9', aired on Wednesday.

She also expressed gratitude to Modi as he "accepted" her as his wife in the nomination papers filed for Lok Sabha election this time.

"He (Modi) for the first time accepted me as his wife when he filed the form in Vadodara in 2014. As after so many years, he accepted me as his wife, I feel good... I am his wife and will always remain his wife," she said.

Modi's first-time acknowledgement of his married status had sparked off a row during the campaign.

Asked if she would attend the swearingin ceremony, she said, "I will attend if I am invited, why should not I."

Jashodaben is a retired schoolteacher. Modi, who was married to her when both were minor, left home and the family when he was a youngster and later joined RSS.

We, like rest of the world, have seen a remarkable election and a remarkable transition ... the mandate the Indian electorate put forward is one that we strongly support and we stand ready to engage and assist when the new government is ready," Desai-Biswal said in a chastened elaboration of a swift turnaround in Washington DC, where Modi has been persona non grata for almost a decade for his alleged inaction or complicity in not containing

SECOND VERDICT OF ICC Congolese warlord gets 12 years AFP, The Hague

The International Criminal Court yesterday sentenced Congolese warlord Germain "Simba" Katanga to 12 years in jail for arming an ethnic militia that carried out a "particularly cruel" 2003

village massacre. "The chamber sentences Germain Katanga to 12 years in prison," presiding Judge Bruno Cotte told the Hague-based court in its second sentencing since opening in 2003.

The almost seven years that Katanga has already spend in detention will be deducted from the sentence, he said. Katanga, 36, was convicted in March of war crimes and crimes against humanity including murder and pillaging for his role in the attack on

February 24, 2003. More than 200 people were killed in the attack.

The man once known as "Simba" (lion), showed no emotion as the judge read the sentence. The ICC however cleared Katanga of charges of rape, sexual slavery and using child soldiers. Katanga's lawyers have appealed his conviction and

Bogoro village in the volatile eastern Democratic Republic of Congo on

now have another 30 days to appeal his sentence. The Hague-based ICC, the world's only permanent independent tribunal to try the world's worst crimes, has so far only convicted one other suspect. Katanga's arch-enemy and former Congolese rebel fighter Lubanga was sentenced in 2012 to 14 years for recruiting and enlisting child soldiers. the 2002 riots in Gujarat.
