Batman v Superman has finally been blessed with an official title, with the new film going by "Batman v Superman: Dawn Of Justice". The film has also released a new logo, featuring the new title, in which the Batman and Superman insignias are welded together in grungey, industrial style.

The announcement of the new title comes as cameras begin rolling on the film, with principal photography taking place

in Michigan. Directed by Zack Snyder and co-starring Ben Affleck, Henry Cavill and Jesse Eisenberg, "Batman v Superman: Dawn Of Justice" will open in the UK on April 29, 2016.

Bengal Foundation's new cultural centre, the Daily Star-Bengal Arts Precinct, opened on May 23 at The Daily Star Centre with an exhibition titled "Poradrishti". The exhibit features works by master painter SM Sultan from the personal collection of Bengal Foundation Chairman and art collector Abul Khair. Founder and Chairperson of BRAC, Sir Fazle Hasan Abed and Professor Emeritus Anisuzzman jointly inaugurated the centre and the exhibition in the evening.

On display at the exhibit are 18 paintings and 15 drawings by the legendary SM Sultan. During the exhibition that runs until July 13, discussions on the varied aspects of Sultan's works will also be held.

Large panels of canvases and hessian reveal men on the move, with old men, women and children on carts, and men safeguarding them.

"Untitled" (1987) has two men smoking under leafy green trees. This is an image of repose. We see a large oil painting called

"Untitled" (1991). Here is a melange

of trees and roots with figures of men, women and children "Oil on Canvas" (1991) show people at rest, the women wearing bangles, and necklaces. Apparently this is a

jungle area with thick grass all over. In one panel of paintings, we see the men resting with their children and possessions. There are women and children visible too.

Another oil on canvas piece captures a field of people. Here is the only

picture of Sultan where the mighty are lifeless. In the centre is the body of an old man who resembles a sage. Around him are the corpses of women and children.

There is an idyllic painting where three women disembark from a boat. In a huge panel of another canvas,

we see elderly men with women and

children on carts. Of the two paintings which made Sultan most popular --- one is the First Plantation --- and the other is the land grabbing. Some writers have also use the

Celebrating Nazrul


Chhayanaut hosts 2-day festival



It was much welcoming rain that serenaded with large numbers of Nazrul aficionados in celebration of the bard's 115th birth anniversary, as Chhayanaut organised a two day-long Nazrul Utshab 1421 at its main auditorium on May 24 and 25, for the sixth consecutive year. Artistes of Chhayanaut began the festival with a choral rendition of the song "Hey Partha Sarathi", while a number of artistes, with mangal pradip, presented a lively dance to the patriotic number "Eki Oporoop Roop E Ma Tomaye".

General Secretary of Chhayanaut, Khairul Anam Shakil, delivered the welcome address while Professor Siraj Salekin of Dhaka University delivered the Nazrul memorial lecture at the festival. Dr. Sarwar Ali presented the vote of thanks over the session.

CANNES DIARY

After days of speculations, Nuri Bilge Ceylan's "Winter Sleep" won the prestigious Palme d'or in the main competition at the Cannes. The Istanbul-based director is not new to Cannes. In 1995, he was nominated for the Palme d'Or for Best Short Film. "Winter Sleep" is about Aydin, a former actor who runs a small hotel with his young wife. The couple doesn't have a good relationship. In winter as the snow begins to fall, the hotel becomes theirs, and it becomes place that fuels their animosity. The award was presented by actress Uma Thurman and director Quentin Tarantino.

After the feature film awards, The Grand Prix award, is bestowed by the jury of the festival on one of the competing feature films. It is the second-most prestigious prize of the festival after the Palme d'Or. It was won by Italian film "Le Meraviglie" ("The Wonders") by Alice Rohrwacher. Best Director Award went to Bennett Miller for his work in "Foxcatcher". "Mommy", a Canadian French film by Xavier Dolan won the Jury

Prize along with Jean-Luc Goddard's "Goodbye to Language".

There were more glamorous awards too. The Best Actress Award went to Julianne Moore in "Maps To The Stars" by David Cronenberg, while Timothy Spall in "Mr. Turner" won the best actor award. Short film awards were handed over too, to "Leidi" by Simón Mesa Soto. "Aïssa" by Clément Trehin-Lalanne along with "Ja Vi Elsker" ("Yes we love") by Hallvar.

The evening was full of stars. Lambert Wilson hosted Uma Thurman and Quentin Tarantino on the stage of the Grand Théâtre Lumière to award the Palme d'Or to the best of the 18 films in Competition. Sergio Leone's "Per Un Pugno Di Dollari" ("A Fistful of Dollars") presented by Quentin Tarantino, was screened at the end of the ceremony.

For some those who have been attending the event over years, this year's event was not the best, but it had it moments.
