World Cup finals bound Nigeria had to come from behind twice to draw 2-2 with Scotland in London in a match which is subject to a match fixing investigation.

The build-up to the game between the Africa Cup of Nations champions and the improving Scots had been overshadowed by reports that Britain's serious crime squad had launched a match fixing investigation.

The National Crime Agency, which investigates serious and organised crime, is said to have asked world football's governing body FIFA to issue an alert over attempts to influence the game at Fulham's stadium Craven Cottage.

The NCA are said to have told FIFA they have general information from Asian betting markets suggesting there had been

A FIFA spokesman said they worked closely with law enforcement agencies and other sports organisations to tackle match manipulation, and encouraged anyone with information to contact their integrity hotline or confidential reporting system.

On the pitch Scotland -- now unbeaten in six games under Gordon Strachan -- made the perfect start as Charlie Mulgrew opened the scoring after 10 minutes before Michael Uchebo equalised with four minutes left of the first half.


Scotland came out with plenty of fight after the break and Nigerian goalkeeper Azubuike Egwuekwe turned in James Morrison's cross in the 52nd minute to put the Scots back into the lead.

But super-sub Uche Nwofor converted an equaliser in stoppage time of a game in which they had looked second best throughout.

Mulgrew didn't know too much about his opener as James Morrison rifled in a shot from the edge of the box which cannoned off his team-mate's foot and looped up and over goalkeeper Austine Ejide in the 10th minute.

Swansea snap up Fabianski

Lukasz Fabianski aims to oust Michel Vorm as Swansea City's first choice goalkeeper after rejecting a contract extension with Arsenal and joining their English Premier League rivals on a free transfer on Thursday.

The 29-year-old Polish international signed a fouryear deal, which will be activated upon the expiry of his Arsenal contract on July 1, and becomes Garry Monk's first signing since taking over as manager in February.

"I am very happy with the move, the decision and the club," he told the Swansea website. "For me, it was an easy decision to make.

"If I'm completely honest, the main reason I came to Swansea was because I want to be the number one goalkeeper. I want to play week-in, week-out. It's going to be a real fight, but I'm not afraid of that."

Fabianski, who has won 21 international caps, will compete with Dutch international Vorm for a starting spot at the Liberty Stadium after ending his seven-year spell at the Emirates.

The injury-prone Vorm, who underwent knee surgery in December, was named in the Netherlands' preliminary World Cup squad earlier this month.

Socceroos 1st to touch down

Australia touched down in Brazil on Wednesday to launch their World Cup campaign, the first team to arrive for the tournament.

The Socceroos landed in the southern city of Curitiba before catching a connection to the coastal town of Victoria, where their base camp is located.

Australia are the lowest-ranking of the 32 teams in the tournament -- world number 59 in FIFA's last ranking -- but midfielder Tommy Oar said they were using that as motivation.

"We are the underdogs. It will be a good opportunity for the Australian team to surprise, so this is all very exciting. And being in the 'soccer country' is an extra motivation, of course," Oar said in a statement released by FIFA.

"We've been training for the last few days and things have gone well. We still have some two more weeks to keep on training, so I think we will be well-prepared for the World Cup."

Security was tight for the team's arrival in Curitiba, with officials expecting anti-World Cup protests that never materialized, said an AFP photographer.

Brazil has been hit by a wave of strikes and protests in recent weeks sparked by public anger over the more than \$11 billion being spent on the tournament in a country with urgent needs in education, health and transport.

In the end, however, the only crowd awaiting the Socceroos was a friendly one of about 100 people who welcomed them waving Brazilian flags.

Australia, who are playing in their third straight World Cup, have their first match on June 13 against Chile. They will also face Spain and the Netherlands in a difficult Group A.

The next teams expected in Brazil are Croatia and Iran on June 3. The last arrivals are South Korea, Ghana and Portugal on June 11, the day before the opening match.

The Brazilian side for their part opened their base camp Monday and, after undergoing medical checks, took to the practice pitch for the first time Wednesday.

Germany keeper Manuel Neuer and captain Philipp Lahm kicked off their belated World Cup preparations on Thursday with light training after missing the start of the camp through injury.

Neuer did not do any goalkeeping training and only some light running as he races to recover from his shoulder injury in time for the tournament start next month.

There was more good news for coach Joachim Loew at their northern Italian training camp with Lahm training in part with the team for the first time on Thursday as he also recovers from a foot injury picked up in the German Cup final two weeks ago.

"At the moment they cannot be fully fit with us but it looks good for both of them," defender Jerome Boateng told reporters. "For Manuel it may take a bit longer but it will all work out."

Neuer has been the undisputed number one for four years and there have been concerns in recent days about whether he will be fully fit for Germany's first match on June 16 against Portugal.

been training outside Florence for the last week and, with little real news, Italian media have speculated endlessly on who will be among the unlucky seven. Many other coaches have saved them-

selves the headache, and tension, by announcing their definitive 23-man squad well ahead of the June 2 deadline.

However, after Italy repeatedly ran out of gas during matches at Euro 2012, Prandelli is closely monitoring the players' fitness to make sure that those he takes to Brazil are capable of outlasting the opposition.

The latest consensus is, that of the seven forwards in the provisional squad, Mario Balotelli, Ciro Immobile and Alessio Cerci are certain to make the cut, Antonio Cassano has a good chance and Lorenzo Insigne is likely to be dropped.

That would leave Rossi vying with AS Roma's Mattia Destro, who has also battled back from injury, for the fifth and final spot.

Rossi would certainly get the sympathy vote. The United States born forward's troubles began when he suffered an anterior cruciate ligament injury while playing for Villarreal in a Spanish league match against Real Madrid in 2011.

He fought desperately to be fit for Euro 2012, only to re-injure the knee in training and miss the tournament.

He made an excellent comeback with Fiorentina this season, scoring 14 goals by early January to make him Serie A's leading scorer.

However, he then suffered a less serious injury, a second degree sprain to the medial collateral ligament, in the same knee which sidelined him until the start of this month.

"He is a talent with great quality, one of the best in Italy," said Prandelli. "He is determined, hungry and made a thousand sacrifices to be here in the running for the World Cup.

"He is the proof that champions need to have character and he can set the example for everyone. Clearly, he has to be in good shape and that's what we want to see. "His determination, his desire to make all

the sacrifices to be here is a demonstration that even the great players have to put in effort. This is a good lesson for the whole group." Team doctor Enrico Castellacci said on

Tuesday that Saturday's friendly against Ireland in London could be crucial for Rossi. "Clinically, he is fine but he will be evalu-

ated during the game, and then, of course, it is up to Prandelli to decide whether or not to call him up."

Elsewhere, eight of the current 10 midfielders are likely to make the trip.

Andrea Pirlo, Claudio Marchisio, Thiago Motta, Riccardo Montolivo, Daniele de Rossi and Antonio Candreva are regarded as certainties, leaving Romulo, Marco Verratti, Marco Parolo and Alberto Aquilani to battle for two more places.

Of the five central defenders in the provisional squad, Juventus trio Giorgio Chiellini, Leonardo Bonucci and Andrea Barzagli should be safe and Gabriel Paletta is also expected to make the cut at the expense of Inter Milan's Andrea Ranocchia.
