Upholding legacy of classical music developed across Bangladesh, Bengal Foundation organised a classical music soiree at Dhanmondi's Bengal Shilpalaya on May 30. The soiree, titled "Barendra Dhrupad Shaili", featured khayal and dhrupad performances by several teachers and students of the Department of Music of Rajshahi University (RU)

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DG, Bengal Foundation Luva Nahid Choudhury delivered the welcome address while Chhayanaut guru Dr. Rezwan Ali Lablu elaborated on classical music at the event.

Moushumi Biswas set off the soiree with a khayal on Raga Madhuvanti. Moushumi's immersion in the vilambit bandish (on vilambit ektaal) "Sham Bhayee Ghanosham Nehi Aaye" of the raga was evocative. The artiste's drut bandish (on teentaal) "Kahey Maan Karo Sakhi Ri Ab", her bolbaat and drut sargam taan performance were commendable. Tabla

artiste Iftekhar Alam Pradhan Dollar performed well, presenting

a lahora.

Golden Mondal next performed khayal on Raga Bhinno Saroj. Promising artiste Salok Hossain then performed with surmandal in a romantic Raga Behag. His vilambit bandish "Kawana Dhang Tora" was on vilambit ektaal while his drut bandish "Ab Hoon Lalan Mein Ka" was on teentaal. Salok's ragdari, pukar, bol-baat, and akar taan performance were quite fascinating. Dollar's tabla lahora followed by a nine-guna tehai was well received by the audience. The highlight of the evening was

a jugalbandi dhrupad performance by noted artiste Dr. Asit Roy and his disciple Md. Alamgir Parvez. Both artistes are the teachers of the Department of Music of RU. The artiste duo started off with a dhrupad alap followed by jor and jhala set on Raga Malkauns. Accomplished Pakhawaj artiste Sushen Roy accompanied the artiste duo on choutaal during the

dhrupad bandish. Asit Roy and

another dhrupad bandish "Shankara Girija Pati" on sultaal. The performance had remarkable features including gamak, meend, ragdari, pukar and outstanding layakari and bol-baat in mandra saptak.

Dr. Asit Roy's equal interplay of melody in three saptak (octaves) together with chhut gamak in mandra saptak evoked the melancholy of Malkauns. The blissful silence in the audience said it all.

The artiste duo later performed a dhrupad alap and dhrupad bandish "Barase Jhuma Jhuma" set on a monsoon raga Mian Ki Malhar.

Rajshahi is one of the prominent cities of the Barendra region of Bangladesh. Eminent kirtania of Dhrupad Shaili Narottam Das Goswami and eminent music guru Sangeetacharya Radhika Mohan Maitra were born in that part of Bengal. Legendary vocal maestros of the sub-continent Ustad Faiyaz Khan, Ustad Bade Ghulam Ali Khan along with Sarodia Ustad Mohammad Amir Khan left their footprints at the Padma and the Mahananda-washed region.

Pandit Amaresh Roy Chowdhury performs at IGCC

Eminent classical vocalist Pandit Amaresh Roy Chowdhury performed in a solo soiree of classical music at Indira Gandhi Cultural Centre (IGCC), Gulshan, Dhaka on May 30.

The 86-year old vocalist performed two khayal, a Nazrul Sangeet "Mahabidya Adyashakti" and an adhunik song "Modhur Amar Mayer Hashi" in one a half hour long soiree. The artiste started off with an evening Raga Yaman

that was set on vilambit ektaal, jaap taal and teentaal. Later, Roy presented another khayal set on Raga Abhogi. The performance was on vilambit ektaal and teentaal. The artiste's performed a variety of sargam, bistar and

taan. His immaculate ragdari and exquisite pukar stood out among other features of his performances, taking his presentation to a spiritual height.

Jatan Kumar Paul on tabla, Dr. Jagadananda Roy on harmonium and Aloke Kumar Sen on tanpura accompanied the artiste.

Born in 1928 at Faridpur, Pandit Amaresh Roy Chowdhury learned classical music from legendary



classical vocalists -- Sudhir Lal Chakrabarty, Harihar Shukla and Tarapada Chakrabarty. He also took lessons on adhunik songs, Atulprasad's songs, Nazrul Sangeet and Shyama Sangeet from Netrakona's noted artiste and composer, Nikhil Chandra Sen.

Chowdhury has received many awards and titles during his illustrious career. These include Sanket Sangskritik Goshthi award in 1981; "Ustad Gul Mohammad Memorial Award" by Sangeet Academy, Dhaka in 1982; "Gunijan Sammanona" by Bangladesh Shilpakala Academy, Dhaka in 1997; National Leader Shaheed "AHM Kamaruzzaman Sammanona Smarok" on the Victory Day in 2010 and "Rabindra Padak" by Jatiya Rabindra Sangeet Sammilan Parishad in 2014.

IGCC in association with Asian Paints, IRCON and Marico Bangladesh organised the event.

A mixed bag of refreshing melodies Gaan Pagol gives debut performance at Bokultola

Bangladesh's music scene has seen a great deal of variety in bands, in terms of genres. From Western influenced pop, rock and the extremities of metal to folk and experimental sounds, listeners have had a taste of it all. However, the newest band to have announced themselves on the scene has taken a path that has not been treaded before: of having Hindustani

classical music at its core. Mohammad Shoeb is a familiar name to those who have been following the country's music scene closely; a teacher at the Department of Music at Dhaka University, he has been performing with Arnob, as part of his ensemble Arnob & Friends, for a while. He is the centre-piece of the 10-man band Gaan Pagol -- that had its launching concert at the Bokultola of Charukola (Faculty of Fine Arts, Dhaka University) on a cool Friday evening (May 30).

Shoeb said the band's motto is to hold classical music at the heart of their music; the band feels that whatever type of music one does, they must know the grammar. Whatever the theme of their lyrics were -- patriotism, nature and seasons, love, or the song about themselves called



"Gaan Pagoler Dol", the touch of classical music was evident. While some of the tracks were based more on classical styles -- one of them styled like a thumri, there were folkbased compositions, one of them Santal-flavoured and another from an Ahamiya (originated from Assam, India) groove and a rather typical contemporary band-like song, the essence of classical music was clear in all of them. The band also did an Abdul Alim classic "Kar Lagiya Gatho Phooler Mala" and a Rabindra Sangeet "Pagla Hawa'r Badol Dine".

The instrumental arrangement of the band was elaborate; from traditional instruments like guitars and

bass, flute and violin, tastes of folk were brought in by the Khamak and mandira, Western and Eastern flavours intertwined with the use of cello and mandolin, while the percussion ranged from cajon to the djembe (African floor-drum), symbals and South Indian instrument

ghatam. Shoeb's light-hearted demeanour and humourous quips and comments made the performance even more pleasurable, as he went on to introduce every member with a little bit of back-story about everybody. The instrumental arrangements were also fairly compact, and Shoeb's silky vocals were backed up harmoniously by the others when needed.
