Resilient KKR against first timers KXIP

The focus has remained firmly on cricket this time around and in what seems to be the perfect finale, the season's most consistent team Kings XI Punjab would eye a maiden triumph against the everresilient Kolkata Knight Riders in the title clash of the seventh Indian Premier League here on Sunday.

After a few controversymarred seasons, the IPL organisers can finally heave a sigh of relief with the ongoing edition passing off rather smoothly.

Having cracked a 58-ball 122 that paved the way for KXIP's entry into their first IPL final, veteran opener Virender Sehwag along with Glenn Maxwell and David Miller will be the biggest threat for KKR, who will bank on their strong bowling unit, led by Sunil Narine.

Players from both sides will have their job cut out as they will look to gift their owners Shah Rukh Khan and Priety Zinta the trophy.

Unlike Kolkata, who have won the title once before, Punjab have never been a part of the finals.

For Kolkata, to repeat the feat of lifting the trophy for the second time, however, will be a daunting task considering the opponents they are faced with.

Sheikh Russel stop the rot

Sheikh Russel KC won their first match under new coach Dragon Djukanovic, in the Bangladesh Premier League, after a 3-1 win over second-frombottom Feni Soccer

Club at the Bangabandhu National Stadium yesterday.

Last season's treble-winners, who had lost three of their previous four matches since Djukanovic took over

the coach's job on April 20, took a 2-0 lead in the first half through strikes from Anwar Hossain and Mohammad Sumon, before Mathew Mendy reduced the arrears in the 78th minute for Feni. Substitute midfielder Pascal Millien restored the two-goal lead for Sheikh Russel just before the final whistle.

The win lifted the defending champions to sixth position with 20 points from 16 matches while Feni remained in ninth position with 11 points from 18 matches.

Sheikh Russel took the lead in the eighth minute when Anwar finished off a move from Sumon by slotting in a left-footed shot from inside the box. The All Blues dominated play in the first half and doubled the lead in the 28th minute when Sumon side-volleyed from top of the six-yard box on a cross from Fazle Rabbi.

Feni got their act together in the second half and after a spate of attacks, minimised the deficit through Mendy, who received a through pass in the middle of the Russel half and ran past the opposition defenders before rounding the keeper and slotting at the back of the net. The match saw a few more endto-end attacks and one of those, deep into stoppage time, resulted in Sheikh Russel's third goal. Haitian playmaker Millien, who had come in as a substitute midway through the first half, took an ambitious shot from just inside the box, which managed to slip under the Feni goalkeeper Mohammad Nehal and into the net after taking a deflection off a defender.

Rafael Nadal produced another imposing display of claycourt tennis at Roland Garros on Saturday to crush Argentine Leonardo Mayer 6-2, 7-5, 6-2 and reach the last 16 of the French Open.

Seeking to become the first man to win five straight titles in Paris and the first to win nine times at the same Grand Slam, Nadal has lost just 19 games in getting to the last 16.

At the same stage last year en route to his eighth French Open title, Nadal had dropped two sets and lost 48 games. Next up for the Spaniard, who will turn 28 on Tuesday, is

little-known Serb Dusan Lajovic, who saw off American hope Jack Sock 6-4, 7-5, 6-3. The man Nadal defeated in last year's final, fellow

Spaniard David Ferrer, also reached the last 16 by defeating Andreas Seppi of Italy 6-2, 7-6 (7/2), 6-3. In the women's draw, Svetlana Kuznetsova led a seniors surge into the last 16 on the day with a marathon win over

Petra Kvitova as Roland Garros lost the fourth of its top five seeds. Kuznetsova, 28, won a three-hour 13 minute thriller to defeat fifth-seeded Kvitova 6-7 (3/7), 6-1, 9-7 in the the

longest match of the women's tournament. The 2009 champion capitalised on Kvitova's 65 unforced

errors and 10 double faults to set-up a fourth round clash with another Czech, 27-year-old Lucie Safarova. Former Wimbledon champion Kvitova, a semifinalist

in 2012, had enjoyed a 3-0 career edge over the Russian going into Saturday's clash, but her efforts were undermined by twice needing medical timeouts to treat a back and leg injury. She saved two match points in the 12th game of the

USA 1994 Brazil conquer new world

From a disco diva to the 'Divine Ponytail', USA '94 ended in the same way it began -- with the horror of a missed penalty. Roberto Baggio's missed spot-kick in the shoot-out which handed Brazil their fourth title, was the final act of a thrilling tournament that had tragedy of a murdered player and the disgrace of a legend's failed drugs test, yet succeeded in conquering football's final frontier -- the United States.

Despite the often fearsome heat and humidity, USA '94 witnessed some thrilling games and shocks, starting with the Republic of Ireland's victory over Italy in New York. Italy, though, recovered to reach the last 16 and were only 90 seconds away from being eliminated by Nigeria until Baggio came alive -- following up his own equaliser with an extra-time penalty winner.

Argentina imploded against the talented Romanians after Diego Maradona, still their talisman at the age of 33, tested positive for a performance-enhancing drug and was expelled from the tournament.

But even that shocking news was put into perspective by the fate of Andres Escobar, who was gunned down outside a restaurant in his home city of Medellin just days after his own goal in a 2-1 defeat by the hosts.

Brazil were left as the only non-European team in the quarterfinals. With the exception of their strikers, Romario and Bebeto, Carlos Alberto Parreira's side had less flair than their predecessors but far more steel, personified by their captain Dunga, which was a quality they needed to see off the US after having Leonardo sent off before half-time for a vicious but uncharacteristic elbow that shattered Tab Ramos's cheekbone.

They could still turn on the Samba style when needed, however, and Branco's brutal free-kick settled their classic last-eight clash with the Netherlands. Elsewhere, another late show from Baggio edged out Spain and the biggest upset of the tournament saw outsiders Bulgaria knock out holders Germany. Sweden

joined them in the last four, but only after a nail-biting end to their clash with Romania, which was decided on penalties.

The high-scoring Swedes were up against Brazil for a place in their first final since 1958 but, having fought out a 1-1 draw during the group stage, they were beaten, thanks to Romario's 80th-minute header.

Another two-goal salvo from Baggio had ended Bulgaria's run and set up a rematch of 1970 final. The final saw two exhausted sides fight out a tame stalemate at the Rose Bowl in Pasadena and for the first time, a World Cup final was to be decided on penalties.

Baresi and Marcio Santos both missed and, after an exchange of two successful kicks, Daniele Massaro's poor effort was saved by Claudio Taffarel. After Dunga had given Brazil the advantage, up stepped Baggio, so deadly all tournament. He blazed over, choosing power over the precision that had served him

so well, and Brazil were crowned champions for the fourth time.

For Parreira success was vindication of his belief that Brazil would only regain their mantle as world champions if they added defensive discipline to their attacking verve. "Although most of the Brazilian and international press were always criticising my philosophy, I stuck by my ideas and my principles," he said afterwards. "It feels great because, like Frank Sinatra in that song, I did it my way."
