Attack on Khasis An injured attacker

A tea worker who was injured during a clash with Khasis in Moulvibazar's Srimangal upazila on Friday died yesterday morning.

The victim, Nitay Tanti, 40, was one of the two hundred people the Nahar Tea Estate authorities collected to attack the neighbouring Nahar Punjee-1, a Khasi village, in an attempt to evict the indigenous people and grab the land.

He was hit in the back of head by a marble-shaped earthen ball, which a Khasi man fired from a slingshot to resist the attackers. Nitay breathed his last at 5:30am in Osmani Medical College Hospital, Sylhet, said police.

A duty-doctor told The Daily Star that they could not primarily determine the cause of his death but said the wound bled profusely. The body was sent for autopsy.

INSTITUTIONAL FLAGS Restrictive HC directives sought

A writ petition was filed with the High Court yesterday seeking its directives on the government to stop people, other than officials of constitutional and statutory institutions, from using institutional flags.

Two Supreme Court lawyers filed the petition praying to the HC to order the government to insert a provision in the Bangladesh Flag Rules, 1972 regarding only constitutional and statutory bodies' officials using institutional flags.

Kamal Hossain Meahzi and Md Shamsul Islam submitted the petition saying that lack of such a provision resulted in many private individuals and organisations making and using their own flags.

Detained JU BCL men freed

Police early yesterday freed the 13 Bangladesh Chhatra League (BCL) men of Jahangirnagar University who were detained on Sunday on the charge of trying to extort bus

The decision came after the university authorities, the university unit BCL, police officials, and bus owners discussed the issue, and the detainees signed an undertaking committing not to do such acts in future.

The BCL men led by JU unit deputy sports secretary Abdur Rahim Jewel stopped three buses of Hanif Enterprise in front of the campus at 4:00pm Sunday and demanded "compensation" for a Hanif bus hitting a private car of one of Jewel's relatives in Sirajganj district the day before.

The ruling party-backed students also confined three bus staff to Mir Mosharraf Hossain Hall for more than 20 minutes before police rescued them and detained the 13 BCL workers and leaders, including Jewel. The bus passengers

ACC to probe crest impurity

The Anti-Corruption Commission has decided to investigate the allegations of impurity in the crests awarded to foreign friends and organisations for their outstanding contribution to the country's Liberation War.

ACC Chairman M Bodiuzzaman confirmed the decision. "The decision was made at our regular meeting. However, we are yet to assign any investigation officer [to look into the matter]," he told The Daily Star yesterday.

According to media reports, a Bangladesh Standards and Testing Institution (BSTI) test of the shields found that each shield only had 2.363 grams of

EC to seek help from ministries

The Election Commission will request the home and foreign ministries to take necessary steps to facilitate the commission for giving opportunity of registering the people of enclaves along with Bangladesh-India border on electoral rolls.

"As the people have to reach the enclaves through Indian territory, we need cooperation from the foreign ministry. Besides, the enclaves are located at the bordering areas, we need security to go there," said Sirazul Islam, acting secretary of the EC Secretariat.

'We will soon send letters to the two ministries requesting to arrange the necessary facilities to conduct

the electoral roll updating programme there," he told reporters at his office yesterday.

During electoral roll updating programme in 2012, the then EC also sent similar letters to the two ministries. But the ministries did not give approval to register the enclave's people on electoral roll saying that the dispute over the enclaves remains unresolved with

Talking to The Daily Star, several officials of the EC Secretariat said the commission will send letters just for formalities assuming that the ministries will not give approval to it.

There are 111 Indian exclaves within Bangladesh, while 51 Bangladesh's exclaves are inside

Ershad slams AL, BNP

Tipaimukh Dam Hydrological survey of Surma starts

A seven-member team of Bangladeshi officials yesterday started a bathymetric survey on a 2km portion of the Kushiyara, which is flowing in India's Assam state before entering Bangladesh again in Sylhet.

The surveyors from the state-run Institute of Water Modelling (IWM) will investigate the hydrological impacts of India's proposed 1,500MW Tipaimukh hydropower dam project, an official, Mir

Sajjad Hossain, told The Daily Star. India's Barak river enters into Bangladesh from Assam state through Amolshid border in Zakiganj upazila of Sylhet and bifurcates into the Surma and the Kushiyara.

The "Hydrological Survey for Tipaimukh Dam" is expected to take a week. After the Kushiyara, the officials will work on a 12km stretch of the Surma. The study will cover the Indian sides of the rivers this time. Earlier, parts of the rivers which flow only through Bangladesh were surveyed.

Mastermind of Madaripur murders held
