Torrential rain submerges Dhaka again

Different areas in capital went under knee-deep water causing sufferings for commuters STAFF CORRESPONDENT

Torrential rain, which put different areas of the capital from ankle-deep to knee-deep water yesterday, disrupted city life, causing immense sufferings for commuters.

Commuters mostly school- and office-goers faced problems in reaching their destinations in the morning due to huge traffic congestion triggered by the rain that started yesterday morning.

The capital's different areas including Baridhara, Sukrabad, Paschim Rajabazar, Green Road, Paschim Testuri Bazar, Tollabag, Alubazar, Shuritola, Najirabazar, DIT plot of Gandaria, road behind the Bangabhaban, Shantinagar, Mouchak and Fakirapool went under knee-deep water.

The rainwater compelled many commuters to walk miles for going to their destination leaving buses that stuck to the nearly unending tailback. Vast areas



Vulture population drop threat to human health

Experts tell roundtable

The elimination of vultures is posing serious threats to human health in the country, as other birds and animals like dogs, rats, crows are consuming the carcasses of infected animals and spreading diseases like anthrax, rabies, said experts at a roundtable yesterday.

Only vultures can digest meat at any stage of decay, but other animals cannot and thus spread the germs from the carcasses through their droppings, they said.

The vulture population has declined to only 500 in Bangladesh due to the use of some non-steroidal anti-inflammatory drugs (NSAIDs) like ketoprofen and salicyclate for treating cattle.

Consumption of carcasses treated with NSAIDs such as diclofenac ketoprofen, sodium salicyclate are the primary cause of

vulture mortality, according to research. The speakers demanded the government

implement the ban on such medicines. The decline in the vulture population provide Tk 295.71 crore, and Tk 32 crore will come from the and the increase in zoonotic diseases of human are directly co-related, said eminent

bird expert Enam Ul Haque, presenting his keynote paper, "Vultures and Public Health".

Citing different studies conducted in

India, he showed how zoonotic dieses like anthrax, rabies which are transmitted from animals to human are increasing there. "Though we don't have any such study here, we can say the effect of vulture declination would be same here too."

The government earlier banned another drug called diclofenac, but it is still available in the market and people are using it ille-

"Diclofenac is being used in 16 percent cases. However, alternative effective medicines for cattle which are safe vultures are available," said Enam.

The scenario of vultures is same in whole South Asia, as 99.9 percent of vultures have disappeared there in the last two decades due to the use of NSAIDs.

The International Union for Conservation of Nature (IUCN) organised the roundtable at Jatiya Press Club in the capital.

A convict in Awami League lawmaker Ahsanullah Master murder case died yesterday at Dhaka Medical College Hospital a day after he was admitted there.

Al Amin, 36, son of Joynal Abedin, of Narayanganj, was admitted to the hospital with Kidney complications, said DMCH sources.

A Dhaka court on April 16, 2005, handed down death sentence to 22 people, including Al Amin, for shooting the AL leader dead at a rally of Swechchhasebak League in Tongi in 2004.

The case is now pending with High Court.

Tongi police said Al Amin fell sick at Kashimpur-2 central jail on June 17. He was shifted to DMCH from Gazipur Sadar Hospital, reports our Gazipur correspondent.

Md Munna, nephew of the deceased, claimed that Al Amin was a vegetable vendor of Tongi and local Awami league leaders implicated him in the case.
