### Nur Hossain's driver held

Police arrested the driver of Nur Hossain, the prime suspect in the sensational seven-murder in Narayanganj, from Comilla's

Chandina upazila early yesterday. Golam Morshed, officer-in-charge of Chandina Police Station, said that acting on a tip-off, police raided Belashwar village around 3:00am and nabbed the driver, Zubaer alias Jabbar, from his in-laws' house.

Seven people, including Narayanganj city panel mayor Nazrul Islam and senior lawyer Chandan Kumar Sarker, were abducted from the city on April 27.

Later, their bodies were recovered from Narayanganj's Shitalakhya river. After the incident, Zubaer was hiding in that house, Morshed said.

Nur Hossain, a Narayanganj city Awami League leader and also a councillor of the city, along with his two associates was arrested from an apartment in Kolkata on the night of June 14.

Later, they were booked under the arms act and the foreigners act for illegal trespass into Indian territory without valid travel documents and for illegal possession of a firearm.

### Language-split Belgium teeters back into crisis

Belgium risked plunging into a fresh political crisis yesterday after attempts to form a coalition government collapsed amid allegations Flemish nationalists were not committed to keeping the country together.

Tough-talking Flemish nationalist Bart De Wever, whose separatist N-VA party won last month's general election, has been tasked by the king to form a coalition government. But Centrist Benoit Lutgen

refused to join the proposed coalition, saying he had failed to win assurances that De Wever would keep the language-divided nation intact. A De Wever-led government

would be "a Belgo-sceptic project, Lutgen told Belgian broadcaster RTL late Tuesday. "The wolf does not become a lamb in a few weeks."

The fear is that Belgium repeats the crisis of four years ago when a record-breaking impasse left the country 541 days without a govern-

The N-VA won 32 percent of the vote in Flanders, making it the most popular party.

The bank's board of directors yesterday blamed Solaiman, also former chairman of the bank, for misappropriating another Tk 25 crore in the name of loans.

"We have detected more cases of embezzlement of another Tk 25 crore by Solaiman, and the bank has decided to file another criminal case against him," AK Azad, chairman of the bank, told a briefing at the bank's headquarters in Gulshan after an emergency board meeting.

"We have also found that he was involved in the Bismillah Towels loan scam," said Azad, also former president of the Federation of Bangladesh Chambers of Commerce and Industry.

Farman R Chowdhury, managing director of the bank, said Solaiman embezzled the money in collusion with his nephew ANM Jahangir, the then manager of the bank's Jubilee Road branch in Chittagong.

Jahangir is one of the four accused. Farman alleged Solaiman had influenced the bank to lend Tk 140 crore to SK Steel in Chittagong in 2011.

Solaiman also put pressure on the bank's management to give a loan of

Tk 25 crore to Joynob Steel that year. In both cases, Solaiman gave false assurances about the loans, promoting the clients as good borrowers, said Farman.

Speaking at the briefing, Azad said the bank ran enquiries and found that Paradise Corporation, owned by Solaiman, took more than Tk 18 crore in bribe from SK Steel in 61 cheques, and Tk 7.63 crore from Joynob Steel in 10 cheques. Azad said his bank has written to

Bangladesh Bank for taking action against Solaiman. Farman said the bank's non-

performing loans rose to Tk 750 crore or 8.5 percent of its total loans in recent months due to the embezzle-

The other two accused are Enamul Haque, chairman of Paradise Corporation and Aminul Haque, a director of Paradise Corporation.

The loan recovery time expired in November 2013, according to the case statement.

A telling pass by Fernando Gago found Angel di Maria only for the Real Madrid man's shot to ricochet off the near post. As the loose ball bounced Messi magically appeared to slam into the roof of Vincent Enveama's net.

Argentina's lead lasted all of 80 seconds when CSKA Moscow striker Ahmed Musa curled the ball artfully past Sergio Romero into the far post. Enyeama then did well to keep the

scores level when keeping out di Maria's thunderous low drive from 30m out. On 38 minutes Argentina coach Alejandro Sabella was forced into an

Sergio Aguero limped off to be replaced by Ezequiel Lavezzi. As the interval approached Messi struck a peach of a free kick from outside the box, only denied by

unscripted change of personnel when

another fine save from Enyeama. But the Lille stopper couldn't perform the same heroics when from a near identical position shortly after another Messi free kick thudded into the near corner for his fourth goal of the tournament.

Musa levelled only two minutes into the second half when, getting the better of Argentine defenders Federico Fernandez and Marcos Rojo, he clipped the ball past Romero.

In an at times breathtaking encounter Rojo bagged his first international goal three minutes later, knocking the ball home with his knee off a corner after Nigeria failed to clear

Ezequiel Garay's header. With his work done Sabella rested 16.

Messi on the hour, Ricardo Alvarez coming on in his place.

Musa had 'hattrick' flashing in front of his eyes in the final quarter of an hour when he cut inside Pablo Zabaleta only for the Manchester City defender to produce a superb tackle to deny him the scoring opportunity.

The group finished with Argentina on nine points, Nigeria on four, Bosnia on three and Iran on one.

The match at Beira Rio stadium was as close as Argentine will come to a home game at this World Cup as an estimated 150,000 fans flooded across the border into this southern port city looking to get in on the party.

Although Argentina were guaranteed a place in the last 16, the twice champions still had plenty to play for on a drizzly day with top spot up for grabs and the soccer world waiting for the Sky Blues to flash their championship credentials after uninspiring wins over debutants Bosnia and unfancied Iran. Bosnia's victory was their first World Cup win.

Already eliminated after two losses, Bosnia, appearing at a major tournament for the first time as an independent nation, went ahead in the 23rd minute through Edin Dzeko.

Bosnia doubled their lead just before the hour through Miralem Pjanic's cool finish before Reza Ghoochannejhad pulled a goal back for Iran in the 82nd minute.

Avdija Vrsajevic restored Bosnia's two-goal cushion with a fine strike a minute later.

Iran had required all three points against Bosnia and needed Argentina to beat Nigeria to have any shot of grabbing a surprise place in the last

between Dhaka and Delhi. "We are expecting that she will carry a positive message of engagement between the two countries and this visit will take bilateral relations to a higher level," said a

top foreign ministry official. Dhaka is also optimistic that the Indian minister's visit will pave the way for an early trip by Indian Prime Minister Narendra Modi to

Bangladesh, he added. Foreign Minister AH Mahmood Ali, Foreign Secretary Shahidul Hauqe, Indian High Commissioner to Bangladesh Pankaj Saran and other senior officials from the foreign ministry and the Indian mission in Dhaka received Swaraj at Shahjalal International Airport around 10:50pm.

Diplomatic sources in Dhaka and New Delhi said though there was no big expectation about the outcome of the trip, India termed it a "goodwill visit" aimed at taking forward the bilateral ties which have been on a "positive track" for the last few years.

Swaraj will hold a meeting with Mahmood Ali and call on President Abdul Hamid and Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina.

She will also meet Leader of the Opposition Raushan Ershad, BNP Chairperson Khaleda Zia and prime minister's advisers Gowher Rizvi and Mashiur Rahman. Welcoming the Indian minister's

trip to Dhaka, BNP acting secretary general Mirza Fakhrul Islam Alamgir yesterday said his party was hopeful that her visit would have a positive impact on resolving outstanding bilateral issues, including the LBA and Teesta water sharing deal.

Talking to The Daily Star yesterday, Indian diplomats in Dhaka said Swaraj was not here with a "specific agenda" and that the minister would review bilateral ties and what to expect in the coming years.

However, they added, the sevenmember Indian delegation, which is expected to raise issues like illegal

immigration and fresh proposals for road and railway transit, is also prepared that Bangladesh will table the LBA and Teesta water sharing issues.

Meanwhile, in a significant devel-

opment, the Indian external affairs minister before departing for Dhaka yesterday spoke to West Bengal Chief Minister Mamata Banerjee about her three-day trip.

According to India's official news agency PTI, Swaraj made a call to Banerjee to "touch-base" and told the latter about her impending trip to Dhaka.

Significantly, the previous Congress government failed to ratify the LBA and sign the Teesta water sharing deal with Bangladesh due to opposition from the BJP, Trinamool Congress and

Asom Gana Parishad. The LBA, which is yet to be ratified by the Indian parliament, is aimed at redrawing the international boundary between the two neighbours by exchanging adversely-held areas and enclaves along with population on either side, thus making the highly porous Indo-Bangla border more

manageable. According to the visiting minister's schedule, the bilateral talks will be held at the foreign ministry today between 9:30am and 10:45am.

Swaraj and Ali will lead their respective sides at the meeting. They will discuss trade and investment, security, connectivity, border management, water, power, shipping, renewable energy, development cooperation, art and culture, among other issues. After the official talks, the Indian

minister will meet the PM at the latter's office. In the afternoon, she will call on President Abdul Hamid and deliver a lecture at a talk on "India-Bangladesh Relations: A Framework for Cooperation", organised by the Bangladesh Institute of International and Strategic Studies at Ruposhi Bangla Hotel at 6:30pm.

Prior to leaving Dhaka on Friday noon, Swaraj will meet the two advisers of the prime minister, opposition leader Raushan Ershad and BNP chief Khaleda Zia.

Chhatra League activists allegedly stabbed and cut tendons of its Pear Ali College unit president in the district's Sreepur upazila yesterday.

The victim, Sarwar Jahan Sohel, has been undergoing treatment at a private hospital in Dhaka. His condition is stated to be critical.

Sources said Billal Mamun, vicepresident of Sreepur upazila unit BCL, the student wing of the ruling Awami League, got locked into an altercation with Sarwar on the college campus over a trifling matter on Monday.

Following the altercation, BCL activists, numbering 10-12, led by Billal attacked Sarwar at Proshika intersection in the morning when he was on his way to the college. They hacked Billal with sharp weapons and severed the tendons in his left hand, leaving him seriously injured.

Billal was rushed to a clinic at Mawna Chowrasta. He was later shifted to Dhaka as his condition deteriorated.

Mohsin-Ul-Kadir, officer-in-charge of Sreepur Model Police Station, said police visited the spot.

# S Africa platinum mineworkers back to work

Thousands of miners on South Africa's platinum belt streamed back to work yesterday after reaching a wage deal with leading global producers that ended a crippling five-month strike. Workers at Anglo America Platinum

(Amplats), Impala Platinum and Lonmin started making their way to the mines outside Rustenburg from as early as 5.00am (0300 GMT), setting the northwestern town abuzz for the first time in months.

"I feel like a new employee all over again," said Andries Phala. "I'm glad the strike is over. I'm also

happy that our return will make a small difference in our wages," said Phala, who has worked at Lonmin for 14 years. Some workers were in full under-

ground mining gear, with hard hats

and reflective overalls, but it is

expected to take several weeks for production to get into full swing. Companies reported a combined loss of 24 billion rand (\$2.27 billion) in earnings and said workers lost 10.6 billion

rand in wages, as a result of the longest mining strike in South Africa's history. "Being without income was difficult

for everyone, everything stood still. This bit of an increase will definitely motivate us to work harder," said an underground employee at one of Anglo American Platinum mines. "We also deserve our share in the

wealth of this country," he added. The wage deal signed by the three

companies on Tuesday will see the lowest paid workers whose basic salary is less than 12,500 rand (\$1,180) increase by 1,000 rand (\$95) a month for two years and by 950 rand in the third year. Workers had originally demanded

that basic wages be increased to 12,500 rand -- which would have represented a more than doubling of income for The union representing the workers,

the Association of Mineworkers and Construction Union (AMCU, acknowledged that not all workers would reach a 12,500 rand basic wage under the new three-year deal, but has described the strike as a victory.

The government and business have welcomed the end to the strike, which pushed the economy into contraction in the first quarter of the year, but many media commentators warned more problems lie ahead.
