Bangladeshis in Iraq

700 workers go on strike

As many as 700 Bangladeshis yesterday went on work abstention protesting against assault of a fellow worker and lack of security at their workplace in Baghdad, the capital of troubletorn Iraq. Iraqi police arrested Saiful on

Friday in Bismaya New City Project area, 10 kilometres away from Baghdad, where the agitated migrants work under Hanwha Engineering and Construction, a South Korean com-"The police arrested Saiful yester-

day [Friday] who is an Imam at our company mosque. They took him to a secret place and beat him up. On Friday night they left him near our labour camp," Abu Orthi [not his real name], one of the migrants, told The Daily Star over phone. The workers did not call off the

strike till filing of this report yesterday evening. A number of Bangladeshis, who work at the administration level of the company, were also trying to resolve the issue.

Iraqi army personnel had also searched the company's labour camps to find suspected Sunni rebels and ordered the migrants to maintain their (Iraqis') instruction, Abu alleged.

Samyabadi Dal faction joins BNP-led combine

A faction of Samyabadi Dal last night joined the BNP-led alliance, turning it into a 20-party coalition now.

Led by Sayeed Ahmed, general secretary of Samyabadi Dal, around 50 leaders of the left-leaning party joined the opposition alliance by presenting a bouquet to alliance chief Khaleda Zia at her Gulshan office.

Welcoming Samyabadi Dal, Khaleda later announced the official inclusion of the party in the alliance.

On June 4, the faction leaders called on Khaleda and expressed their eagerness to join the opposition alliance. Later the 19-party alliance leaders agreed in principle to include Samyabadi Dal in the coalition.

Earlier, a faction of the Jatiya Party led by Kazi Zafar Ahmed joined the opposition alliance after the January 5 election was boycotted by the BNPled combine.

Sinohydro was awarded seven out of 10 packages of the Dhaka-Chittagong highway project.

Instead of blacklisting the company for breaching contract and refusing to complete the expansion of Dhaka-Chittagong highway, the communications ministry has been persuading it into doing the job.

In January 2010, Sinohydro Corporation won the contract for expanding around 140 kilometres of the highway into a dual carriageway by December 2013. After that, it started dillydallying to do the job, saying it would not finish the work unless the allocation is

increased which it can't do as per the procurement rules. The government then sought help of the Chinese envoy in Dhaka to resolve the problem but still the performance of the firm is frustrating,

FROM PAGE 16 considering morning to evening operations of the airports in Chittagong and Sylhet in 1984. The operation time and airports' capacity expanded, but the manpower remained the same," Caab Director (ATS/Aerodromes) Azad Zahurul Islam said.

He said the manpower shortage plagued all airports and units as there has not been a recruitment for around four years due to a court order. The court issued the order after

some daily basis employees filed a writ seeking the court's order banning new recruitments until their services were regularised. Azad, however, said the writ had

recently been vacated, clearing the way for recruitments.

The closure of Shah Amanat

International Airport in Chittagong and MAG Osmani International Airport in Sylhet is causing inconvenience to different airlines, particularly Biman Bangladesh Airlines, sources said.

Biman officials said in case of delays of any scheduled flights to Chittagong and Sylhet airports, they would have to land the plane at Shahjalal and then fly to the airports when they open, causing sufferings to passengers and loss to Biman.

In reply to the Biman managing director's request for an early watch extension at Sylhet airport, Azad wrote on June 19 that due to the acute shortage of manpower in all airports, same set of officers and staff continue to work for 18-22 hours, which was not safe for operation considering human performance.

He requested the Biman MD to consider the shortage of manpower and the performance limitation before asking for early watch or watch extensions. Azad told The Daily Star that the

Caab was still keeping the operation of the airports open when they are requested for delayed flights, but he feared Caab might not continue to do so in future. The existing Caab organogram, approved upon an ordinance in

1985, has 3,716 posts with a chairman as its head. Caab is awaiting government approval for its restructured organogram that proposes creating around 7,000 new jobs to correct serious lapses in security, supervision and monitoring at airports.

Caab had submitted the draft organogram to the civil aviation ministry in February last year pro-

posing 13,776 posts for officials and staff. The ministry after scrutiny reduced the number to 10,694 and forwarded it to the establishment ministry in April. "In the last 30 years we couldn't

have increased 10 to 15 times," a top Caab official said. Biman officials said usually airlines want their flights to land at airports at late hours, so that pas-

International agencies have raised alarm bells over the humanitarian consequences of the fighting, with northern Christian town in recent days and 1.2 million displaced by unrest in Iraq this year.

Thousands of soldiers, backed by air cover, tanks and bomb disposal units, were advancing on Tikrit -now-executed dictator Saddam Hussein's hometown -- which fell to insurgents on June 11.

"A large military operation started today to clear Tikrit of ISIL," Staff Lieutenant General Sabah Fatlawi told AFP, saying its fighters now have two choice "flee or be killed."

Earlier sources inside the city told CNN that the Iraqi security forces entered the city supported by special forces and fighters from among the

local tribes, and had gained control. He said that fighters from the Islamic State in Iraq and Syria (ISIS) retreated in the direction of Kirkuk

and Nineveh provinces.

Helicopter-borne troops swooped into a strategically located university campus in the city on Thursday, with sporadic clashes reported throughout yesterday.

\$104.9m for 542 speeches around the world between January 2001, when he left the White House, and January 2013, when Hillary stepped down as Secretary of State, according to a Washington Post review of the family's financial disclosures. Although slightly more than half of his appearances were in the US, the majority of his speaking income, \$56.3m, came from foreign speeches, many of them in China,

Japan, Canada and Britain. The financial industry has been Clinton's most frequent sponsor. The review showed that Wall Street banks and other financial services firms have hired Clinton for at least 102 appearances and paid him a total of

Since leaving the State Department, Hillary has followed her husband in this profitable line of work, addressing dozens of industry groups, banks and other organisations for pay. Records of her earnings are not publicly available, but executives familiar with the engagements said her standard fee is \$200,000, and that she has been in higher demand than her husband.

The speaking itineraries could be a political challenge for Hillary should she run for president, giving opponents an opening to attack the Clintons for being beholden to powerful interests. Some companies that have paid Bill for speeches have faced scrutiny from federal regulators.

Matt McKenna, a spokesman for Bill Clinton, and Nick Merrill, a spokesman for Hillary Clinton, declined to comment.

Both Clintons also give speeches for free. Bill Clinton, for instance, makes frequent visits to the Clinton School of Public Service at the University of Arkansas — appearances that Skip Rutherford, the school's dean, called "an Arkansas fringe benefit."

The Clintons also sometimes request that sponsors pay their fee as a donation to the Bill, Hillary and Chelsea Clinton Foundation, the family's non-profit group that leads global philanthropic initiatives. Hillary Clinton is doing this with her \$225,000 fee for a speech this autumn at the University of Nevada at Las Vegas, according to her office.
