

Marvel recasts Thor as a woman

Marvel Comics has unveiled big changes for its hammer-wielding Norse superhero Thor; the character will become a woman. The publisher said it hoped recasting Thor would attract more women and girls to superhero comic books. New artwork reveals the once strapping and bearded Thunder God now as a blonde, clad in a caped costume.


Thor first appeared in a Marvel adventure in 1962 and has been the star of two blockbuster movies.



New York-based Marvel described the move as "one of the most shocking and exciting changes ever to shake one of the 'big three' of Captain America, Iron Man and Thor."

" No longer is the classic Thunder God able to hold the mighty hammer, Mjolnir, and a brand new female hero will emerge worthy of the name Thor," it said in a news article.

The female Thor is due to appear in her first adventure in October and be illustrated by Russell Dauterman.

At first glance, Dr. Samina Luthfa appears like any other academic; with a PhD from the University of Oxford under her belt, the Assistant Professor of Sociology at Dhaka University goes about the same routine as any of her colleagues in the daytime. But as the sun goes down, her alter-ego emerges from the professor's shadow, and takes to the rehearsal room. Samina Luthfa, known more commonly in the theatre arena as Nitra, has been a devoted theatre activist for nearly two decades. Beginning her career in 1996 with Subachan Natya Sangsad and now one of the founding cornerstones of BotTala (since 2008), the actor-playwright has received acknowledgement in the form of the Tanushree Padak (2010) and the Md. Zakaria Padak (2013). In a conversation with The Daily Star, the thespian shed light on her journey of the stage.

From when you started in theatre to today, a lot of things have changed. What keeps you driven to theatre?

Nitra: I don't know ... (smiles) it has grown with time, with phases. It started with a desire to act, but I realised there are other

aspects to it. I started writing for my troupe, and to see my lines being uttered by actors on stage, moments being created, it's very satisfying. I think I have invested in it too much, and now I don't want to let go. But to keep some young people engaged in a creative activity, to develop that side of them, that's also a motivation. I don't think I am leaving a big impact or anything like that.

Tell us a little about the plays you've written?

Nitra: The first play I wrote was for Subachan, called "Teerthangkar". Then I cotranslated a play called "12th Night", wrote "Khona", and "Beerangona", that has been produced by the London-based Komola Collective. I've written a few more, but not all of them have been brought to stage yet.

You've portrayed wide-ranging characters from Leelaboti in "Khona" to Woman in "Dog, Woman, Man". What is it like to switch such diverse roles?

Nitra: It's actually quite difficult, to establish a character. I've donned different roles at different times. For instance "The Trial of Mallam Ilya" I portray three characters, two of which are male; all three are negative roles, but have their own nuances. To discover a character and be

that person is challenging. Every role I do feels like the most daunting, but portraying Woman (in Reetu Sattar's "Dog, Woman, Man") is probably the longest struggle. Because, the character I did was a part of me that I had left behind long ago, so it was like opening a Pandora's Box. It was a little scary.

Your husband, Mohammad Ali Haider, is a theatre veteran and director at BotTala as well. What are the perks of that?

Nitra: It's fantastic. Say, we continuously debate about a matter of a play, and eventually one of us is able to convince the other. I wouldn't get that scope with another director. All our conflicts are theatre-related (chuckles). Haider is like my partner-in-arts. We understand each other well, so working together is very easy. Our tastes are also similar, so that works well with us too.

What's the big dream, with theatre? Nitra: We still haven't reached theatre to a wider audience. I have a dream to take my plays to the masses. I want to stage plays for the people outside of Shilpakala; in Savar, Ashulia and other places. I want to reach a

place where we can tell stories of their lives, things that they can relate to. So yes, I want to do that.

"Bulbul Ahmed was a humble person. He had such an acting quality for which director Chashi Nazrul Islam chose Ahmed for shooting Devdas. Eminent actor-director Soovash Dutta also highly appreciated the Mahanayak," said Jhuna Chowdhury.

Litterateur Imdadul Haq Milon once interviewed Ahmed for a programme titled "Ki Katha Tahar Sathey" that was screened at the event. Later, a film "Simana Periye", in which he acted, was also screened at the programme.

'Apes' thrashes 'Transformers' in US box office



"Dawn of the Planet of the Apes" has burst into the North American box office taking \$73m in its opening weekend. It easily topped the chart, which saw "Transformers: Age of Extinction" slip to second.

The 'Apes' epic also picked up another \$31m from international markets. Set 10 years after 2011's "Rise of the Planet of the Apes", the sequel follows the battle for dominance between humans and intelligent apes. Andy Serkis has reprised his performance-capture role as Caesar,

the ape who leads his species after encountering a colony of humans who survive a deadly virus. Serkis also famously played Gollum in the Lord of the Rings and Hobbit films, which also

used performance capture, which electronically

tracks an actor's movements and expressions so they can be translated into computer generated

imagery (CGI).

Directed by Matt Reeves, it also stars Gary Oldman, Keri Russell and Jason Clarke. A second sequel to be directed by Reeves is already in the works to further extend the franchise which first began with 1968's "Planet of the Apes", based on Pierre Boulle's French novel. Four movies followed in the 1970s, as well as a critically panned 2001 reboot by Tim Burton.

Elsewhere on the chart, Melissa McCarthy and Susan Sarandon comedy "Tammy" - about a fast food worker who gets fired and takes her harddrinking grandmother on a road trip - was at three. Sequels "22 Jump Street" and "How to Train Your Dragon 2" took the fourth and fifth spots.
