# Three Tests after 7 years

Bangladesh will begin their home series against Zimbabwe on October 26 this year with the first Test to be played at the Zahur Ahmed Chowdhury Stadium in Chittagong. The two teams will face off in three Tests and two ODIs during the month-long tour.

The second Test will take place at the same venue from November 4. After that, the teams will travel to Dhaka to play the last Test at the Sher-e-Bangla National Stadium. The SBNS will then host the first three ODIs on November 19, 21 and 23 respectively. For the last two ODIs the teams will return to Chittagong.

This is only the third time that Bangladesh will feature in a series involving three Tests. The first was against Pakistan in 2003 and the second against Sri Lanka back in 2007.

It will be an interesting series considering the fact that the Zimbabweans will be up against their former captain Heath Streak, currently contracted as Bangladesh's bowling consultant.

The series is also expected to be the first of at least six meetings between the two sides until 2022, as per the ICC's new Future Tours Programme schedule.

Each Test series is important for Bangladesh, the lowest-ranked Test team in the 10-team table, as they endeavour to rise up the ranking ladder, and they will have few better chances to win Test matches than hosting Zimbabwe.

Of the 11 Tests that the Tigers played against Zimbabwe they have won

two, drawn three and lost six. Bangladesh are slightly ahead in the ODIs though, winning 31 out of the 58 matches played; at home the Tigers have won 17 and lost 11 ODIs.

Bangladesh is expected to play a number of three-Test series against New Zealand by 2022 as well. According to ESPNCricinfo Bangladesh will host New Zealand three times while they are scheduled to tour New Zealand in 2016-17, 2019, 2021 and 2022-23. The Tigers are also expected to play South Africa and Pakistan twice according to the new FTP.

The scheduling of the series means that the Tigers will get a month-long gap after they return from their tour of the West Indies, which will take place between August 20 and September 17.

#### PCB accepts CL invite

Pakistan will send its domestic Twenty20 champions Lahore Lions to play in the Champions League to be held in India in September, an official said Wednesday.

The Lions, led by former Pakistan Twenty20 captain Mohammad Hafeez, beat Misbahul Haq's Faisalabad Wolves in the final of the event held in February.

The Twenty20 champions of Australia, South Africa, England, New Zealand, Sri Lanka and the West Indies will also take part in the event.

"We have received an invitation to send our Twenty20 champion team so Lahore Lions will be participating in the event in September," a Pakistan Cricket Board (PCB) spokesman told AFP.

# Just Dhaka and Ctg?

The Bangladesh Cricket Board's decision to host the entire Zimbabwe series in only two cities -- Dhaka and

Chittagong -- has brought to the fore an alarming question. With eight internationally recognised stadiums in the country and with a total of eight international games to be played, why is it that only a small portion of the nation gets the pie?

Of the six remaining -- Dhaka and Chittagong will host the matches -- there are at least three cities which could easily have been a part of the series in October.

The Shaheed Chandu Stadium in Bogra made a great beginning in 2006 when it hosted Zimbabwe, Kenya and Sri Lanka that year. However, in terms of international success that was as far as Bogra went. The last international match December 2006.

The Sheikh Abu Naser Stadium in Khulna saw Abul Hasan create history by scoring a century after coming in to bat at number 10 in Test cricket and also witnessed Bangladesh notch two ODI wins against the West Indies back in

2012. The people of Khulna however, don't know when they can witness such feats again.

The Sylhet Divisional Stadium was renovated in quick time ahead of the ICC World T20. However, after the main event the remaining work at the picturesque ground seems to have slowed down. played there was an ODI in According to the board the stadium is still undergoing work with regards to its drainage system and hence will not be able to host matches there.

> "We are hosting the series in only two cities because of logistical difficulties. We did think about Sylhet but the drainage system is

undergoing work. The match referees had a few observations regarding the hotels in Khulna because of which it was outside our plans.

"There are similar travelling and hotel issues in Bogra as well. We are expecting to develop the infrastructures of these venues soon," said Nizamuddin Chowdhury, BCB's acting CEO.

While television broadcasters no doubt have managed to take the game to far corners of the country, international games taking place in one's own backyard is a point of special pride for most people.

After the completion of the

stadium at Cox's Bazar, local hero and national top order Mominul Haque said that, because of the development, he believed that many more people would be encouraged to take up the sport in the coastal town.

Yes, the stadiums in questions do have problems but none of them are unsolvable, considering the fact that they did receive international recognition, which in itself suggests that the logistical facilities were up the mark. If such a trend does continue these venues will be remembered as mere structures which once stood as landmarks of Bangladesh's cricket.

#### Jimmy-Ravi row spices up Test

Tensions in the second Test

that begins at Lord's on Thursday are set to be increased after the International Cricket Council charged England's James Anderson with allegedly "abusing and pushing" India's Ravindra Jadeja just two days before the match.

The incident is alleged to have happened after the players left the field for lunch on Thursday's second day of last week's drawn first Test in Nottingham when allrounder Jadeja was batting.

India, cricket's financial powerhouse, and England may be two of the 'Big Three' nations now effectively running the ICC but that relationship is sure to be put under strain in the coming days and weeks.

Indeed, even before the ICC confirmed the charges against Anderson which, if proved, could see the Lancashire seamer banned for up to four Tests, the England and Wales Cricket Board issued a statement of its own saying the bowler had their "total support" and warning they would report Jadeja for breaches of the ICC's code of conduct should the global governing body pursue action against the pace-

Both Anderson and Jadeja are free to play at Lord's as it is highly unlikely a disciplinary hearing overseen by an ICC judicial commissioner will be underway by the time the match starts on Thursday.

However, Anderson could now miss some part of what is India's first five-Test tour of England for 55 years.

## Feni almost clear of relegation zone

A treble from Gambian Landing Darboe all but rescued Feni Soccer Club from the relegation zone in the Nitol Tata Bangladesh Premier League, helping his ninthplaced side to an emphatic 4-1 win over lowest-placed Uttar

Baridhara Club at the Bangabandhu National Stadium yesterday.

Their second win in 25 outings pushed Feni Soccer six points clear of Uttar Baridhara who, with 12 points from 25 matches, are on the brink of relegation having played just one season in the top flight. Feni Soccer now need only one point

from their remaining two matches to be avert relegation, but a single point drop by Uttar Baridhara in their next two matches will automatically take Feni to safety. The match was a battle to avert demotion

and Feni Soccer, who have been playing in the top flight for the last four seasons, emerged victorious thanks partly to Uttar Baridhara being down to 10 men for the last 40 minutes.

Availing a defensive fumble, Ali Hasan put Feni Soccer ahead in the 10th minute

after dodging past two defenders while Uttar Baridhara came close twice to levelling the margin but their forwards squandered both opportunities.

The situation got worse when Baridhara were reduce to 10 men following the sendoff of defender Ahsanul Kabir in the 51st minute and Feni utilised the man advantage to the full to add three more goals in the second half.

Gambian Landing doubled the lead from a 35-yard stunner in the 59th minute before Dulal Hasan reduced the margin with a header in the 69th minute. But Landing scored again in the 76th minute, converting a spot kick. He completed his hattrick and sealed Feni's second triumph in the league six minutes from time with a low angular drive inside the box.

Away at Sheikh Fazlul Haque Moni Stadium, Muktijoddha Sangsad beat visitors Brothers Union 1-0, thanks to a 61stminute strike from Nkowcha Kingsley.

With their 12th win in 25 matches, Muktijoddha Sangsad toppled Mohammedan to take third position with 43 points, two points ahead of Mohammedan while Brothers remained in fifth spot with 37 points from 25 outings.

#### Cook calls it an Indian 'tactic'

England captain Alastair Cook said Wednesday he believed India's complaint against James Anderson was a tactic designed to have his spearhead bowler miss some part of the ongoing series.

Anderson was charged by the International Cricket Council (ICC) on Tuesday for allegedly "abusing and pushing"Ravindra Jadeja during last week's drawn first Test at Trent Bridge.

If the charge is upheld by an ICC judicial commissioner, Anderson could be banned for as many as four Tests and England have responded by levelling a charge of their own against Jadeja.

Cook speaking to reporters at Lord's, where the second Test of a five-match series starts on Thursday, accused India of making a "mountain out of a molehill" in an effort to try to get Anderson banned.

### SL come back after Elgar ton

Opener Dean Elgar smashed a century before Sri Lanka pegged back South Africa with four key wickets late on the opening day of the first Test in Galle on Wednesday.

The visitors were cruising at one stage after a cracking 103 from Elgar and a sedate 80 from Faf du Plessis. But the hosts fought back in the final session to restrict South Africa to 268-5 at close of play.

Quinton de Kock (17) and Dale Steyn (0) were the not out batsmen.

Elgar, 27, hit 11 fours and three sixes in his 186-ball knock but his dismissal immediately after the tea break triggered a mini-batting collapse that handed the advantage to the hosts.

"I felt our bowlers bowled really well on a batsman-friendly wicket," said Sri Lanka's bowling coach Chaminda Vaas.
