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Malaysian plane 'shot down'

All 295 people on board feared dead as jet crashes in Ukraine; pro-Russia rebels blamed

A Malaysian airliner was "brought down" over eastern Ukraine yesterday, reportedly killing all 295 people aboard and sharply raising the stakes in a conflict between Kiev and pro-Moscow rebels in which Russia and the West back opposing sides.

Ukraine accused "terrorists" -- militants fighting to unite eastern Ukraine with Russia -- of shooting down the Malaysia Airlines Boeing 777 with a heavy, Soviet-era SA-11 ground-to-air missile as it flew from Amsterdam to Kuala Lumpur.

Leaders of the rebel Donetsk People's Republic denied any involvement, although around the same time their military commander said his forces had downed a much smaller Ukrainian transport plane. It would be their third such kill this week.

There was no sign of survivors at the crash site near the rebel-held town of Shaktarsk in the Donetsk region, where an AFP reporter saw dozens of severely mutilated corpses strewn through the smouldering wreck of the decimated airliner.

Debris stretched for kilometres in the area near the Russian border, with the jet's tail marked with the Malaysian Airlines insignia laying in a corn field, and insurgent fighters and fire trucks nearby.

Russian news agency Itar-Tass cited a Ukrainian aviation official as saying no one had survived.

Malaysia Airlines announced on Twitter the loss of the Boeing 777 carrying 280 passengers and 15 crew, which had been expected in the Malaysian capital around 6:00am on Friday (2200 GMT Thursday).

The Independent wrote: nine Britons, 23 US citizens and 80 children were reportedly among those killed when the passenger jet crashed. AFP added that four French nationals and several Dutch were confirmed to have been on board the doomed flight.

The disaster comes just months after Malaysia's Flight MH370 disappeared on March 8 with 239 on board. The plane diverted from its Kuala Lumpur to

Swindled by bankers

Anti-graft body to sue 11 Prime Bank officials around Tk 93cr embezzlement

Eleven officials of Prime Bank swindled Tk 92.65 crore out of depositors, creating fake loan recipients, in yet another blow for the country's under-pressure banking sector.

The scam surfaced as Commission yesterday Prime Bank Limited a bank with a difference approved a charge sheet

against the now suspended 11 officials, including its vice-president HM Zakir Hossain, and 19 traders in this connection.

A top ACC official said the swindlers, in connivance with the traders, misappropri-

ated the money from the bank's Islamic banking division at the capital's Dilkusha between 2006 and 2012.

Quoting the case statement, the ACC official said the bankers arranged the loans in the name of fake loan recipients and later withdrew the money by using the bank accounts

of the traders. The latest disclosure highlights the lack of monitoring in the banking sector, which has recently been hit by several high profile

Kids killed while playing

First-hand account of Gaza port strike discloses massacre

The first projectile hit the sea wall of Gaza City's little harbour just after four o'clock. As the smoke from the explosion thinned, four figures could be seen running, ragged silhouettes, legs pumping furiously along the wall. Even from a distance of 200 metres, it was obvious that three of them were children.

Jumping off the harbour wall, they turned on to the beach, attempting to

cross the short distance to the safety of the Al-Deira hotel, base for many of the journalists covering the Gaza conflict.

They waved and shouted at the watching journalists as they passed a little collection of brightly coloured beach tents, used by bathers in peacetime.

It was there that the second shell hit the beach, those firing apparently adjusting their fire to target the fleeing survivors. As it exploded, journalists standing by the terrace wall shouted:

"They are only children."

In the space of 40 seconds, four boys who had been playing hide and seek among fishermen's shacks on the wall were dead. They were aged between seven and 11; two were named Mohammad, one Zakaria and the youngest Ahed. All were members of the extended Bakr family.

Three others who were injured made it to the hotel: Hamad Bakr,
