Tajuddin's letters are historical record

Launch of the book 'Tajuddin Ahmader Chithi' told

Eminent people speaking at the publication ceremony of "Tajuddin Ahmader Chithi", a collection of 118 letters written to and by Tajuddin between 1953 and 1974, yesterday called the book an important record of the country's Liberation War.

"After 50 or 100 years, there would be no witness of the Liberation War, but this book like other documents would remain, to enrich our future generation about the history of our country," said popular writer Prof Muhammad Zafar Iqbal.

The book is edited by Tajuddin's daughter Simeen Hussain Rimi MP and published by Pratibhas.

Discussing the book, economist Prof MM Akash said 11 of the letters were taken from the preparation phase of the struggle for freedom before 1971, 89 from the nine-month of the war, and 18 from the post-1971 period.

The ceremony, held at Planning and Development Academy in the capital's Nilkhet, marks the occasion of the 89th birthday (on July 23) of Tajuddin Ahmad, prime minister of Bangladesh's exile government during the Liberation War in 1971.

Reading out a couple of letters, Akash said the letters not only gave a picture of the time they were written but also showed how Tajuddin, a person who preferred to remain in the backstage, evaluated himself.

Changing the seat decoration of a scrapped airplane, they have launched the "Urojahaj Mini Chinese and Restaurant" just opposite the beach.

Zakir Hossain, a former employee at Shah Amanat International Airport, and Manjur Alam, a local businessman, have invested around Tk 48 lakh for the whole project, including the purchase of the plane.

After placing the 75 feet long aircraft on a compound of around 72 decimals of land, which they rented initially for five years for a monthly Tk 15,000 rent, they started their journey on March 26 this year.

Thirty people can sit at once in the restaurant where dry foods like cakes, patis and cold drinks, tea and coffee are only served now.

Uttam Kumar, a staff of the restaurant, said they charge each visitor an additional Tk 30 alongside the food cost.

Sixteen years after the Sylhet airport was declared international in 1998, the airport will finally have refuelling facilities for aircraft.

The authorities concerned are hopeful that aeroplanes can be refuelled in Sylhet by August. The refuelling station in Sylhet will be

complete once South African company Encon Engineering Projects (Pvt) Ltd, which is implementing the project, gives the finishing touches to the storage tanks, said officials of Bangladesh Petroleum Company, superviser of the project.

Completion of the project would allow aircraft to make return flights at Sylhet Osmani International Airport. At the moment, international flights by domestic carriers only land at the airport. The aircraft which land in Sylhet fly to Dhaka for refuelling.

Officials of the Civil Aviation Authority of Bangladesh (Caab) said 10 international flights land at Sylhet airport from London and the Middle East weekly. "After the refuelling station becomes

operable, foreign and domestic carriers will

be able to operate international flights to and from here," said Md Hafiz Ahmed, manager at Caab, Sylhet.

Jabbar Jalil, president of the Association of Travel Agents of Bangladesh, Sylhet chapter, said currently around 2,000 people of Sylhet travel to the capital weekly to fly to London and the Middle-East.

"The refuelling station will allow those people to fly directly from Sylhet to their destinations," he added.

Jet fuel, needed for aircraft refuelling, will be stored at the airport and at South Surma in Sylhet city. Both the sites have three storage tanks with four lakh litre capacity each.

The 50-crore "Construction of Aviation Refuelling Facilities at Sylhet Osmani International Airport" was approved by the energy ministry in 2010, said Md Aminul Haque, the project manager and also the deputy general manager of state-run Padma Oil Company, adding that it was revised at Tk 51.18 crore in December 2012.

"The project was revised again in September 2013 at Tk 53.15 crore," he further said.
