MIRPUR ROAD TAILBACKS

Chaos stems from 2 points in 50 yards

Two turning points within a stretch of less than 50 yards in Science Laboratory-City College area on Mirpur Road have become a sheer nightmare for commuters with appalling tailbacks throughout the day.

Four of the city's busiest markets -- New Market, Gawsia, Chandni Chawk and Dhanmondi Hawkers Market -- bustling with Eid shoppers in Ramadan are located near this stretch, worsening the traffic congestion that often lead to tailbacks stretching by a few kilometres.

As shoppers crowd these markets, long snarls are created on all four roads -- one going south towards Azimpur, one to Kalyanpur to the north, Dhanmondi road-2 on the west and Elephant Road on the east -- around this stretch. On Wednesday afternoon, it took Akhtaruzzaman, driver

of an intra-city bus on the Mirpur-Azimpur route, three hours to reach Nilkhet from Mirpur-12, a distance which otherwise takes around a hour. "Due to immense tailbacks, I had to spend about one

and a half hours just to cross the area from Kalabagan to Nilkhet, about a 15-minutes' drive only, " said Akhtar.

CNG-run auto-rickshaw driver Mamunur Rashid felt the impact of the traffic pressure from as far as Matshya Bhaban, around two km from Science Lab area.

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Buses from Jhigatola take turn en route to Elephant Road, creating traffic chaos at Dhanmondi-3 turning in the capital around 2:00pm yesterday.

Dhaka to reaffirm pledge at Girl Summit

Bangladesh will renew its firm commitment to eliminating child marriage at the first-ever Girl Summit in London on July 22, foreign office sources said yesterday.

Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina will lead the Bangladesh delegation at the summit being hosted jointly by British government and the UNICEF.

She is due to leave for London on Monday morning.

The sources said Hasina will attend the High-Level session of the Summit on Tuesday and interact with First Lady Chantal Compaore of Burkina Faso, a West African Country and Malala Yousafzai of Pakistan.

The session will be moderated by UNICEF Executive Director Anthony Lake at Walworth Academy.

An end to child Gaza bleeds on

Death toll hits 342 despite restraint calls; UN chief heads to region; protests intensify worldwide

Israel's operation against Hamas saw one of its bloodiest days yesterday, with 46 Palestinians killed in Gaza and two Israeli soldiers dying in a clash Jewish state.

As Israeli warplanes bombarded Gaza from the air, and ground troops pressed an assault on land, the Palestinian death toll rose to 342, with rights groups warning that a growing number of victims are children.

UN chief Ban Ki-moon was Saturday headed for the region to bolster intense diplomatic efforts

aimed at ending 12 days of bloodshed in and around Gaza, even as Israel warned it was ready to intensify its ground assault aimed at destroying a network of cross-border tunnels.

Despite the blistering offensive, with militants who infiltrated the Palestinian commandos in central Gaza managed to use one of the tunnels to infiltrate southern Israel, sparking a deadly skirmish in which one militant and two soldiers were killed, the army said.

The soldiers died when the militants fired a machinegun and an antitank missile at an army patrol, the army said.

Troops fired back, killing one of

them, while the others fled back through the tunnel in an operation claimed by Hamas's military wing, the Ezzedine Al-Qassam Brigades, which said 12 militants had been involved. An Israeli Bedouin was killed when

a rocket hit his encampment in southern Israel in an attack which also wounded four of his family, among them two young children, police said. The deaths raised to five the total

number of Israelis killed since July 8 -three soldiers and two civilians -- in the deadliest confrontation between Israel and Hamas militants since 2009.

Rasu Sheikh could not believe his eyes as he saw his son walking towards him at Shahjalal International Airport yesterday.

After being held captive for weeks in Tikrit of Iraq, Selim Sheikh returned home and got reunited with his father.

Sixty-year-old Rasu could barely hold back his tears as he hugged Selim. "I can't express my happiness in words right now. At last I have found my son whom I presumed to be dead," he said.

"My family was in deep shock. We had nothing to cheer about since my son had been in danger," mentioned Rasu. Selim along with 14 other Bangladeshis were held cap-

tive by Sunni rebels in trouble-torn Iraq for 24 days. They returned home on an Air Arabia flight around 9:00am. The motive behind holding the Bangladeshis captive

could not be known.
