Guardians swoops to top US box office chart



Disney's Marvel adventure, "Guardians of the Galaxy", has topped the North American box office in its debut weekend, taking \$94m. The space adventure, which stars some of the lesserknown characters from the comic book universe, knocked science fiction thriller "Lucy" off the top spot, with its takings setting a record for a film opening in August.

"Get On Up", a biography of the soul singer James Brown, debuted in third. The "Guardians of the

Galaxy" ensemble casts includes Zoe Saldana and Chris Pratt plus the voices of Vin Diesel and Bradley Cooper. The film also secured the third biggest opening of 2014.

Marvel adaptations "The Amazing Spider-Man 2" and "X-Men: Days of Future Past" have also enjoyed success this year.



When Ashok Kumar stepped into Bollywood and began making a name for himself, his youngest brother Abhas Kumar was still a child. After his other brother Anoop Kumar also ventured into acting, it was probably more the family atmosphere that interested young Abhas into the realm of films. But unlike his brothers, Abhas was more interested in singing, particularly idolising singer-actor KL Saigal. His first steps into Bollywood was as a chorus singer for Bombay Talkies, and although over the next four decades he would go on to act, direct, produce, write scripts and screenplays for films and write and compose songs, it would be his voice that resonated to the furthest corners of the Indian subcontinent.

"Andolan" (1951) made a lot of people take notice, he kept on looking for singing assignments. Salil Chowdhury, the music director for his 1954 film "Naukri", was the first to give him a chance with "Chhota Sa Ghar Hoga", albeit a little apprehensive of the fact that Kishore had no formal musical training. But it took one genius to spot another; when SD Burman heard Kishore imitate KL Saigal, he encouraged him to develop a style of his own. Kishore took it seriously, taking a leaf out of Tex Morton and Jimmie Rodgers' book to add yodeling to his singing. As his acting career flourished,

Although his screen debut

Kishore went on to produce unforgettable numbers from



behind the microphone as well --"Maana Janaab Ne Pukara Nahin", "Ek Ladki Bheegi Bhaagi Si", "Haal Kaisa Hai Janaab Ka" to name just a few; and formed a winning combo with SD Burman and Asha Bhosle for "Chhod Do Aanchal", "Haal Kaisa Hai Janaab Ka" and "Paanch Rupaiya Baara Aana". By the '60s, he had also taken producing and directing films, alongside composing, for "Jhumroo" and "Door Gagan Ki Chhaon Mein". While his acting career took a dip, hits like "Zaroorat Hai Zaroorat Hai",

"Gaata Raahe Mera Dil" and "Yeh Dil Na Hota Bechara" did not

stop coming. Late in the decade, he did the unforgettable "Padosan" with Mehmood and Sunil Dutt, and a year later sang "Mere Sapno Ki Raani" and "Roop Tera Mastana" (in "Aradhana"), the song that got him the first of his eight Filmfare Awards, most held by a singer.

Over the next two decades, Kishore Kumar would go on to work with every Bollywood music director of repute, from Lakshmikant-Pyarelal to Bappi Lahiri, was the voice from actors across the strata -- from Amitabh Bachchan to Govinda, shared studio with voices from

Lata Mangeshkar to Alisha Chinoy, and sang in languages from Bangla, Marathi, Assamese, Gujarati, Kannada, Bhojpuri, to Malayalam, Oriya, and Urdu. But there was more to Kishore

Kumar that makes him unforgettable. With a broad grin peeking from under the characteristic moustache, he looked like the most jovial person around, but he admitted to being a loner who preferred talking to trees. He was paranoid about being paid; once, upon discovering that his payment was not cleared, he appeared on set with half his face in make-up, and explained to the director "Adha paisa toh adha make-up" (Half payment, half make-up). But for films produced by Rajesh Khanna and Danny Denzongpa, he would not take payment even when offered. There remains countless tales of his eccentricity, from the "Beware of Kishore" sign on his door, to having director GP Sippy chase him on foot while he drove away, only to claim later that Sippy had dreamt of it.

He passed away on October 13, 1987-- his brother Ashok's 76th birthday, of a heart attack, but he sang almost literally till his last day, recording his final song "Guru Guru" the day before. If he had lived, Kishore Kumar would have been 85 yesterday, and probably would still put his headphones on at a studio once in every while, and produced something only he can. Having said that, the songs he sang and the moments he created on screen, are enough to last his fans a lifetime.

Kathak dancer Asha Hossain's interest in dance began in her early childhood. Though she belongs to a conservative family, there were no hurdles in her way to pursue her passion for dance. "My family never barred me from dancing. They always encouraged me. Of course I get the most support from my elder sister, who is my idol."

"I first studied at Jessore Shishu Academy. After my SSC, I came to Dhaka and gained admission in Nrityanchal. Since then, I have never looked back. I received an ICCR scholarship after my HSC and went to Rabindra Bharati University in Kolkata."

Asha did her Honours and Master's from Rabindra Bharati University with a major in Kathak. She is now doing PhD in Bangladeshi folk dance. Beside her expertise in Kathak, she wants to uphold Bangladeshi dance forms. "I have a strong drive to uphold our cultural heritage using my knowledge and expertise in the field of dance," says Asha.

In addition to her higher studies, she also performs regularly with her school Nataraj Music and Dance Academy. Asha frequently does choreography as well. Since dance is her first love, Asha's interest lies in all forms of dance.

"Dance speaks a universal





language as beats and rhythms are the same irrespective of time and place. The way we dance in Bangladesh is same as in Kolkata My guruji in Kolkata never told

me that my style was different from theirs. But they lay more emphasis on theoretical knowledge. My way of dancing, patterns and styles have evolved over

Jessore in my childhood." Asha loves Kathak more than any other dance form. "I think Kathak is graceful. I love Chakkar and Tatkar. I have a fascination for Kathak movements, dress, lehenga, angarakshak. Kathak means telling tales through dance. It has different patterns as Kathak has evolved a great deal. I love its beats and rhythms. Rhythm is everywhere. When you clap your hands it also forms a certain rhythm. Dance is an ecstatic expression of emotion in the forms of rhythm."

To Asha, the stage is akin to a place of worship. "While portraying a character I forget my present and past and become the character."

Apart from dancing, Asha took part in the reality show "Dance Bangla Dance" and emerged in the rung of the top eight. She has also played a role in "Meghe ■ Dhaka Tara", a film by Kamaleshwar Mukherjee based on the life of Ritwik Ghatak. "I played the role of Bongobala against Saswata Chattopadhyay. Recently, I have worked in a music video."

Asha's future plan naturally is to keep on her toes. "I am nothing without dance. I will do dance choreography. I want to establish a dance school. Another of my long-cherished desires is to do something for the transgender community," she says.
