Withdraw reservations about CEDAW articles

Mahila Parishad urges govt

Bangladesh Mahila Parishad yesterday submitted a list, containing signatures of 78,501 women, to the prime minister

demanding the withdrawal of reservations about two articles of the Convention on the Elimination of all forms of Discrimination

against Women (CEDAW). PM's personal secretary-2 Namita Halder, received the list from Jona

Goswami, director advocacy, and Khodeja Akter Nazma, programme coordinator, of the parishad, said a press release.

Referring to government's reservations about articles 2 and 16.1 of CEDAW, the parishad said such reservations are incompatible with the object and purpose of the convention and are impermissible under international law.

It also demanded that the government take initiatives to arrange direct election to the seats reserved for women in the parliament and increase the seats to one-third.

The parishad urged the government to place a bill in this regard in the coming parliamentary session.


The deceased was Sadek Mia, 60, of the village.

Rajuk evacuates three AL LEADER MURDER IN CAPITAL buildings with cracks

Rajdhani Unnayan Kartripakkha (Rajuk) yesterday evacuated around 15 families from three buildings in Siddique Bazar of Old Dhaka after cracks appeared on their walls.

All the three--two are tin-roof and one is a four-storey building--were sealed off with the help of local police and fire fighters, said Rajuk Executive Magistrate Shahidul Islam.

The team also evacuated printing workers from the first four floors of an adjoining under-construction seven-storey building for safety concern, he said.

He said the pillars and beams of the ground floor of the four-storey building also got misplaced. Din Islam, a ground floor resident of the four-storey house,

said around 11:30pm on Monday, a big chunk of plaster fell on him and his son, and later, he informed other residents.

Residents of the area said the cracks surfaced in the three buildings because of the unplanned construction of the adjoining seven-storey building that housed eight printing presses.

They said one Ibrahim Khalil Prince bought the property of the seven-storey building a year ago, and back then it was a two-storey building.

But less than a year, Prince added five more floors, they added.

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Fire razes warehouse in capital

A massive fire ripped through a warehouse in the capital's Swarighat last night, destroying almost all of the stored chemicals and edible oil.

Five of the fire fighters working on the site suffered minor injuries from smoke and chemical inhalation, and took treatment in hospital, said fire officials. The blazes were put off after a one hour of efforts from

9:40pm, but there was still a huge amount of smoke billowing from smoldering objects till filing of this report at 12:30am today.

The massive fire was seen from places even 2km away, said witnesses, and nine units of fire fighters battled it.

Masudur Rahman, a deputy assistant director of the Dhaka fire service office, said they did not find the cause of the fire at the one-storey tin-roof warehouse immediately.

Neither the owner nor the workers of the warehouse was available, he added.

Trafficking of Missing Children

Trans-border effort must for prevention

Workshop told

An integrated and technology-based trans-border approach is necessary to protect missing children from being trafficked and abused, said participants of a national consulta-

tion workshop yesterday. The workshop was held at a hotel in the capital to discuss and share ideas on Plan International Bangladesh's "Missing Child Alert (MCA) Project".

Plan International Bangladesh and South Asia Initiative to End violence Against Children, Bangladesh chapter jointly organised the workshop with the theme "Every missing child could be a living story of modern slavery".

Ashish Damle, the regional project manager, introduced the three-year project, which will be implemented simultaneously in Bangladesh, Nepal and India.

He explained that most missing children in Bangladesh and Nepal end up being trafficked to India where they often become victims of sexual exploitation, worst forms

of child labour, and organ selling. Sometimes children are trafficked to other countries like the Middle-Eastern ones through India, he added.

Damle told The Daily Star that the data on missing children and the number of children trafficked each year from Bangladesh and India was unreliable.

"Last year, 760 children of Bangladeshi origin were rescued from Mumbai, New Delhi, Kolkata, Hyderabad and Bangalore," he said, adding that other Indian cities might also have children trafficked from Bangladesh.

The project with its technology-based uniform case management approach, wherein data of both missing and rescued children would be uploaded, would help identify, trace, rescue, repatriate and rehabilitate missing children,
