Betty Boop set for film revival Animated character Betty

Boop is to be brought back to the big screen to appear in her first feature-length film. The film arm of Simon Cowell's Syco Entertainment is partnering with Animal Logic Entertainment - the team behind the "Lego Movie" to make the movie. The production has been described as a "musicdriven hybrid animated comedy".

Boop first hit screens in 1930 and had her own series, famously spawning her catchphrase "Boop-Oop-a-Doop".

Cowell tweeted a picture of himself with the coy character saying: "I've worked with some serious divas but I think Betty could be the biggest of them all." Producers also released a 'statement' from Boop saying: "I'm so excited to return to the big screen - and I only work with the best! Let's have some fun, Simon."

The character was created by Max Fleischer for his Talkartoons series - the first animation "talkies", with Mae Questel providing Boop's distinctive voice.

The vociferous voice of music

Indigenous week comes to an end with performance

Madol, a musical band, enthralled a packed audience at National Library Auditorium, Agargaon in the capital on August 14. Marking International Indigenous Day 2014, Bangladesh Adivasi Forum (BAF) organised the weeklong programmes that came to an end through an igniting performance. Madol members set off the event with

the number "Jago Jago Sorbohara". Later, they performed songs of rebellion, protest and breaking the chain of exploitation. A boisterous young Adivasi audience clapped, screamed in melodic bliss and serenaded several numbers with the band members. The essence of the live performance was themed on "Ei Gaan Hok Bohu Asthahinotar Biporit-e Ek Gobhir Asthar Gaan".

Madol artistes performed Bawm, Chakma and Mandi [of Garo community] songs at the event. They also presented their original songs including "Ami Adivasi", "Ami Filistin (Palestine)", "Karnafulir Kanna", "Madol Bajey", "Mukti Chai", "Jhornar Chhondey" and "John Henry".

Their music predominantly focused on themes of deprivation, exploitation, injustice, agony and struggle of mass people.

Madol was founded in December, 2009 at Rajshashi University as a cultural group with members from all adivasi communities across Bangladesh. Over the years, it has become a music band. The place of diversity of the band is that it included members of Chakma, Bawm, Mandi and Singh. The band comprises Sham Sagor Mankin (vocal), Jemson Amlai (lead guitar), Riton Chakma

(rhythm guitar and backing vocal), Anthony Rema (drums), Sayon Mangsang (flute), Antar Sku (bass guitar) and Harendranath Singh (madol).

Guest artiste Sanjeeb Drong rendered three Bhupen Hazarika songs -"Pratidhwani Shuni", "Sheetero Shishir Bhejano Raat-e" and Saheli Saheli". Sanjeeb Drong, a writer-activist, swayed the audience with his inspirational and patriotic songs. Another guest artiste, Shyamabati Chakma Chaiti, also presented two songs at the event. One of her featured performances evoked nostalgia revolving around hilly landscape.

President of BAF, Jyotirindra Bodhipriyo Larma, veteran politician Pankaj Bhattacharya, Dhaka University teachers Robayet Ferdous and Shantanu Majumder, singer Kafil Ahmed and veteran guitarist-singer Maqsood, among others, attended the event.

Lakshyapar's ode to monsoon

...... The monsoon session of Lakshyapar was held on August 8 evening at Narayanganj High School and College auditorium. The classical music soiree featured four artistes -- Sharmila Majumdar, Barsha Majumdar Papri, Priyanka Das Tithi and Supriya Das, all from Sylhet and disciples of the same guru - Pandit Ramkanai Das. The artistes performed monsoon-themed ragas and songs based on ragas. The concept of the programme was designed in the form of a lecture demonstration and not kheyal recitals only. With an eye to building up a new generation audience of classical music, the script of the programme incorporated four sections,

under four ragas associated with clouds and rains. Each section comprised description, demonstration and short performance of one raga followed by a selection of songs set on that.

Following a brief introduction on raga Miyan Ki Malhar, Barsha Majumdar Papri, performed a kheyal. Later, four artistes sang four songs to reveal the relationship of the tunes with the raga. The corresponding songs were "Snigdha Shyam Beni Barna" (Nazrul Sangeet), "Jhoro Jhoro Borishey" (Rabindra Sangeet), "Shrabano Ghonaye" and "Elo Borosha".

Priyanka Das Tithi came up next to introduce raga Gaur Malhar and performed a kneyal tailing with a bhajan. The song associated with the raga was "Shraban Megh Maya".

Sharmila Majumdar took up raga Jaijawanti. Though not a monsoon raga, Jaijawanti has special appeal and connotations with Malhar and Megh. Sharmila's profound and cool performance of the kheyal was followed by three Nazrul songs - "Abar Ki Elorey Badol", "Megh-e Megh-e Ondho" and "Megh Medur Borosha".

The other clusters of presentation included raga -- Shudh Malhar, Sur Malhar, Nat Malhar and Megh. The audience seemed moved by Supriya's offering of raga Megh. She invigorated the Lakshyapar audience by her musical creativity, skill and emotion. Variation followed in the middle with the presentation of kajri, a folk song. Sabuj Ahmed accompanied the performers on tabla throughout the programme. Host Sumana Biswas added a new dimension to the event reciting famous poems on monsoon. The two-hour soiree attracted a sizeable young audience who enjoyed classical and semi-classical genres.

At the beginning, chief advisor of Lakshyapar Kashem Jamal handed over "Haradhan-Sukhen Classical Music Scholarship" money to six recipients from last year's competition.

Travelling Film South Asia in Delhi Daring documentaries

Whoever said documentaries had to be soporific and only an exclusive club of documentary filmmakers became excited about the genre? The enthusiastic crowd that turned up at the recent four-day Travelling

Film South Asia 2014 -- A festival of South Asian documentaries, proved otherwise. For four days, Delhi audiences had a taste of finely nuanced non-fiction films from Pakistan, Afghanistan, Burma, Sri Lanka, Nepal and India. Bangladesh went unrepresented as the acclaimed; "Shunte Ki Pao!" had to pull out from the festival at the last moment. The films made strong social and political statements -- be it through the lens of human rights, migration or gender. So there was "My Punjabi

Love for You" from Pakistan, "No Burqas Behind Bars" (Afghanistan), "No 62 Pansodan Street" (Burma) that won the Tareque Masud Award for Best Debut Film at Film South Asia 2013. Then there were Sri Lankan films based on the Sri Lankan civil war, "The Story of One" and the hard to watch "No Fire Zone", an investigative documentary of the gross human rights violations in the final weeks of the Sri Lankan civil war. No, there was no running theme at the festival, says Mallika Aryal, the

young adviser to the biennial Film South Asia (FSA) that precedes the Travelling Film Festival of documentaries from South Asia. "Film South Asia tries to include all kinds of voices from South Asia. 'No Burgas Behind Bars' is a balanced, objective view of the lives of women who have been put behind bars in Afghanistan for petty offences like eloping with the wrong guy. 'Who Will Be a Gurkha' from Nepal is about young boys recruited by the gurkha regiment in UK through a rigorous process with hints of a colonial mindset," says Aryal.

The much-applauded "Invoking Justice" from India had an unusual theme -- women Jamaats in Tamil Nadu, South India that apply the Islamic Sharia law to different cases.

But the documentary film movement is clearly at the crossroads. On one hand, dramatic cutting-edge technologies make for more affordable and easier filming, editing and screening, but on the other are major lacunae. Says the Kathmandu-based Kanak Mani Dixit, well known editor of Himal and chairperson Film South Asia: "The documentary movement has been derailed in South Asia. The craft of filmmaking has suffered while technology has advanced. Non-fiction films need to win audience's hearts, convey important messages and look at issues in new ways".

However, opinion is unanimous that documentaries occupy a niche all their own. "Documentaries afford more space for saying things that can't be said in the mainstream media," says Mitu Varma, director Film South Asia.
