

Jute growers in trouble

BJMC cannot buy their produce due to fund shortage

Jute growers are left in the lurch this peak season as their biggest buyer, Bangladesh Jute Mills Corporation (BJMC) has shied away from the market due to fund constraints.

The state-owned company has opened over 140 jute purchase centres across the country early this month, but it could hardly buy any jute for want of money.

In a depressed market, producers are now left with no other option but to sell the natural fibre at non-competitive prices to the middlemen, market sources said.

The middlemen, who are stockpiling raw jute, would be the ultimate beneficiaries as they would be getting premium prices at the fag end of the season when the BJMC would eventually be able to manage funds.

'Missing' documents placed in court

Evidence in the cases against toxic paracetamol syrup producers appears to have been swept under the rug by none other than the country's drug regulatory body itself.

Mobile phone Fate of Gaza truce hangs in balance

Death toll tops 2,000

The Gaza death toll rose over 2,000 yesterday as the clock ticked towards a midnight deadline and negotiators in Cairo strove to hammer out a decisive end to weeks of bloodshed.

As millions in and around Gaza enjoyed an eighth day of calm brought on by two back-to-back truce agreements, tensions were once again on the rise ahead of a new

deadline ending a five-day ceasefire which expires at 2100 GMT.

But there was little sign of any workable consensus emerging from ongoing talks between Israeli and Palestinian negotiators in Cairo.

The warring parties have just hours left to either: reach an agreement, accept a further extension, or risk a resumption of the SEE PAGE 10 COL 1

Floods damage crops, houses

Kurigram, Gaibandha, Bogra worst affected districts

Floodwaters have washed away some 200 houses, damaged crops of over 10,000 hectares in northern Kurigram district and rendered more than one lakh people marooned.

Flood situation continued to worsen as almost all the rivers in the district saw their water levels increase yesterday.

Of the flood-affected northern districts, Rangpur, Lalmonirhat and Nilphamari saw water receding, but people there are now suffering from a food and drinking water shortage.




