Biman halts Delhi, HK flights to carry hajis

First Hajj flight with 419 pilgrims takes off today STAFF CORRESPONDENT

Biman Bangladesh Airlines has suspended flight operations on Dhaka-Delhi and Dhaka-Hong Kong routes as it has engaged three of its wide-body aircraft for this year's Hajj operations start today.

As per an earlier decision of the Biman board, the flight operations on the two international routes will remain suspended until the Hajj operations end on November 8, said Biman officials.

The national carrier resumed twice weekly service each on the routes in May last year, a year after it suspended operations to these two long-served destinations in 2012 due to a severe shortage of aircraft.

The last flight with a 162-seated Boeing 737 aircraft flew to Hong Kong on Friday with 156 passengers and returned home with 119 passengers. A similar aircraft flew to Delhi on Saturday with 32 passengers and returned with 104 passengers.

"Although response from passengers was poor immediately after the resumption of flights on the two routes, it improved considerably later," said an official at Biman's marketing department.

The first Hajj flight is scheduled to leave Hazrat Shahjalal International Airport at 7:05am today with 419 pilgrims for Jeddah in Saudi Arabia.

Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina yesterday opened the Hajj programme at Askkona Hajj camp in the capital.

Biman Bangladesh Airlines will carry 49,378 Hajj pilgrims, out of 98,757, from August 27 to SEE PAGE 5 COL 1 and rises tomorrow at 5:39am.

Father shot dead on Subhan's instruction

Martyr's son tells war crimes tribunal

The son of a martyr yesterday described at the International Crimes Tribunal-2 that his father was tossed two or three feet in the air before thudding to the ground when the Pakistani army shot him at the instruction of Jamaat-e-Islami leader Abdus Subhan in Pabna on May 12, 1971.

"'See, how Joy Bangla is!' said Subhan Moulana as he kicked my father's body two or three times," said Shamsul Alam, who saw the incident from 50 yards away.

Breaking down in tears, the 24th prosecution witness said that to save their lives, his grandfather took his hand and ran into a nearby sugarcane field while the occupation army started shooting at them. "But bullets missed us, and we saved ourselves hiding in

the field."

Shamsul, 57, said his father Mohiduddin Pramanik was an influential Awami League leader of Satbaria Union, and many residents of their village were involved with the party.

He said he heard heavy gunfire around 6:00am on May 12, 1971 from the west of their village and saw flames; people ran in different directions to save their lives.

"My grandfather asked us to go to Gajnar Beel, 7-8km from our village. My father and I stayed at home, as my father refused to leave the house." Around 12:00 noon, the Pakistani army and Subhan, riding in two cars, arrived at their house, adjacent to Zila Parishad, he said.

"Seeing Subhan Moulana my father raised his hands and approached them.

RAJSHAHI CITY BNP Minu-Bulbul rift grows

Rajshahi BNP is rife with differences between Mayor Mosaddek Hossain Bulbul and former mayor Mizanur Rahman Minu since Bulbul was neither made general secretary of the city BNP nor president of the city Jubo Dal recently.

Soon after a press release revealed on Saturday night that a 169-member city Jubo Dal committee was formed, without Bulbul, 70 of his loyalists resigned immediately, while 50 more have tendered resignation letters to Minu, the new city BNP president.

Bulbul, who had headed the city Jubo Dal before being elected Rajshahi city mayor in June last year, was made a vice president of the city BNP.

Sahanul Islam, who resigned as senior vice president of the new city Jubo Dal, told The Daily Star that they demanded that Bulbul be made general secretary of the city BNP or be retained as president of the city Jubo Dal. "It (the new committee) is a conspiracy against the mayor to keep him out of politics," he said.

Sahanul also alleged that at least 20 businessmen were made leaders of the city Jubo Dal, including general secretary Abul Hasnain Hikol, neglecting politicians.

Mayor Bulbul declined to comment because of his "ill-

The division between Bulbul and Minu, who supported Bulbul in his mayoral bid, surfaced as the latter "interfered in the city politics too much", said BNP insiders, while Bulbul funded the anti-government movement and sup-

ported activists involved in it. The lists of the new city Jubo Dal and city BNP committees were signed by BNP office secretary Ruhul Kabir Rizvi

HC okays foreign TV channels

The High Court yesterday cleared the way for the authorised cable television service providers to continue operating foreign channels in Bangladesh. The court rejected a writ

petition, which challenged the legality of these channels, and sought directives on the government to ban three Indian TV channels --Star Jalsa, Star Plus, and Zee Bangla.

The HC bench of Justice Sheikh Hasan Arif and Justice Abu Taher Md Saifur Rahman passed the order, saying that the petition was

not moved properly. Deputy Attorney General Amit Talukder told The Daily Star that there was no legal bar

on airing foreign TV channels, which had legal licences, following the HC order. The petitioner's counsel,

Aklas Uddin Bhuiyan, told The Daily Star that he would move the petition before another HC bench later to get an order in favour of his client.

On August 7, Supreme Court lawyer Syeda Shahin Ara Laily filed the petition.

Swelling Balu sends students on 1.5km detour

Over a hundred students of Prof Ali Ahmad School and College in the capital's Khilgaon have been left without a direct road to their institution since Monday when a part of the mud street connecting it with their villages was washed away by water from the

swelling Balu River. The students, from Nagdarpar and Nasirabad villages, now need to take a 1.5km detour or use boats to attend classes. It takes one more hour than the usual time, said the villagers.

The 1,700-foot long and 15-foot wide road in Kazir Jaiga, another village where the institution is located, is connected with Nagdarpar. The onrush of water has swept away about a 25-feet stretch of the road around 2:00pm on Monday, affecting more than a dozen families and fish farms

"My students are the worst sufferers of the damage," said Abdul Hakim Sardar, principal of the college, which stands 200 yards from the broken part.

Musa Ratul, a fifth grader from Nagdarpa, said, "I had to start one hour earlier than the usual time to reach school in time."

But all were not like Ratul.

"Six to seven students of my class, at 9:00am, came in late and blamed detours for that," Hakim said, calling for immediate repairs of the road.

Echoing the teacher, Nasirabad Union Council member Samir Ali and said he had already talked to senior officials. "I hope that the repair work will start tomorrow," he told The Daily Star.

Joj Miah, who along with nine others built fish farms over a vast tract of the low-lying area, braces for losses, as fish have made their way out

through the damaged part. "We had invested some Tk 15 lakh and expected to make around Tk 15 to Tk 20 lakh, but all is gone," he said.

The Flood Forecasting and Warning Centre (FFWC), however, called it an "isolated incident" and said there was little possibility of flooding in and around Dhaka in next few days. Ripon Karmaker, duty officer of the

FFWC, told The Daily Star that the water levels of the rivers around Dhaka--the Buriganga, Shitalakkhya, Turag, and Balu--might rise in the next 72 hours but these were still below the danger level. "Besides, the water levels [in the

rivers] are rising very slowly. So, we don't see any possibility of flooding in and around the capital in two or three days," he said, adding that inundation of low-lying areas near the rivers was common in the monsoon.
