Lampard ends **England** career

England midfielder Frank Lampard announced his retirement from international football after a career spanning 15 years on Tuesday.

The 36-year-old's 106th and final cap for his country came on June 23 when he captained England in their final World Cup game against Costa Rica.

Lampard said in a statement released by his management company: "I have taken the decision to retire from international football.

"It has been a very tough decision for me to make which is why I have given it so much thought since the World Cup."

His haul of international caps puts him sixth in the all-time England list behind Peter Shilton, David Beckham, Steven Gerrard, who announced his England retirement last month, Bobby Moore and Ashley Cole.

Everton eye Eto'o deal



Everton are moving closer to signing Cameroon striker Samuel Eto'o before the end of the current transfer window, several British media organisations, including the BBC, reported Tuesday.



Ivanovic, Stosur advance

Former French Open champion Ana Ivanovic, the eighth seed, eased past Alison Riske of the United States, 6-3, 6-0 in a tie to reach the second round of the US Open on Tuesday.

Australia's Samantha Stosur, the 2011 champion, went through with a 6-1, 6-4 win over Lauren Davies of the United States.

China's Zhang Shuai can only dream of the success achieved by the likes of Williams, Ivanovic and Stosur.

The 32nd seed lost 6-1, 6-2 to Germany's Mona Barthel leaving Zhang with a 0-12 career record at the Grand Slams.

British spirits were equally low as interest in the women's singles came to an end with Heather Watson slumping to a 6-1, 6-1 defeat to Romania's Sorana Cirstea.

Ealier on Monday, Former champions Andy Murray and Maria Sharapova reached the second round, Murray overcoming painful muscle cramps as well as Robin Haase. Eighth-seeded Murray, who won his first Grand Slam title

at Flushing Meadows in 2012, defeated the 70th-ranked Dutchman 6-3, 7-6 (8/6), 1-6, 7-5, but said the painful cramp that struck without warning could have cost him the match. Top-seeded Novak Djokovic breezed past a US Open

novice in the first round Monday, beating Diego Schwartzman 6-1, 6-2, 6-4 in a match that finished a few minutes before midnight.

Djokovic was never in trouble against a 22-year-old opponent from Argentina playing in his first main draw at Flushing Meadows.

French Open champion Maria Sharapova swept the last 10 games to surge past fellow Russian Maria Kirilenko 6-4, 6-0 and into the second round.

Venus Williams, the winner in 2000 and 2001, also advanced, defeating Japanese veteran Kimiko Date Krumm 2-6, 6-3, 6-3.

Australian Open winner Stan Wawrinka, seeded third, moved smoothly into the second round with a 6-2, 7-6 (8/6), 7-6 (7/3) victory over Czech Jiri Vesely.

Milos Raonic, the big-serving Canadian who is among the young guns vying to end the Grand Slam hegemony of the game's Big Four -- Djokovic, Federer, Rafael Nadal and Murray -- pelted Japanese qualifier Taro Daniel with 20 aces in a 6-3, 6-2, 7-6 (7/1) victory.

Mario glad to be back



Mario Balotelli said he was glad to be back in the Premier League after the controversial Italy striker completed his £16 million (\$26.5 million, 20.1 million euros) move to Liverpool on Monday.

Balotelli left England in January 2013 when Manchester City sold him to AC Milan, but the 24-year-old endured a difficult time in Milan, where he was subjected to racial abuse by opposing fans.

After completing his switch to Anfield on a three-year contract worth a reported £90,000 a week, which includes an option for a further year, Balotelli conceded he had been wrong to ever leave England.

"I'm happy to be back because I left England and it was a mistake. I wanted to go to Italy, but I realised it was a mistake," Balotelli told Liverpool's website.

"English football is generally better. English football is beautiful."

Liverpool did not complete the transfer in time for Balotelli to play in their 3-1 loss at City on Monday, but he attended the match and sat in the directors' box wearing a dark top and a beanie hat. He had earlier completed a one-on-one training session

with Liverpool's head of conditioning and fitness, Ryland Morgans, at the club's Melwood base.

Balotelli earned a reputation as a troublemaker during his three-year stint at City, where his antics included setting fireworks off in his own house and brawling with thencoach Roberto Mancini.

MU break bank for Di Maria

Manchester United have agreed a British record transfer fee of £59.7 million (\$98

million, 75 million euros) to sign Argentina midfielder Angel Di Maria from Real Madrid according to British media reports on Monday.

Several media outlets, including the BBC, reported that United have finally sealed a deal for Di Maria after several days of negotiations with the Spanish club.

The 26-year-old was said to have been seen arriving at United's training ground on Monday evening as he prepares to put pen to paper on a reported five-year contract worth an estimated £200,000-a-week.

and will shatter the previous British record fee of £50 million paid by Chelsea to sign Spain striker Fernando Torres from Liverpool in 2011.

United last broke the British transfer record when they paid Leeds £29.1 million for Rio Ferdinand in 2002 and the deal will also eclipse the club record £37.1 million they splashed out to sign Juan Mata from Chelsea in January.

Real manager Carlo Ancelotti revealed over the weekend that Di Maria had said goodbye to his team-

mates and he was absent from the Madrid squad as they beat Cordoba on Monday.

His arrival in Manchester would be the headline deal of United's overhaul under new manager Louis van Gaal, who has already spent a combined £72 million on England left-back Luke Shaw, Spanish midfielder Ander Herrera and Di Maria's Argentina team-mate Marcos Rojo, who is also left-footed like him.

Assuming the transfer is finalised on schedule, Di Maria, capped 52 times, could make his debut at Burnley on Saturday as van Gaal looks to revitalise a United team still without a win after the first two games of the new Premier League campaign.

Former Benfica star Di Maria has an impressive pedigree after winning the Champions League with Real last season and the Spanish title in 2012.
