

## DEMAND FOR REOPENING TWO CU DORMS

## 'Shibir' terror continues

Islami Chhatra Shibir activists of Chittagong University, who were demanding reopening of two dormitories, allegedly vandalised a teachers' bus in nearby Chowdhury Hat area yesterday, a day after they reportedly exploded crude bombs at two rail stations.

Nobody was hurt in the attack, made around 7:30am, when the bus was headed for the port city to bring teachers to the campus, said Proctor Siraj-ud-Daula. Some windowpanes were broken, he said.

Police arrested four suspected students. "We're verifying whether they were involved in the vandalism," said Inspector Main Uddin, in-charge of CU Police Outpost.

Under the banner of general students, Shibir men enforced an indefinite strike on Sunday, demanding reopening of Suhrawardy and Shah Amanat halls, which were declared temporarily closed on August 24 following a gunfight between Shibir and

Bangladesh Chhatra League.

The two dormitories are reportedly dominated by Shibir, and house more than a thousand students.

As part of their strike, Shibir men allegedly exploded eight cocktails on Monday at Sholoshahar and Chowdhury Hat rail stations between the city and CU, and set fire to rail tracks.

The proctor said all the scheduled examinations and classes were held but the presence of students on the campus was less than normal.

Amid the fear of violence, 10 policemen escorted each of the shuttle train trips, said Yasin Faruk, officer-in-charge of General Railway Police, Chittagong.

Shibir CU unit President Mostafizur Rahman said they had given moral support to the "logical demonstration of general students" but denied their activists' link to any attack or violence. "The resident students have the right to stay in dormitories,"

## Hanging body found at Dhaka College

Police recovered the body of a man hanging from a window grille of the academic building of Dhaka College in New Market area yesterday.

The dead, Salimullah, 35, of Shakhipur upazila of Shariatpur district, came to his brother Amanullah's residence at Dhaka Medical College Hospital staff quarter on New Elephant Road a month ago for treatment.

Deceased's brother Amanullah told The Daily Star that he got married to one Subarna Rekha nine months back. He was mentally shocked as they got separated recently, he said.

Amanullah said his brother went out from their Elephant Road residence on Monday evening and had been missing since then.

He said a police official informed him about the death over the phone in the morning.

Dr Ayesha Begum, principal of Dhaka College, told The Daily Star that Salimullah was not the student of the institution and they did not know how he went there.

Police sent the body to DMC morgue for an autopsy.

Home bosses' meet on Sept 17-19

## BCL factional clash leaves five injured

In Gazipur city, activists demand release of the unit president held for violence

At least five students were injured in a factional clash of Bangladesh Chhatra League over establishing supremacy at Allama Kashgari hall of Dhaka Alia Madrasa in the capital yesterday.

The injured were treated in Dhaka Medical College Hospital and a local clinic.

The two factions of BCL activists with hockey sticks, cricket stumps and iron rods started fighting to take control over the hall around 2:30pm, said Sub-inspector Tarekul Islam of Chawk Bazar Police Station.

The clash stopped after police intervention, he said.

Sources said some activists led by Shaker, Shahadat Limon and Mohsin drove out the rivals loyal to the hall unit.

BCL the city unit Deputy Office Secretary Asraf Uddin Titu filed the case against the 17 and 10 to 15 unnamed people with a Chittagong court, said Quazi Sanowar Ahmed, lawyer of the plaintiff.

## SAGAR-RUNI MURDER

## HC bench declines to hear bail plea of detained man

A High Court bench yesterday declined to hear a bail petition filed by Tanvir Rahman, an official of Scholastica School in Dhaka, in connection with the journalist couple Sagar-Runi murder case.

The bench of Justice Md Rezaul Haque and Justice Gobinda Chandra Tagore returned the petition to Tanvir's lawyer, saying Justice Haque had "some personal problems" in hearing the petition.

The judges, however, told Tanvir's lawyer Fawzia Karim Firoze that she could move the same petition before another HC bench. Fawzia said she would move it next week.

Tanvir filed the bail petition in late July, saying he was detained on suspicion in the murder case, and he had been suffering for around 21 months without trial.

The petition also said he was remanded for eight days.

## SUBHAN'S WAR CRIMES TRIAL

## Witness presents incriminating documents

A prosecution witness yesterday presented three documents to the International Crimes Tribunal-2 to prove the anti-liberation role of Jamaat-e-Islami leader Abdus Subhan in 1971.

Anisur Rahman, librarian of the war crimes investigation agency, showed a list of Pabna Peace Committee members, another of the members of Pakistani national assembly and provincial assembly, elected in the 1971 by-poll, and the second report of the National People's Inquiry Commission on the activities of war criminals and collaborators of 1971.

The documents were collected from the investigation agency's library in July last year. Anisur is the 26th prosecution witness in Subhan's case.
